
Lord's Prayer (feel free to use another version/translation)

Intro to the readings

- Psalm 66 talks about God testing and listening to us. Note that this testing is like making silver - something that is hard, but also makes removes the impurities to leave the beauty.
- The book of Acts is the sequel to Luke. They were written by the same person. Luke starts with Mary and the birth of Jesus, and goes through to Jesus ascending to Heaven. Acts starts where it leaves off.

It's good to remember that the full name of the book of Acts is 'The Acts of the Apostles'.⁴

Sermonette

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

There's a lot of confusion about what's going on. Are stores and cafés reopening, or not? Do masks make us safe? (for how long?) If we have an outdoor party of only 3 families... where do we go to the bathroom?

I saw a press briefing with Dr. Falosi, of the White House coronavirus task-force. Well, not exactly. It was actually of Brad Pitt in a Saturday Night Live sketch. He played 'Dr. Falosi' helping clarify some statements made by the President - including a statement that there will be a vaccine relatively soon. Here's that clarification.

"Relatively soon is an interesting phrase. Relative to the entire history of earth, sure, the vaccine is going to come real fast. But if you were to tell a friend that you were going to come over relatively soon, and then showed up a year and a half later. Well, you're friend may be relatively upset."

There's lots of different perspectives and confusion.

It's the same in the passage from Acts.

The disciples' world has changed and would never go back to the way it was. This is more than 'will we shake hands.' Jesus had died... and then was back from the dead. Jesus was definitely the Messiah. Expectations grew. What could stop them now? Not even death!

Surely, this is the time when Jesus will call down the heavenly armies to kick out the Romans and make Israel great again.

'lesus,' they ask, 'are you going to do it now?'

and Jesus is patient. He doesn't roll his eyes and berate them for not paying attention. The disciples are confused. They don't have the right perspective.

They ask 'is this the time'... but Jesus has told them that the Kingdom of God is already growing - not like an armed rebellion, but like yeast growing in the dough until the nature of everything has changed.7

Where is this change happening? Will their kingdom be great again? Not exactly. The first place the change will happen is inside you. The Holy Spirit will come. And then, yes, the Kingdom of God (not Israel) will come in Jerusalem, but also Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.

They are also confused about how this will happen. They expect Jesus to do it. Jesus tells them that they will be the ones spreading the seeds of the Kingdom.

That's a lot of confusion.

Is it about our idea or God's? Is it about God doing for us, or with us?

It actually reminds me of what I've been hearing from health officials The leaders can't make the coronavirus stop spreading, it's the actions of the people - except we want to spread the Good News. I guess that would mean reversing the medical advice and making contact with others, walking with them, and talking to them face to face. Would it be too confusing to do both?

There's more confusion caused by the Biblical text - not so

much for them, but sometimes for us. Jesus tells them that they'll travel the world witnessing, but first, stay put - and then they see Jesus lifted up until a cloud took him from sight.8

Did Jesus just fly away?

Possibly not. What they were describing was Jesus going to be with God. Their perspective of the universe was that God lived in Heaven and that was up. Our description of the universe has changed. The Earth is round and in orbit around the sun, etc.



Does that mean Jesus is gone?

Definitely not. It means something far better and bigger. In the next chapter of Acts it talks about Jesus being at the right hand of God. This means that Jesus has gone from teaching this group of 100 or so disciples to exercising authority and influence over all places and people.

This is a passage with exciting stuff in it - great plans and expectations. Jesus had risen from the dead, returning to the disciples. Now he had risen from them to greater glory. And the followers are to tell the whole world about it.

Which is also an excellent idea for now.

The Holy Spirit has come, and we can keep spreading the Good News that Christ is with us and leading us into forming a better Kingdom. We can keep living into that way of life, and helping the world to change with us.

and we can do what those early disciples did before they went out - while they waited to go out into the world. We can pray.

We can pray together and apart,

we can pray with words, or silence,

with images or movement,

we can pray our joy and our anguish

our concerns and our gratitude.

We can pray big prayers for the Holy Spirit to fill us with God's vision and courage to seize opportunities to change the world to be a better place.

Sometimes life is confusing. The disciples found this. We find this. What they found, and we find to, is that Jesus is not gone, but has ascended. That you and I have a part to play in the Kingdom of God recreating the world. That sometimes our role is sharing, and sometimes it is staying home and praying.

To God be the glory.

Activities

- add more pray into your daily routine in a way that respects who you are. This may involve reading prayers, being silent, having background noise¹⁰, being still or (rocking, moving walking, knitting, ...), journaling, Make sure it's long enough that you run out of things to say and have to listen - which is a balancing act between the Spirit nudging you and you distracting yourself.
- Next week is Pentecost. That when the Holy Spirit



descends on the disciples like wind and fire (Acts 2). I'd like to invite you to come up with a way to show/celebrate this. 


Prayer Partnership


