
Call to worship

# Listening to God

Dear Lord, please bless the words typed here and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

#### A Story



Shalom.

My name is Baruch ben Neriah. I am a scribe. Although this is what I thought I would be, it is not quite as I expected it to be.

My Father was a scribe. He went into the palace precinct for work. He left in the morning and came back for dinner. It seemed like a quiet life. ... My position is not the same. It came as an unexpected opportunity. My father questioned me taking it, but it is hard to turn down a man of

God - and working with Jeremiah is exciting.

An advantage with being the only scribe working for him is that I get to do it all: write down what he says, then later present it to the people and the royal court.

I am glad that God did not choose me to say these words. Most of the time Jeremiah is yelling about how the people of Judah have failed. That we have not kept up our part of the covenant and God is going to call us on it. God will bring in the Babylonians and we will all become their slaves - or dead. This went on for years and years.

Sometimes I wish I was with one of the happy prophets. I am glad I'm just reporting the words.

[laugh at fond remembrance]

Sometimes he doesn't just use words. I remember once we went

down to the potter's house. After buying a jug he went on, again, about the various ways the people of Judah have broken the covenant he broke the jug - smashed it - bang!

Then he told everybody that this is what God will do to the kingdom - break it into so many pieces that it can never be put back the same.

Wow, what a day.

Then, a few weeks ago, the Babylonians showed up. They surrounded the city. Jeremiah did something even more shocking. He started telling people to go out and surrender - after all, these were God's actions.

I couldn't believe it.

Some of the Kings advisers decided this was bad for moral and put him down a well - as if that would stop him. When the King found out a prophet of God had been put down a well to starve he allowed Jeremiah to be brought up and kept in the Courtyard of the Guards.

Which brings us to today.

I arrive in the courtyard to record what might happen and Jeremiah starts talking about his cousin Hanamel. God told Jeremiah that Hanamel was going to come and ask Jeremiah to redeem his field.

This could be a little awkward if it did happen. When we'd last been in the area, the family had found Jeremiah too embarrassing and they said that if he didn't stop being such a prophet of doom they'd stop him. Thankfully we were able to move on before anything more violent happened.

Anyway, God told Jeremiah his cousin would come, and he did - and he needed Jeremiah to buy the land or the family would lose it.

Now it would be nice for them if Jeremiah helped, but really, weren't they listening! For years Jeremiah's been prophesying to us about losing our homes. They shouldn't be so worried about losing their land and becoming a slave - it's about to happen to us all.

The crazy thing is - Jeremiah did it.

Everybody within earshot was struck dumb - well, not really. Word spread quickly and many people came to witness this. A man buying land that was about to be lost to the Babylonians.

Anyway, Jeremiah agrees to buy the property. Which calls on another of my scrible skills - certifying land transactions. We gathered some witnesses and I created the forms. Everything was properly signed and sealed. Then he instructed me to put them both in a dependable pottery jar for preservation. I was being entrusted with this sign of hope for the future - and as a scribe, to tell people about it.

Jeremiah was acting out a prophecy from God. This was different than most of the other prophesies. Now, with the Babylonians at the gate, he delivers a message of hope. God certainly does not go with the expected.

Instead Jeremiah says, "The Lord of hosts, the God of Israel, says: Houses and fields and vineyards will again be bought in this land."

We will lose our homes and way of life, but God will reshape us and bring us back to the promised land. As Jeremiah redeemed his cousin while in captivity, so to will God be able to redeem us.

Nothing is too much for God! Hallelujah!

## Reading

Jeremiah 32: 1-3a, 6-15 (you may also want to read the prayer 16-25)



Jeremiah was trapped in in a courtyard in a city trapped by an invading army that could attach at any time. Some of you have told me how you wake up with anxiety, feeling trapped and useless, worried by this virus that may attack at any time.

God had shown Jeremiah how the choices of the people would lead to suffering, and now it was starting - even for the powerful.

Now people were starting to listen.

and God gave Jeremiah another message. That there world be tough times, but not forever.

Jesus arrives in Jerusalem, and there is a celebratory parade. While the officials didn't, there were crowds of people who recognized Jesus as a person from God who would save them. Somebody to rescue them from the Romans and lead them back to glory.

Jesus saw things differently. He saw the suffering to come. In the Luke version of this passage (<u>Luke 19: 41-44</u>), Jesus weeps for Jerusalem. He says 'if only you recognized, even now, what brings God's peace.' Jesus hears the celebration, and knows the suffering is coming.

I wonder if he remembered Jeremiah, trapped in Jerusalem centuries before? With the death threats already received, Jesus knew he was risking his life being there. Was Jesus anxious? He doesn't seem to be afraid.

Did he remember Jeremiah's symbolic action of hope? How much did he know about the week that was to come?

Back then, here now, and in 'then' to come, the Spirit presents messages of hope, Jesus rides in, and our God is one of hope.

In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, 3 in 1. Amen.

# Prayer Partnership


