Intro to the readings

• Our main passage today doesn't start here, so here's a bit of the back story.

What comes before... Sarah's Story³

My name is Sarah. Wife to Abraham. Mother to Isaac. People look up to me. They give me gifts and treat me with respect. But it wasn't always easy, and I'm not proud of some of the things I did.

I rejoiced to be married to Abraham, all those years ago in the land of my people. He was a man of vision. An adventurer. I delighted to join in his adventure. I was not like my friends who had settled into boring lives in Ur. I was a partner in my husband's quest and we both enjoyed the travelling and the uncertainty. I was relieved not to have become pregnant immediately. A child would have complicated things so. But the years went by and we travelled on and there was still no child.

Then God started to talk to Abraham. And Abraham told me what God said: How we would be the parents of a great nation, more numerous than the grains of sand by the far off sea. But still there was no child. We were still partners in an adventure. But I would catch him looking at me with bewilderment. He would go into the emptiness of the desert and this God of his would tell him all over again that he would have a child. But God never spoke to me about it. Every month I hoped; and every month I knew myself to have failed.

So I decided one day that I had to take charge of my life before it fell apart altogether. God insisted that Abraham was going to have descendants, but didn't do anything about it: I had better organise something. So I suggested a surrogacy. I had a young slave who was of childbearing years. Let her provide Abraham and me with a child. The baby would be ours as the slave was ours. I

told Abraham that God would want us to use our initiative so that God's plan could work out, and he was easily persuaded. Hagar, that was her name, conceived immediately. And my world changed. As I watched her young body swell with the child that should have been mine I was consumed with resentment. I hated her. I am not proud of how I behaved at that time. I know I made life unbearable for her - so unbearable that at one point she actually ran away. She and the child she was carrying.

At last the child was born. Ishmael, 'God hears'. Named because Hagar had discovered that God heard her and answered her when she cried to him for help. Why did God not speak to me?

'This is my son, Ishmael. May he live in your sight,' Abraham told God. 'Yes,' said God. 'But he is not the one.' But God said nothing to me.

Then one day we had visitors. . .

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

What stood out for you in the passages?

Specifically the one about Sarah & Abraham? . . .

Last time I preached on this passage it was all about the hospitality to strangers. Abraham says he'll bring a little water and bread, and brings them a feast for a king. Which is the polar opposite to what his guests will experience next in Sodom.

This time, what stood out was the laugh.

"Sarah laughed to herself."

I wondered why.

Why did this stand out for me? Perhaps it's because after about 3 months of physical distancing and about 3 weeks of protests about systemic injustice I could use a laugh.

but I also wondered about Sarah's laugh.

I wonder what sort of laugh it was? . . .

Was this a laugh of joy? Happiness bubbling up from her belly at the thought of her childhood dream coming true?

Was this a laugh of relief that she would finally be able to fulfill her duty in providing a son to her husband?

Was this a laugh of surprise? Perhaps Abraham hadn't told her about God's promise in the previous chapter to have a son - and how he had laughed in response to that. Perhaps the surprise was that one of these strangers would say she's to have a child.

Maybe the laugh was past surprise and into disbelief. Was this really the time that God was going to give them a son? Now that

she's well past childbearing years. This is ridiculous!



and perhaps the laugh was even beyond that. Perhaps it was a response to the years and years of disappointment & frustration in herself and in the eyes of her husband. The years of pity or mocking in the eyes of others. The years of pain and suffering. With a body well past children, she'd probably become resigned to this pain... and now this stranger says, "I'll be by again next year, and by then I know Sarah will have a son."

Really?! After all these years? What's God playing at? What's with the wait?

I don't know if she asked that question, but I think it's a good one.

There are times in the Bible were God waits before helping, such as when the Israelites became slaves in Egypt. And then there's God leading them the long way through the desert to the Promised Land. The explanation is that they were learning to depend on God and not on their own strength. Another way of

looking at it is that they were learning to be a part of God's team, and not to strike out on their own.

There's a lot of speculation on why Jesus hasn't returned yet and ended this age. An answer that makes sense to me is that we are still practising how to live God's way. I also usually take to heart Jesus saying not to worry about it.

Now, Abraham & Sarah weren't perfect, but nobody in the Bible is - except Jesus. God still works with people. And as for the idea that they need to learn to depend on God, well, they've been following God's directions. Why the wait for the promise to be fulfilled - especially when this causes suffering?

It reminds me of the promise that African Americans were made for equality many many years ago. 5 How long O God? 6 And there's the promise in Canada that all people will be treated equally. How long O God? Both these promises were made by people - but Lord, you promise that one day there will be justice for all. How long O God?

Paul's letter to the Romans recognizes that there will be suffering in following God - and I don't find his words particularly comforting: that our suffering produces endurance, which produces character, which produces hope.

We can't tell Sarah, 'chin up dear, your suffering is going to make you stronger and give you hope.' That would be horrible and it's not Paul's point. I think we need to remember that Paul is talking from the perspective of somebody experiencing the suffering. This isn't some answer that can be applied by somebody outside the experience. And Paul has another point. That it's about experiencing God.

Which is something we can bring back to Sarah's story.

She might tell us about this experience of how God surprised her with the promise in the first place, and then surprised her again by keeping that promise in a way she never imagined. It was so crazy, she laughed to herself.

And that with God, nothing is 'to yourself'. God knew. and God didn't let it slip past. That said, Sarah wasn't punished for laughing, or lying about it. I can even imagine God



having a smile while saying, "Oh yes, you did laugh."

And while I'll never find out what sort of laugh Sarah had, I do take some comfort that God follows through on promises; that God did break the norms of the society and speak to Sarah; and the endurance and character I see in Sarah, and numerous other seniors I know, despite their suffering.

Perhaps Paul was right. This give me hope, and sometimes a laugh.

Etching: What promise of God do you most want to see happen?

Actions: Is God calling us to participate in helping the promise

you thought of happen? or is this something we need to

leave up to God?

- While it's hard to share a meal with people, brainstorm how else you could show hospitality.
- You don't need to physically join the protests against injustice (thinking of concerns about the coronavirus), you can write letters to politicians and other leaders.
