

Teaching us the depth of your love, and inviting us to be filled with your love and to share it.


But too often we ignore you

Intro to the readings

 This passage is the end of the Gospel According to Matthew.

Reading: Please look up the passages in your own Bible,² or click on the name to be taken to an online version (NRSV).

Matthew 28: 16-20

Message: Being with us

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

For just 4 verses, there's a lot in that passage (22 pages worth in my commentary). Jesus' first teaching in Matthew is the Sermon on the Mount, and now the disciples are back on a mount with Jesus. They worship him, but some have doubts. They wonder what the future holds. Where will Jesus be?

Jesus tells them to go make disciples, to be teachers like him, and to baptize "in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" - which is why this passage shows up today.

This is the lectionary year for Matthew, but the year is far from over. Why do we have the last passage in the gospel? Because it is

Being with us

Trinity Sunday - and this is a pretty clear statement of the Trinity.

There isn't much in the Bible directly about the Trinity. We're told of people's experiences with God - recognized and named in various ways. This continued in the Early Church - experiences of the Spirit, memories of Jesus, and an awareness of God the Creator/Father/Lord of all. Which is where the concept of the Trinity comes from; their experience of 'God with us.'

Which is all very nice for the disciples in this passage, having the resurrected Jesus standing with them and teaching them.

Lately, my boys have been asking, "where is God?" They are old enough to know that God is supposed to be around, "But why can't we see God? Why can't we hear God?" They are comparing their lives to the Bible stories and are wondering, 'where is God?' They're looking for wonders like the parting of the Red Sea taking the slaves to freedom, or simply Jesus hanging out and talking to us like a neighbour or teacher.

They're not the only ones. For several months people have been wondering why God could be letting the pandemic happen. Now, with the protest following yet another tragic death of a black person, people are wondering 'where is God?'

How would you answer?

I listened to an interview with the Rev. Dr. Dwight Radcliff,³ a professor and pastor. He shared some of his experiences being black. Once, when his car stopped working on the way to church he put the blinkers on. A police car stopped. They approached with their guns pointed at the car.

And this doesn't just happen in the States. I was told this week about an incident in Montreal. The person, white, I was talking to was driving home with his foster brother-in-law, black. The car stopped working. He put the blinkers on and a cop pulled up. The cop refused to help and issued him a ticket for blocking traffic. My friend responded by using some not very polite language. Later, his foster brother shared how scared he was. "Why?" "Because if I'd done that there would have been 5 cars and I'd be on the ground with guns at my head."

Back to Dr Radcliff. As well educated and successful black man living in a quiet neighbourhood. He does not assume there is safety. Even before Ahmaud Arbery was shot in February while jogging in his quiet neighbourhood for being black, they lived with a constant tension of fear. If he takes longer getting groceries than expected, his wife worries.

When there's talk of systemic racism, I think this is more what is meant. Not that it's intentional, but that it's so present in the lives of the victims.

I came across another example from a preacher reading the scripture before preaching and seeing his daughter sitting in the pew. The passage said, "I am dark <u>but</u> lovely." They were both dark skinned and it hurt him to read that before his daughter. Was the Bible saying it's hard to be lovely if you're dark? Doing some research, it is just as valid for the passage to be translated as "I am dark <u>and</u> lovely." That is how the translation we usually use is, but others differ. Is the world view of the white male translators from times past influencing scripture and our view of the world.⁵

Where is God?

Song of Songs 1:5.

Can we turn to the Bible?

Yes, it's written and translated by people, but inspired by God... and shares experiences with where God is.

Here are some other passages that come to mind.

Psalm 25: 16-22

The Psalm affirms that the feelings of isolation and shame are not new, nor the violence. It helps us to realize that we don't need to be happy all the time. Sometimes the situation demands other feelings. It also suggests that God is who you can turn to perhaps the only one you can turn toand that there is hope.

and the victim is not the only one frustrated - angry.

Listen to this passage in which the prophet Amos is talking about those who have choices, ie. power. It comes from before they are led into exile. The gate mentioned was were justice cases were heard (like a court house).

Amos 5: 10-15

A little further down, God, through Amos, even says, Don't give me those offerings. I don't even want your songs. "But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream."

And God doesn't just sit back giving speaches.

When I was putting together the Good Friday service, I found a script with numerous different views from people leading to the crucifixion - including Simon of Cyrene.⁶ I'd never looked up where that was before this year. It's in North Africa, part of Lybia. The script makes the point that he was black, and had probably been chosen from the crowd because of that. Then, like now,

would it be good for a black man to argue with a soldier or police officer?

Mark 15: 15-24

and where is God? God is present in Jesus, another person from an oppressed people suffering from injustice. Showing that God is not ignorant or afraid of injustice - even if it means defying authority and risking serious (fatal) responses.

And the story doesn't end here. It also shows that God is not defeated.

and in Matthew's Gospel, the story continues until the verse we started with. It continues with a statement about God the Father, God the Son and God the Spirit. And it ends with these words. "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Jesus reminds us, "I am with you."
In good times and bad,
I am with you.

You... and you and you and you...

It's easy to take a passage in which Jesus is speaking to the gathered disciples and apply it to you. But remember it applies to anybody. To the people in your house, and your neighbours, and those who think, behave and look different. Even those who annoy you.

As I said, our boys are starting to ask "where is God?" It would be easy if we could say, 'in that house over there. That's God's

house.' - but that's not how it is. That's not how we experience God.

Instead we experience God as a leader, demanding justice for the vulnerable. We experience God as Jesus, who is not afraid to be with those who suffer. We experience God's Spirit, who works in and through us... and other people as well.

A last story. Somebody I knows was crossing the street here at Sherbrooke and Grande. As they were, a woman was struggling across with some bags. It looked like she would struggled walking even without the bags. She was black. He, a white man, offered to help. She politely turned him down. When the bus arrived he let her on first. When he got on he saw that the seat for seniors was taken by a couple of kids in private school uniforms. He asked them to move and pointed out the sign. They were bemused. He asked again. They told him where to go. He replied that if they didn't let her have the seat he'd get off at their stop and they wouldn't sit for a week. (I don't agree with that bit.) After taking a step closer, they moved. The woman couldn't believe someone had stood up for her. The rest of the bus applauded.

I don't think anybody in that story acted perfectly as God would want them to - but I do think God was there in the impulse to look after those in need - and in the people who recognized that was the right thing to do... even if they hadn't acted on it.

Where is God? God is experienced in many ways - and so we talk about the Trinity. With the boys we don't get into long explanations. We invite the boys to know that God gives instructions on how to live with others, that God is in the joys they see and feel, and with them when they are afraid or sad, and

that God's Spirit in them and the people around them.

in the name of God the Father/Mother, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

Activities

- Look for issues of injustice that you think should be changed.
 They could be issues liked to race, age, mental health, working conditions, community rules (official or not), environmental.

- Talk about these issues with your friends and neighbours.
- Pray about them, asking for intervention, and courage if God chooses to use you.

These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies.

Memories: Share the memory of a time when you experienced or witnessed negative/hurtful treatment because of your race, gender, age, 'class', ...

Etching: Share about a time when you experienced or witnessed somebody standing up for another. How did that impact you? Have you done it?

Wonder: What would it be like if we recognized God in everyone? If everyone treated everyone with respect? If we were prepared for God to speak from anyone?


Actions: How could you help make the world a better place this week? (Hold each other accountable)

Sunday, June 7 - Enelesi's Field When Enelesi Daniel's house collapsed because of Cyclone Idai, she and her four children were forced to seek shelter outside a school for three months. They lost their entire harvest and livestock. At the camp, Enelesi was able to



register for a Presbyterian World Service & Development (PWS&D) food assistance project. With the food assistance, the family could eat twice a day, enabling the children to go to school and Enelesi to work her fields. "The project has made a difference because I could actually farm in my own field. I am so grateful because I could do my own farming," shared Enelesi.

Tuesday, June 9 - We pray for those suffering because of isolation.


Wednesday, June 10 - We pray for students in rural and remote summer placements. May this be a time of joy and learning.
