On Friday we heard from several people leading up to Jesus' death on the cross. God was dead. Killed by people.


and that is how we left it,

Dear Lord, please bless the words typed here and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

A couple of months ago I got bored listening to the news. It was always the same. Trump did something to get attention; Brexit was a mess; there was a fuss over building the pipeline out west; and there was an issue in the middle east with Israel or Syria or refugees. It was always the same.

While all those topics have disappeared from the news (except Trump), it's still always the same. It's all about the effects of the Corona virus. There are reports of people sick with COVID19 accompanied by death and recovery numbers, the economic hardship and attempts to help, a warning to stay physically isolated and wash your hands, and ending with something to cheer us up.

The Corona Virus has infected everything.

I hope you have also been calling people. Have you noticed how much this microscopic virus⁴ has shaped what we are doing, and what we are feeling? Some people are finding this exciting, many feel waves of anxiety - and sometimes fear. Some find it relaxing, while others working from home and looking after their children find it chaotic. Some are frustrated with the rules and those who break them. Some find the isolation lonely - especially after winter. Some wonder how this will change the world, and others feel helpless while surrounded by so much need. Some feel grateful, ...and guilty. Many people have felt all of these emotions, and more, over the last few weeks.

As group gatherings were stopped, there was a priest, a rabbi and an imam (no joke) being interviewed on the CBC. They were asked, "Where is God?" They all said the same thing. God is with us.

For Christians, Easter is the big example of this.

Jesus experienced many of the emotions I just went through

- excitement: at many feasts, not to mention the Palm Parade
- anxiety: seen in the garden before being arrested (but not fear)
- frustraited: disciples take so much teaching (Matthew 17:17)
- grief: at a friends death and the suffering it left (John 11)
- lonely: being abandoned by everyone on the cross even feeling abandoned by God

Jesus is not afraid of what we are feeling, or what we are going through - and is with us in these times.

Although, not necessarily as expected. If you think back through the stories of Jesus, God rarely acts as expected.

Take today's story. You'd expect a dead body to be in the grave where it was put - especially when there are guards to stop any interference. But God isn't there. The women are told to get everybody back to Galilee for a meeting... except Jesus can't wait that long and meets them on the way.

God is with us in trying situations, but probably not as expected.

Some people say that Jesus comes and turns tragedy into joy. They feel the tragedy of the crucifixion is changed into the joy of the resurrection.

I disagree.

The tragedy is still there; it's a part of the story. Hindsight doesn't make it happy or goodbut it's not the end. Even with death, the pain, suffering and isolation are not the end, because Christ is risen. The story moves on, and the end is marvellous/miraculous joy.

I know this isn't news. Christians have been talking about this since the first Easter morning when the women came running in with the Good News. But it's worth remembering.

Jesus meets us in the world.

The Holy Spirit is in us... in you.

And that whatever the news tells us, there is a bigger story. God is going to bring the story to and end that will fill our souls with peace and joy.

In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, mysteriously three in one. Amen.


RESURRECTION Scavenger HUNT


