Intro to the readings

 Reading from Genesis continues right after last week's passage. There Sarah's jealousy of her husband's first son, born



through her slave Hagar, grows and she has Hagar & Ishmael kicked out. Now we find out what happened to them²

 Today's psalm can be thought of as a prayer, and it's where we'll be spending most of our attention. Would you pray this prayer?

Message: A psalms way to pray

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Assuming you were able to focus with the heat, what did you think of the psalm as a prayer?

Is it how you pray?

Telling God to listen to you?

Telling God to make you happy?

complaining about people in your life?

asking for a sign?

It reminds me of my kids recent way of asking for things. "I want ___, I want ___, I want ___." They just demand it.

Is that how you pray?

I know some people who do pray that bluntly, and others who would find it very uncomfortable.

There are several things that influence this.

One is that our society encourages us not to complain. Part of this is because it's nice for us. It can be a real drag when somebody complains all the time - although somebody who is always cheerful can feel fake... and may also be annoying when you don't feel the cheer.

A friend of my sisters experienced this from the other side. They met when my sister studied in the Maritimes. When Sarah moved to Ottawa she started going to my sisters church. She also wrestled with a lot of health issues and adapting to the new city. When people asked how she was doing, she told them with all honesty how she was struggling. She soon felt unwelcome. She felt hat she was disturbing the image the congregation had that

Christians must be happy. After all, God would look after everything.

It was like her suffering was shaking their faith.

Another impact of our society that makes this sort of prayer awkward is that we are given the dream to be self-reliant; to pull ourselves up by our bootstraps. Going to somebody for help is a sign of weakness. A variation on this that I've heard a lot, is that you don't want to be a bother or a burden on somebody else.

I suppose it shows great faith in yourself that you'll be able to handle anything and do everything, but not much faith in the idea of community or others.

This psalm encourages a different sort of relationship; one that is direct and honest. But is it faithful?

Yes - and not just because it's in the Bible.

When my kids turn to me and say, "I want __," they're not just being impolite. They are showing their belief that I can take their request and do something about it. They have faith in me. It can come across as rude or disrespectful, but it is also faith.

It's the same with this type of prayer. Being direct and honest with God in prayer shows that you have faith that God can both handle your feelings & thoughts, and do something about it.

Expressing these feelings of frustration, resentment and anger can be an important step. Some people aren't bothered by much. They encounter somebody mean or selfish and they just let it role off. For others it eats away at them. They need to let it go - to give it up to somebody else, and God can always take it.

Now, God may not respond the way the person demands. With the boys, I (usually) insist that they say 'please' and 'thank you'. Even then, I don't always do what they ask. I can see the world differently than they can: like how a sweet snack will affect their dinner, or how if we don't stop reading books and sleep we'll not be able to enjoy tomorrow. Things they'll learn at some point.

The scholars, the learned ones, all note that this is a psalm of lament, and that it includes lines from all over the Hebrew Bible. The person writing it knew their stuff... and still they pray:

"Teach me your way, O LORD, that I may walk in your truth" It's a good reminder that we all have more to learn - and to have faith that the LORD is the one who with the best way.

It's something I pray for.

Do you pray to learn more?

One thing I think the writer struggles with is that we are all God's children. And while the psalmist is right, that God is "merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness" with the psalmist - God is also that way with others... even those we might want to curse. Like the writer of this, and many other psalms, we should still take it all to the LORD in prayer. Telling God will help you, especially with prayer.

And God will work in the situation to bring about justice - though likely not as you imagine.

Something the psalmist knows is important is focusing on God. The insolent are criticized for 'not setting you before them.' Not putting God first and 'walking in God's truth,' leads to

a divided heart and life out of sync with the deep wholeness found with God. It's something the writer prays about, "give me an undivided heart to revere your name." It's something I pray about too. The world is full of distractions. We can be full of distractions - to the point were we can't see our own faults. Something I think the psalmist still needs to learn.

There's one more thing we need to be reminded of by this prayer in the psalms. That as much as it includes blunt demands of God, and ignores that the enemy is being criticized for things the psalmist does as well, and that it starts with several 'God you should help me because I deserve it' statements... the tone shifts. It goes from self praise to God praise. It attempts to describe God. Do you do that?

The experience of God here is personal - "you are my God" and gracious and merciful and doing wondrous things and showing a love that never fades and is always faithful.

I like the psalms. There's variety, honesty, and they're full of good reminders.

Often I think we feel faith is quietly accepting God and lead us. That's not wrong... but it's not the only expression of faith. This psalm is one that shows a faith that isn't quiet. It actively takes specific issues up with God in an 'open and honest' way. We can say to God, "I want ___," while also recognizing the awesome qualities of God and our need for help to walk in The Way.

In the name of God the Creator, God the Son & God the Holy Spirit - three in One. Amen.

Values: What aspect of today's psalm do you value/appreciate? Actions: The psalmist includes all sorts of words describing God. How would you describe God in words? or express God with your body? or with paint? or baking? Is there a piece of music that expresses God to you?

Etching: How would you describe your relationship/faith with God at the moment? Is it more quiet acceptance, blunt

questions, ...?

Wonder: Thinking of Sarah & Hagar, and the writer of Psalm 86 and their opponents, wonder together how we could change ourselves to understand the perspective of somebody different. Share a specific example that you struggle with. How could society get better at this?
