#### Intro to the readings

- Much of the Newer Testament is letters that travelled around the churches. People found them so helpful that God was obviously involved - and they were included in the Bible. Many were written by Paul. The one were going to hear from today was written to the church in Philippi - a well off and fairly new city settled mostly by Roman soldiers. We know from Acts, and from here, that women were important leaders in this church.

Sermon: Looking down or up?

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.<sup>5</sup> Amen.

Paul's letter to the Philippians contains some famous passages. Such as, "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, Rejoice."

Wouldn't that be wonderful. To be always rejoicing - to be always full of joy?

But is that realistic?

My mind starts to conjure a world full of Barney the dinosaur, the Care Bears, and the Smurfs. Imaginary worlds made of cotton candy. A little is okay, but always?

How can this idea of always having joy be believable? I know people suffering from poverty, family strife, addictions & disorders, decreasing physical abilities, memory loss, etc... and now there's the likelihood of another lock-down. How can we rejoice in more isolation? How about parents who may have to both work and supervise their children from home... or those who are out of work?

How can Paul asks us to rejoice always?

Is he completely out of touch?



eastern star 1 Kraybill No. Paul knows there's troubles. Health wise, he suffers from 'a thorn in the flesh'. He's not very specific, but he does know physical suffering. And then there's all the times he's thrown into prison. Sometimes it's just a night or two, but near the end it's long... until his end on earth. This letter was written during one of Paul's extended stays, possibly his last one. Paul, as we heard, knows what it's like have plenty, and little, to being well-fed and to go hungry.

and more than personal suffering, Paul knows that there is suffering in communities. His letters are full of thoughts on getting along. In this passage we have a reference to two women who worked along-side him in sharing the good news of Jesus important leaders in the community. Apparently they now have a disagreement. Paul knows that life is not always 'happy happy'.

and Paul has advice.

One piece of advice is another famous passage, "Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God."

'Don't worry about anything'- which is hard. I don't know about you, but sometimes I worry. Sometimes it sucks me in. Apparently this is called 'The Backfire Effect'. When something isn't going well you hold it close and apply that feeling to everything in your life.

But Paul is realistic enough not to stop there. He tells us to take everything to God. To give thanks for the good things (because there's always good things), and to give over the hard things.

For me this week that has included thanks for continued good health in my family, a really nice prayer group meeting in the Benny Farm Courtyard, and time to connect with several people. There weren't many hard things for me this week. Zander didn't sleeping well (all week), and Ines leading extensive training in Germany... but from here. And somewhere in between good and hard was sharing with people the hard things in their lives. Without Paul's advice to take real world problems to the LORD, I would find it hard. Instead, to borrow from Paul's language here, Jesus is guarding my heart and mind.

I also think I had some divine help getting the boys dressed, fed & where they needed to go.

Still, it is hard to rejoice in all things.

Especially if you think of rejoicing, or joy, as an emotion. Some of writers I read this week talked about joy, as Paul is writing about it, not as an emotion, but as a perspective - as a way of looking at things. An analogy is the royal flag. It flies outside the where the Queen is staying. When you see it, you that is were the Queen is.<sup>7</sup>

This makes sense with what Paul says. He tells us what the flag looks like. "Whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things."

Think about these things.

This is where it's easy to see Jesus: in what is true and honourable and just and pleasing.

It's why Paul doesn't tell Euodia & Syntyche to compromise or make up. He tells them to focus on the LORD. This is our source,

our vision, our goal, our strength. Jesus is our guide through the darkest valley - the Good Shepherd.

Paul rejoices in all things, not because life is always great, but because God is at work in all things. Paul's not happy to be in jail, but it is giving him time to write. He's not happy that the church in Philippi is having issues, but he sees God at work in them. He rejoices.

and perhaps that is what we can take from this letter. Everyone is being affected by the pandemic. All of us in different ways. Many people have other issues on top of that. The uncertainty of all this is hard. Society as a whole is stressed.

We can look down and let the hard things overshadow us, or we can turn together to our LORD and saviour, who is here to nourish us.

To God be all the glory Amen.
