Call to worship


Here we are, looking for you.

## Listening to God

Prayer<sup>3</sup>

Dear God, help us turn our hearts to you and hear what you will speak, for you speak peace to your people through Christ, our Lord. Amen.

#### Intro to the readings

- we're going to have three readings this morning. Two from the Bible and a children's story.
  - Mama, do you love me? by Barbara Joosse. Apparently there are lots of errors in the illustrations, but there is still a good lesson for us.
  - The psalm is a love song written praising God, and reminding us of various things as well. What in it do you need reminding of?
  - The Matthew passage continues on (actually overlaps) from last week. Previously in this teaching section Jesus had reminded people about:
    - being humble,
    - being hard on themselves to stop their own sinning,
    - that the shepherd will leave the 99 to find the lost one... and celebrate their return
    - that we should hold each other accountable pointing out somebody's sin to them
    - and... this section wraps up with today's passage
  - There are some sums of money referred to. You'll probably figure this out, but the first is huge (billions of dollars), and the other is more manageable (about a 100 days work)

Sermon: An Emotional Response

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.<sup>6</sup> Amen.

The story about little girl is cute, and reminds us about the love a parent has for a child - something that is also mentioned in our psalm today. The Bible often refers to God as a parent and to us as the children. What I like about both the story and today's psalm is that we are given some perspective from the parent's side.

The psalm sings that the LORD is both slow to anger, and doesn't hold onto it forever. This reminds me that God gets angry. We don't talk about that much. We focus on God's love, but God does get angry with us.

I think it's important to remember the God feels emotions. It's not surprising, we have emotions and we are created in God's image. Do you ever get angry?

Of course you do, even if you avoid the word. How does it happen in you? Do you show it? I had a room-mate who would explode when she was angry... and then it was gone. When Alexander is angry he sometimes throws things. Imagine if God got angry like that? ...

The mother in the story admitted that she would be angry if her daughter did something bad, <u>and</u> that she would still love her. Can you remember feeling that way? ...

As a parent, I definitely feel it more than I used to, and I'm grateful it's not too often. It's usually when I'm tired or hungry and one of the boys is trying to be their own person... against what I want them to do... such as coming to dinner, or getting dressed so we can go. I know God has ideas for us that would be better than what we want as individuals - so I'm sure God can relate. I wonder if God also gets tired or hungry? Probably not anymore, but Jesus would have.

Still, God does get angry, but another emotion is referred to more in the psalm - God's love for us. And it's not a wishy-washy love, but a "steadfast love." Like the mother who will love her child even if she breaks something by accident, or does something bad, or changes into something scary.

This is an important point in our relationship with God. As Jesus taught in Matthew chapter 18, this is a love that will cause the shepherd to chase down the person that wonders away. A love

that will forgive a huge dept. It's something that we all need. If God were to "deal with us according to our sins" than we'd be in trouble.

We might be like a story Jesus told earlier and fail to realize we have a 'spec' in our eye - something that's causing us to see and act the wrong way... perhaps a bling spot to our own faults. We might even be like the person from last week's passage that refused to listen when others try to humbly point out what we do that hurts the community or ourselves.

or we might be like the privileged slave who realizes our mistakes, the ways we have hurt others or ourselves, and ask to make it right... and then not show the same mercy to others.

and 'others' is another important point.

The Psalm and the Gospel passage are not just about our relationship with God - the are about God's relationship with them, and our relationship with them. We describe these relationships as community - and that's what this collection of teachings by Jesus is about: living in healthy community, or healthy relationships.

Relationships take work. To keep any relationship going there needs to be commitment, safety, and trust. Part of the commitment is helping others know when they are hurting the community or themselves (ie. sinning), and also admitting when we do it ourselves and trying to stop (ie. repenting).

There's all sorts of things we do that hurt relationships.

Think of how tight pants have been popular for years, and how we now know that the elastics in them are breaking down in the wash and ending up in the rivers and on the crops and back into our bodies. We're still here, and so is the fashion, but it seems to be hurting many relationships.

How about your relationships with others in your community your neighbours, family, or people here at Kensington? Do you help them see their faults (from the position that you also have faults), or do you talk about them behind their back?

Today's passage though continues on from this. The person with much to account for acknowledges the problem, and asks for time. The king is shockingly generous and actually forgives the debt. Then what?

God forgives... do you also forgive?

There has been much written on forgiveness. As I've mentioned before, it's now accepted medically as an important part of becoming healthy.

An example, from religion, is a story told by Rabbi Herold Kushner. He tells about a mother of three struggling to make ends meet because her husband had run off with his girlfriend to another jurisdiction. Kushner advised she forgive him. She demanded why. He explained that he wasn't asking because what the husband did was acceptable, but because he didn't deserve the power to live in her head and turn her into a bitter angry woman. He wanted the husband out of her life emotionally as completely as he was physically. The resentment was only hurting her and the children.<sup>7</sup>

Which sounds like a selfish reason to forgive. Shouldn't we do it just because God asks. Yes... but perhaps this is why God asks.

Something Rabbi Kushner didn't say is to 'forgive and forget'. This is a popular phrase... and not a part of today's lesson. Notice that the King forgave, but when the privileged servant was brought back he remembered the past history. Jesus calls us to repeatedly forgive those who ask, allowing the people not to be trapped by their past sinful action. He also talks about change; about not returning to an hurtful situation.

Which is part of what makes this costly grace, rather than cheap grace. It demands change. Just because you know you'll be forgiven doesn't mean you can just go ahead and sin. Look what happened to the privileged servant.

So, if you find yourself angry, know that God feels that too, but remember that Jesus tells us to forgive those who ask because God's love is bigger than anger. Also, ask for forgiveness for thing you may have done to cause hurt. And let us join the Holy Spirit in making the world a better and safer place.
