Listening to God

Prayer

Lord, open our hearts and minds by the power of your Holy Spirit, that as th Scriptures are read and your Word is explored, we may hear with joy what you say to us today. Amen.

Intro to the readings

• Last week we read from Acts of the Apostles about Jesus telling them to wait in Jerusalem for the coming of the Holy Spirit - and that about 100 men & women, young & old prayed and waited. A small section about them choosing a replacement for Judas was skipped.



Now we read about what the Spirit filled experience was like. (picture: *Open Heaven* by Tim Steward)

 Paul reminds the Corinthians that God's Spirit works in each of us differently, giving us different experiencing, but that we are still one church

Reading: Please look up the passages in your own Bible,³ or click on the name to be taken to an online version (NRSV).

Acts 2: 1-12 (13-21)
1 Corinthians 12: 3b-13

Message: What does this thing mean?⁴

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Voice I:

Pentecost.

What an amazing day.

A day that needs describing - who knows if it would ever come again?

There was a

'... a noise that sounded like a strong wind blowing'.

But that's not to say there was a strong wind blowing that day. 'They saw what looked like tongues of fire.'

But that's not to say there were flames burning brightly that day. These were the nearest words they could find to describe their strange experience. That gathering of what became the church had to scramble and feel around to find a way of communicating what they had encountered, for it left them amazed. And so they kept on asking each other: 'What does this thing mean?'

But it is little wonder they chose to speak about it in terms of the wind.

Voice 2:

For there's the huge destructive power of the wind:

- strong enough to invert umbrellas and flip tables
- strong enough to lift the roofs off houses revealing what's inside
- strong enough to blow down trees a hundred feet tall.
- driving flood waters to places they have no business to be
- · smashing up crops until there is nothing left to eat.

Voice 3:

The power of the wind; the power of the Holy Spirit of God in people:

- causing lives to be turned inside out and upside down
- dismantling rigid, brittle opinion

- demolishing proud ego and self-importance and self-centredness
- · sweeping away deep prejudices and greed
- · crushing our ability to depend on ourselves.

Little wonder, when they came face-to-face with the power of God that day, they compared it to the power of the wind.

Voice 2:

There's the gradual coaxing of the wind:

- · nudging plants so they grow at an unexpected angle
- eroding rock-faces until they take on a different shape
- causing sailing boats to follow a particular path.

Voice 3:

The gradual coaxing of the wind; the gradual coaxing of the Holy Spirit of God in people:

- amending and reshaping individuals,
 so they do their thinking in a different kind of way
- wearing down what is unhelpful and rough until the face of love is recognized and more obviously seen
- provoking thoughts, and suggesting, and pointing folk heavenwards;
 until they are convinced a more Christ-like method, a more God-like way, is what's best for the sake of this world.

Little wonder, when they came face-to-face with the coaxing of God that day, they compared it to the coaxing of the wind.

Voice 2:

But there's also the creative ability of the wind:

- picking up dandelion seeds, and carrying them so new life can take root
- cooling down atmospheres so living is more possible under a baking, boiling sun
- · shifting mountain-loads of sand in deserts to create new

- contours, bringing variety in creation
- drying up the heavy rains, so crops might grow and flourish, and people can eat, and their bellies are filled, and their hunger is satisfied.

Voice 3:

The creative ability of the wind; the creative ability of the Holy Spirit of God in people:

- planting seeds of compassion and mercy, enabling gentleness to be born again, and willingly shared
- inspiring sacrifice and goodwill and generosity
- moving mountains of prejudice, so that beauty and tenderness can breathe and thrive
- tidying up the rubbish and debris which exists inside us; washing us clean; making us whole; scrubbing us bright.

Little wonder, when they came face-to-face with the creative ability of God that day,

they compared it to the creative ability of the wind.

Voice I:

Amazed, they kept on asking each other: 'What does this thing mean?'
Amazed, they could only attempt to find approximate words to explain their encounter with the God-Spirit. And so there's little wonder they spoke about it in terms of the wind. It's also little wonder they spoke about it in terms of burning fire.



Voice 4:

For a fire can be a life-force:

- flames that dance, their lively movements invite, restore and revive.
- · warmth sustains and encourages growth
- heat that can make food easier for us to eat, and perform miracles like changing dough into bread

Voice 5:

The life-giving fire; the life-giving Holy Spirit of God for people:

- renewing body and soul and spirit when we're low
- showing new purpose, providing fresh meaning, establishing cause
- turning us into something that can bring nourishment to others. Little wonder, when they came face-to-face with the life-force of God that day, they compared it to flames of a burning fire.

Voice 4:

But like the wind, a fire can also destroy:

- solid rocks are melted to liquid
- great forests are scorched, and history turned to ash
- proud structures are demolished, reduced to no more than rubble
- goods gathered disappear, no longer able to be owned and enjoyed.

Voice 5:

The fire that destroys; the paradoxical, destructive force of the Holy Spirit of God for people:

- melting, moulding, transforming stony hearts,
 until graciousness and gentleness becomes the new response
- old ways of living wiped out, vaporized, leaving space for new ways to be born
- evil systems and wicked regimes suffocated and starved of oxygen, enabling nobler methods and higher values to have their chance.

Little wonder then that, when they came face-to-face with the destructive force of God that day, they compared it to a burning fire.

Voice 4:

But a fire that burns gives light:

- a torch to light a path
- a candle-flame that stands as a symbol
- a brightness when all around is cold and dark.
- a beacon on a hilltop

Voice 5:

The light-producing fire; the light-producing Holy Spirit of God, in and for people:

- guiding our choice through the maze and the mess that living can be
- burning brightly, like an eternal flame amid hopelessness and despair
- showing <u>God</u>ness as an ever-present option and possibility
- establishing hope and drawing us on with the promise of heaven.

Little wonder, when they came face-to-face with the light of God that day, they compared it to the light of a burning fire.

Voice I:

Amazed, they kept on asking: 'What does it mean?'
Those first believers did well to speak about God in terms of wind.
Isn't the power, the coaxing and the creating of that Pentecostal Spirit is still known to you and me?

Do you remember a time:

- when you were forced into overcoming your own thoughts, feelings - prejudice
- when you were coaxed into becoming generous, while your instinct was to have and to hold and keep for yourself
- when self-centredness and ego was deflated even blown apart
- when the spirit of creation fanned within you the gentle seeds of compassion,
 - and love was reborn, and beauty and truth could breathe again?

And they did well to speak about God in terms of fire. Isn't the life-giving, life-changing, light-providing force of that Pentecostal Spirit is still known to you and me?

Do you remember a time:

- when a sense of what God stands for and demands helped you decide what choice to make
- when you saw your purpose and place as a beloved child of God more clearly,
 - when your depression abated because of a promise and a hope and a certainty that the uncomfortable present is not all there is
- when you were surprised at yourself, because gifts the goodness - which had lain dormant and unused within you, no longer deprived of oxygen, was fed and nourished, so that wind and fire was passed on to others through you?



Pentecost.

What an amazing day.

A day that needs describing - who knows if it would ever come again?

Well, it does.

It wasn't just a spectacular kick off for the new church. The dynamic divine Spirit something that never fades, or blows out, or dies.

All of us, every single one of us, whether we know it or not, are affected daily, even now, by this huge force, this great influence of good, which is nothing other than that same Spirit of God the first church experienced when they gathered together on that very first Pentecost day.

'What does it mean?'

Basically, whenever somebody feels hope,

or their place as a loved child of God

or has the urge to sacrifice to make the world better,

then the Spirit is blowing.

Pentecost is happening again.

To God be the glory.

Tuesday, June 2 We thank God for worship and music leaders who give their time and gifts to support the worship of God.


Wednesday, June 3 We pray for graduating students of our theological colleges, asking for guidance as they seek to serve in the ministries to which God has called them.

Breathe on Me, Breath of God



In both Hebrew and Greek, the words for "spirit" can equally well be translated as "breath" or "wind," so it is very appropriate to address the Holy Spirit as the "Breath of God." This tune by an English organist has become the customary one in North American hymnals.
