

Intro to the readings

An important part about listening is realizing your own biases. What assumptions do you bring to the conversation.

If you look in the bulletin, you'll see this section is called 'Listening to God'. But before we do that, I want you to take a moment and think about Jesus. . .

After celebrating spring and creation last week, we're back to the lectionary. Today's passage is a familiar one. It happens on Easter not just in the Easter season, but actually on the day. For the

characters in the story Jesus had been killed last Friday. They had grieved with the others through the Sabbath, and now that they could travel again they were heading off.

Before they got out the door they had heard some crazy news. The Hebrew word used to describe the delivery of this news is a medical term that means 'the delirious babbling of very sick people.' They are confused and lost and set off - probably for home.

The Bible says there were two, but only gives us one name. A popular theory is that they were husband and wife. As women unfortunately didn't have much status, it would be normal not to name her in the text. While probably not historically accurate, I've asked for a female voice in our reading.

Reading: This week you can follow the scripture in this dialogue version, or look it up in your own Bible.³

Luke 24: 13-35

Narrator: On that same day two of Jesus' followers were going to a village named Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were talking to each other about all the things that had happened. As they talked and discussed, Jesus himself drew near and walked along with them; they saw him, but somehow did not recognize him. Jesus said to them,

Jesus: "What are you talking about as you walk along?"

Narrator: They stood still, with sad faces. One of them, named Cleopas, asked him,

Cleopas: "Are you the only person in Jerusalem who doesn't know the things that have been happening there these last few days?"

Cleopas (in disbelief): "The things that happened to Jesus of Nazareth!

He was a prophet strong in what he did and what he said - in God's eyes as well as the people's. Haven't you heard how our chief priests and rulers handed him over for execution, and had him crucified? But we were hoping he was the one who was to come and set Israel free ...

Yes, and as if that were not enough, it's now the third day since all this happened; and some of our women have completely confused us. For they went to the tomb at dawn, and then when they couldn't find his body they said that they had a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of the men went straight off to the tomb and found things just as the women had described them—but they didn't see him!"

Jesus: "Aren't you failing to understand, and slow to believe in all that the prophets have said? Was it not inevitable that Christ should suffer like that and so find his glory?"

Narrator: And Jesus explained to them what was said about himself in all the Scriptures, beginning with the books of Moses and the writings of all the prophets.

As they came near the village to which they were going, Jesus gave the impression that he meant to go on further, but they held him back, saying,

Cleopas: "Do stay with us. It is nearly evening and soon the day will be over."

Narrator: So he went indoors to stay with them. Then it happened! While he was sitting at table with them he took the loaf, gave thanks, broke it and passed it to them. Their eyes opened wide and they knew him! But he vanished from their sight. They turned to each other and exclaimed,

Cleopas: "Wasn't it like a fire burning in us when he talked to us on the road and explained the Scriptures to us?"

Narrator: They got up at once and dashed back to Jerusalem. There they found the eleven and their friends all together, full of the news and saying, "The Lord is risen indeed! He has appeared to Simon!"

Then they told the story of their journey, and how they recognized Jesus when he broke the loaf.

Sermonette

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Imagine you're waiting in line outside the grocery store and somebody walks up to you.

You're probably surprised, and wondering how to keep your distance without being rude or losing your spot in line.

They stop at what used to be a normal distance and ask you what used to be a normal question... "What's going on?"

Not quite sure how to take that, you reply, "It's the COVID distancing rules."

"What's COVID?" he asks.

Can you imagine that?

because that's what Cleopas and his partner felt when this person joined them and hadn't heard about Jesus and his death.

Of course, it turns out that Jesus knows better what's going on than they do - and goes on to help them understand.

Jesus apparently gives them a big sermon with lots of Biblical examples - which is rather unusually for the Gospel According to Luke. Here we usually get Jesus telling stories about common everyday things that illustrates a greater truth.

However, while Cleopas gets a sermon, we get a story that illustrates greater truth... but what are we taught about God and Jesus?

Remember how Jesus enters the story? ... Two followers are walking down the road and Jesus calmly joins them. ⁴ Not as a Prince or King or 'Saviour of the Universe', but as an ordinary person - an equal even. This is a very ordinary act. God comes alongside us in ordinary activities.

I imagine they nod in greeting. Then Jesus acts ignorant of what's going on. Why would he do that? Well, it might be like I do with my kids, even my students when I was a teacher. I'd ask a question, knowing the answer, to allow them a chance to speak and share their thoughts and feelings. If we picture Jesus knowing everything, we also need to include that Jesus values our thoughts and feelings enough to ask and listen to them.

and Jesus patiently hears Cleopas out, as the story and feelings pour out. When they are ready, Jesus helps them. In this moment, it's helping understanding. Something I know some people are looking for right now. This is only one way Jesus helps; through his life we see him offering all sorts of ways.

God comes to us and offers help.

Which is amazing in several ways.

One I just touched on, God is the creator and ruler of everything, including us, and still reaches out to us. Not through a decree or by force, but by walking alongside us.

Another way is that our goodness and faith are not factors.

Cleopas and his partner were walking away. They had turned their backs and left.... and Jesus still joins them. I find that encouraging as I know I'm not perfect.

It also encourages me to ask questions - like those early followers. To wonder why things are the way they are. For us, why is there a pandemic? What's going on? Where are you God? Why do people

not listen and insist on doing things their way? Why do people walk away from God's love?

These followers, like so many since, have asked these questions when faced with uncertain times. They were probably wondering about being picked up by the authorities, if the biology of death had changed, and what to have faith in. We're wondering when we can see a dentist about tooth pain, whether to have faith in our politicians and neighbours, and when we can just get together.

And Jesus comes alongside.

Jesus listens - honouring where we are. and Jesus offers to help.

So, where is he?

That leads back to the question before the reading. How do you imagine Jesus? What do you imagine him doing?

For the followers in our story, they have Jesus talking with them, but don't recognize him until another ordinary event - sharing dinner. Then they realize and reflect on their experiences.

Do you stop and do that? Reflect on your experiences?

It's something I don't do enough of.

but when I do, I realize that Jesus is there to. In the care teams in the hospitals and nursing homes, in the neighbour who offer to pick up groceries, the child who draws a rainbow on the sidewalk, and the people calling others to let them know their not alone.

Because we never are.

To God be all the glory. Amen.

Responding to God

Activities

- create a word list describing God/Jesus/Holy Spirit. Put it into https://www.wordclouds.com/ (example of the sermon above)
- Design a boardgame⁵
 - You will need: different coloured card or paper; scissors; list of the book titles from the Older Testament; dice; pens; a bread roll or slice of bread (or a picture of one)

- Explain that two of Jesus' friends were joined on their walk home from Jerusalem on Easter Sunday by a stranger who explained who Jesus was, using books from the Old Testament, as we know it today – the bit of the Bible written before Jesus was born. Can you devise a boardgame where
 - I) the players have to get from Jerusalem to Emmaus,
 - 2) on the way, every Old Testament book needs to be used somehow on the journey, and
 - 3) to win the game, the player has to 'break the bread' in Emmaus.
- Talk about what stories you know from this part of the Bible.


- <u>Sunday, April 26</u> We pray for those suffering from various physical and mental issues that are being sidelined in this times.

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



