Psalm 65 Isaiah 55

Message: Forecast of Hope

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

What a wonderful world. God pouring down blessings enriching the world causing it to grow with joy and peace...

It is possible that you are sitting in a comfortable spot with a deep sense of peace and joy. If so, please dose off for the next few minutes.

It's also possible that you aren't feeling that way right now. There's been the difficulty with the heat, and the isolation, and the fear of COVID, and the news that is always feeding us situations that are missing joy and peace, ... and then there's whatever else is going on in your life. Where are these blessings? How come the world isn't like the picture we just heard from the Bible? Who are these passages for anyway?

Which is always a good question. Isaiah was delivering a message from God to Israelites in exile - an exile that had already been going on for decades. As much as they might have tried to stay together, the reason the Assyrians had taken them into exile was to blend them into the great melting pot of the Empire. There are stories in the Bible, like Daniel and the Lion's den, of

the struggle to keep their ways. The story of Ester reveals violent antisemitism. The young adults who had been born in exile may have wondered who they were - whose they were. The local god or the God of their ancestors... who seems to have been defeated... or was it all part of the plan?

And they hear the words that God offers them food & drink, joy & peace. I wonder if they were confused. I wonder if they wished for this to be true. I wonder if this forecast gave them hope.

I've heard it said that giving somebody hope is to give them a new vision for the future. I believe that is what is going on here. The psalm and passage from Isaiah are not trying to describe the world we live in, they are trying to give us a vision for what God is recreating the world to be.

We are told in both passages about God's forgiveness, and about God coming to the world and watering it so that there will be abundant growth. The chapter in Isaiah starts with an invitation to everybody who is thirsty or hungry to have their fill-free of charge.

These sentiments are very different from other gods in the region. They only cared about their own pleasure. Their followers of these other gods might benefit, but most likely not.

Yaweh, the God of their ancestors, was different. The Lord of lords cared about them, promised to always be with them, and to lead them to a better way. Their God is like rain: refreshing, abundant & life-giving.

Did they wonder about these words? I imagine it was hard to see while living through the troubles.

This week Markus asked me why he can't see the plants growing. He knows they grow. He's leaned about it on the Magic School Bus, but when he sits down and looks closely, he doesn't see any growth.

Is that what the Israelites wondered about God's word. We hear it, but how come we don't see the change or good times?

Of course, life had changed. They were learning some humility, among other things they may not have noticed. And God was at work. Like the rain and snow that comes down to nourish the crops. We don't see the water bringing life and hope, joy and peace, to the plants. Still, God is recreating the world to be better.

Which is all very nice, but it's still hard to remember this when surrounded by situations that bring frustration or pain. God recognizes this and had Isaiah gives the the reminder to look to nature. It's an example that works for me. I like being around people, but sitting by a river or lake, seeing the light dance on the water, hearing the waves and birds, feeling the caress of the breeze and warm sun; ...it fills me with peace. It reminds me of God's presence in the world, and what God is doing - even if some beer tins are dumped down the shoreline.

What about you?

Now, while I won't test you, but please try to think of specific examples to the next batch of questions.

Where do you feel God's presence?

Is it in nature? Perhaps for you it's in a place that is orderly - or in creating order, like cleaning or doing a puzzle. Perhaps it's in doing something creative, or active, or with others. . .

Who do you feel is experiencing the peace and joy of God? Whose life reflects the presence of the Spirit? It could be somebody you know in person, or through a book or blog or radio or podcast. For me, it includes some people I've never met, such as authors Madeline L'Engle and Eugene Peterson, as well as those I have, such as the senior members of this congregation. Who do you feel reflects the Holy Spirit? They would be good to

spend more time with, because this will provide the Spirit with another way to nourish you - more water for your soul.

Where can you see signs of God's work?

In nature... In the community...

Where is a seed spouting? Is this something that you can can share with others?

Are there signs of Life in your life? in you?

Because some people may be so wrapped up in their pain that they may not see the signs of God's presence. God might invite you, like Isaiah, to share your witness of the Living God in your life.

Because while we can be like Markus, and not see the growth no mater how hard we look, God is changing the world for the better. As God says through Isaiah,

My word that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it. and you shall go out in joy, and be led back in peace; the mountains and the hills before you shall burst in song, and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands.

To God be all the glory Amen.

- the treasure stored in every human life. . . .


We pray for others, God our Savior, accepting your love in Jesus Christ for the whole world and committing ourselves to care for those around us in his name.
