

Message: Growing

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Parables are great ways to teach. They are memorable (we're created for stories), and are vague enough to force us to think.

That said, a parable about farming 2000 years ago may not be quite the same for you and I as it was to the original listeners. What if we update it? How would you tell the parable now?

There was a really great pub in town. The food was good, but the atmosphere was magical. The afternoons were quiet and perfect for doing some writing, or reading a book. As the afternoon was ending it became a place where families came for a meal with the kids, which then shifted to the adults without kids... and then as the evening carried on the band would come in and the dancing started. The Master's Pub was a hub of the community.

And then COVID hit. The pub was closed. Everyone missed it. But numbers dropped and rules changed. The exciting news spread that it was reopening. Everybody wanted a turn, but caution was needed. Patrons were all asked the questions coming in. There was spacing of the tables, and no sitting at the bar. It was different, but still good. There was even music and dancing, for those who lived together.

And then the news hit. The Coronavirus had struck. How had this happened? Nobody had admitted to having symptoms or being at risk? Blame flew. It must have been the reckless youth. It must have been the kids from day camps. It must have been The Master not running a good operation.

Everyone was isolated. In the end those without where allowed to carry on, and those who had it... well, they had it.

It's not a perfect parallel, but it brings out some good points. Such as, there are people who aren't taking the virus seriously and are spreading it, usually unintentionally. This is making life harder for the rest of us. It's like the weeds in the parable making life harder for the wheat. To make matters worse, if you were to harvest the weed referred to in the parable, it usually contains a fungus that can make people so sick they die. If you were to judge based on what happens, well, it's not always good.

In both versions of the parable, the Master doesn't cause the problem. This isn't some plot to create herd immunity. What is different is that in the version Jesus tells it's clear that it is done intentionally by 'the enemy'.

Jesus has referred to 'the enemy' before this story. Back in chapter 5 Jesus tells us to love our enemies. To care for and want the best for our enemies. This is hard! In chapter 10 Jesus tells the disciples that the enemy will include members of their family. This is heartbreaking. Jesus also warns them to look out of the wolf in sheep's clothing. Dealing with 'the enemy' is hard and complicated.

One of the complications is that it's difficult to tell who is and who isn't, or in the case of COVID, who has it and who doesn't. We've all heard stories of people who had COVID, but didn't have all the symptoms, or any symptoms. There's also the other

side; it's possible to have a cough or a queasy stomach and not have COVID. Thinking of the original parable, there's trying to decide who's evil and should be cut out and burned. Did the person just cough, or was it a COVID cough?

For me, it's one of the reassuring aspects of this teaching. It's not up to us to decide somebody's final judgment. Just like leaving a COVID diagnosis to the experts, we leave the final judgment to the Master.

What do we do?

In the new version we all went into isolation until we could see who was good and who wasn't. In the original, the weeds were allowed to grow until the crop was ready - until the final fruit was ready to help or hurt.

and if we don't live in a parable? It looks like we try to love our enemies, while being wary that their roots may choke us if we're not careful. We also trust that in the end things will be sorted out, those with good fruit will go on and the bad will be burned.

What's the good fruit?

That's another story, but if you were to flip ahead to chapter 22 you'll hear Jesus' answer. "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind" and "You shall love your neighbour as yourself."

Which, like a parable, is both vague and demanding at the same time. Exactly how do you do that? It'll vary depending on how God created you and what your situation is. It's also an excellent question.

And it leads into another aspect of the parable. Something that interpreters have talked about since the beginning is what the field represents. Is it the world in which there is good and evil done by the devil and people. This is the perspective we've taken

so far. Or is the field the church... which for me isn't much different except that we tend to expect the church and the people in it to be better than we usually are.

or is the field a person? Is it you? Are there good seeds in you planted by God trying to bear fruit, and bad seeds struggling for attention as well? Can you always tell the difference? Maybe others can help?


This is another part of what I find reassuring about this parable. God knows what's in my heart, mind and soul - better than I do. It is God who will judge. And something that is also obvious from Jesus taking the time later in the chapter to explain the parable to the disciples, and all the teaching that goes on in the Bible... and since... is that God not only judges, but also helps us to grow in healthy ways.

And growing is a part of this parable. A part that didn't translate well into my version. Jesus starts by saying, "The Kingdom of Heaven is like..." and goes on to describe a crop that is growing from it's seeds until it's harvest. The Kingdom of Heaven is a process that allows us all to develop into something better for all.

One last thing that I find reassuring, that I also don't think came across well. The final judgment is God's, and God cares for us and wants the best for us.

Can you create a parable that shows these things? That God doesn't cause the evil in the world or us. That we shouldn't judge others, but God will. and that God knows us and loves us.

To God be all the glory Amen.

In Haiti, more than half of the total population is chronically undernourished, the majority of whom are children. Drastic, unpredictable weather changes caused by climate change have left many families food insecure. Many are not able to produce enough nutritious food for their families to consume. 

**Thursday, July 23** We pray for the presbyteries as their moderators, clerks and members seek ways to support each other and to support congregations within their ministries with care and wisdom.


**Friday, July 24** We pray for ministers, elders and church workers who are taking much-needed vacations. May they be refreshed and re-energized.

**Saturday, July 25** We pray for the ministries and mission of the Presbytery of Kootenay.


