Listening to God

Readings & Reflections

As you read through you can click on the link to read the passage, or look it up in your own Bible.¹

Normally I start my worship planning and sermon with scripture. Usually from the <u>Lectionary</u> (a 3 year series of readings from throughout the Bible). At the moment I am feeling more pulled towards themes.

With us all spending so much more time at home than normal, I was reminded of a lovely book of poetry/prayers that I'll get to later. In it the poet shares how they see, or try to see, God in all the

various aspects of home life.

How do you do at that? ...

and what about the Bible? What does it have to say about seeing God at home?

My first thoughts of people encountering God while doing everyday things were all big events. Remember Moses? He was just watching over the sheep as they wandered around looking for food. Ready to jump into action if they got into trouble, or perhaps dozing a little on his feet after hours/days/years of this. Then there's the burning bush, and God invites Moses to radically change his life... and that of all Israelites (Exodus 3).

And then there's Paul. He's just going from Jerusalem to Damascus. Lots of people did it. Except in this case the risen Christ shines into his life so brightly that the whole direction of Paul's life changes - and he's blinded for a few days to give him a chance to reflect on things (Acts 9:1-19).

And of course there's Mary. We're not sure what she was doing, but an angel came and invited her to give birth to the Messiah (<u>Luke 1: 26-38</u>)

These are all really big examples that have changed the course of history. This might happen to you, but not to most of us.

Does the Bible give us any more regular examples?

I thought of several examples of hospitality, such as when Abraham and Sarah unknowingly invite God in for a refreshing drink on a hot day (Genesis 18: 1-15)... but that's not such as good examples as we're not supposed to be inviting people over.

How about the stories that Jesus tells?

There's the <u>Good Samaritan</u> (Luke 10: 25-37), in which somebody is just going about his business when he sees somebody hurt. He stops and helps, even though he shouldn't. He doesn't meet God in the story, but he does show what it's like to be in God's kingdom. (Incidentally, I heard a very similar story this week when one of the Kensington community accidentally fell and hurt themselves.)

There are numerous other stories that give glimpses of God. There's the <u>woman</u> (Luke 15: 8-10) who loses the coin and searches everywhere for it. There's the lamp that you place on the <u>lamp</u> (Matthew 5: 15) stand and not under the basket. There's the <u>fish</u> <u>with the coin</u> (Matthew 17: 24-27) in it's mouth. There's the disciples <u>plucking grain</u> (Mtthew 12: 1-8) on the Sabbath.

All these stories give us a glimpse of life with God, but they are still a little bigger than the ordinary.

I quite like the prophet Jeremiah. Like all the prophets, he has some (well, lots of) hard words for the people. He also uses some nice tangible ways to do it. In one case he visits a potter and makes the point that if what the potter is making isn't working out, the potter simply smashes it down and reshapes it (Jeremiah 18: 1-11) - and no, I don't think that is happening now.

Another comparison that Jeremiah used that I can relate to in my everyday life is this.

"Blessed are those who trust in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord.

They shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream.

It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit."

Especially in these anxious times it is good to remember where our nourishment comes from - and go to the water.

But how can we remember that at home?

Well, how about reconsidering those things you have to do anyways as part of your everyday life. Gunilla Norris did this, over 30 years, and produced a book of prayers² that she has as she does the household chores. Activities is perhaps a better word, as she transforms them from chores into ways of drawing closer to God. She doesn't say/think/pray/feel the same things every time, but some things she eventually write down.

Some of the the ways/topics/places she does include:

- Waking up: and waking to God
- Walking: and the support and trust in the floor, as well as the prayer that we might be a support for others
- Washing her face: and praying that God's living water washes away her masks
- Making the bed: and how we are making, or not, our future
- Choosing clothes, Getting dressed, looking in the mirror (seeing as God sees), crossing treshholds, stairs, breakfast, opening windows, creating lists, sweeping, laundry, bills, ...

The list goes on. Here are a few complete prayers from ordinary activities.
