Intro to the readings

- The chapter before this focused on Jesus telling the disciples about the hard things that would happen when they go out to spread the word. In this chapter he is responding to questions about John the Baptist and the state of society.
- There's a line about not telling the wise. Jesus seems to talk to those considered wise, like the Pharisees, but they don't understand. I suspect that is the interpretation for that.

John the Baptist (Jesus MAFA)

Message: Seeing the obvious

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

If you had to guess how God would come into the world, what would you do? How would you describe the event? What would God look like?

Would God be an old white man with a beard down to his knees? Would God be grumpy, yelling at people to change their ways? Maybe dressed in an odd collection of uncomfortable cloths and living on the edge between civilization and social wilderness?



or would God be hip and fun? Going to parties and connecting with people - maybe even sneaking in some more refreshments if there's a danger of running out?

Which way would God come?

Those two descriptions are how people apparently saw John & Jesus. Which was closer to your vision?

There's the aloof or elite approach of John. He demands a lot... going out to the edge of civilization; hearing about how bad you and the world are; not getting a nice meal. In a weird way it's like buying a Ferrari. You can't just walk in and buy one; you have to apply. You don't just bump into John and ask a question, you've got to go through a lot to get there.

And then there's Jesus. You don't have to go looking, Jesus goes looking for you at parties, up trees and even in the gutter.

I'm also reminded of trying to get pets or children to do what I want - whether that's to leave something alone or to go for it. There can be the John approach, "If you don't eat your dinner you will be sent down to ___ (bed)!" And there's the Jesus

approach, "Hey, let's pretend this spoon is an airplane and it's coming in to land."

Is that the way God works?

No, but God does recognize that we are all created different. We learn and respond to things differently, and so we need to be approached differently as well.⁵

Not that it seemed to be working for the group Jesus is talking about today. They seem much more interested in talking about the life style of John and Jesus than their message. Have you ever read a music review where they focus on the performers wardrobe? It's like that. They're missing the point.

And the individuals aren't the only ones.

Jesus delivers a message the crowd would have expected from John, but is actually a part of Jesus' message as well. He declares "Woe to you" and names a number of cities were he has been working. These are places that should have clued in about Jesus with what they'd experienced and be trying to change their ways... but they weren't. They appreciated the show, and then got back to their lives.

Which is not what God is trying to do. God is trying to get their attention, and then change how they live so that the world will be a better place.



It's not a new plan. They were given a set of rules way back. Ten Commandments to guide their relationships with God and each other. Rules that would create a just society for insiders and outsiders, ensuring that

everybody is looked after. And neither John nor Jesus are trying to change that. Instead Jesus came to 'complete the law' (Matthew 5:17), to refocus it, to summarize it: love God and each other.

And God is still trying to get us to change the world. (Personally, I think God is more patient than I can imagine... or more loving.) Now, like then, there is a lot going on in our lives. Our cities and societies have a flow to them - like a big ship moving at speed. It would take a lot to change course. And like that ship, it needs individuals to act or nothing will change. Individuals working together. Thankfully, there were people following John and Jesus back then who did change their ways - and they told others... who told others, all the way down the line to me and you. Individuals in community have spread the love of Christ all over the world - ideas on a good way to live in relationship with God and each other. Sometimes they're even called rules.

Have you ever felt rules to be a burden? Has the system ever got you down? I suspect so. I also suspect that's one reason why the end of today's passage is so famous.

" 28 Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. 29 Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. 30 For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

Jesus is inviting us to learn from him and receive rest... by taking on the yoke Jesus puts on us. This isn't the absence of work. God isn't about not working. (Think of our example from the first story in the Bible. God works for six days, and only the rested on the seventh.) Jesus isn't saying there won't be work, but that we will find rest. That the burden will feel light.

Why is that? I suspect it is because when you embrace the work

Which is an important aspect of us all being made in God's image... there's a lot to God.

Jesus gives you, you realize that it is given with respect and love. That your work is part of a larger work that will steer the world onto a better course.

And who is invited? "All you that are weary..." Everyone. Even those cities that might be "brought down to Hades" on the day of judgment - because that day hasn't come yet. There is still time.

This is one of the reasons I think that God is more loving than I can imagine.

This reminds me of the experience somebody had in a small company they work at. Several years ago it went through a tough time as several talented people left. These people were frustrated because they didn't feel respected and working just for money wasn't motivation enough. They left. That has changed now and people feel cared for. They still aren't paid lots, but working there now feels 'lighter'.

And what's this have to do with our opening questions? What will it be like when God comes? ...or even better, what is it like now as God comes?

God could be in any type of person or anyplace in society, but wherever that is, God will be trying to reconcile relationships. In doing so, everyone is invited to discover that doing the Lord's work is lighter (not easy, but lighter) because we do it with God.

To God be all the glory Amen.

Responding to God

FaithTalk

These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies.

Wonder: What will it be like when Jesus comes again?

Values: What issue(s) is important to you that you believe is also important to God? How does 'your' issue impact others?

Memories: Share a memory of when you did something that in hindsight or the perspective of others should have felt hard, but wasn't.

Actions: Prayer for help in accepting the yoke Jesus has for you. Look around for others who have been given a similar 'burden'.

Pray for our city and nation that we will become the loving society God dreams for us.

Activity: **Helping Hands**⁶

materials: coloured paper, pens/pencils, scissors, tape

- trace and cut out your hands
- Draw pictures of or write the name of somebody who helps us on each hand. (You can include people whose name you don't know.)
- Share a bit about the people you have chosen.
 - celebrate what they do and how they are different (like John the Baptist and Jesus in Matthew 11: 18-19... but don't complain like the people in the Bible.
- Say a prayer thanking God for them.
- post your collection on your front window or a wall. Perhaps you have enough colours to make a rainbow?

Friday, July 10 We give thanks for new ministries and congregations starting across the denomination.


Saturday, July 11 We pray for interchurch families in which couples are married across denominational divides and participate together in two Christian communities.
