Intro to the readings

- Passage from 1 Kings isn't about a king, it's about Elijah. He had a big success, but things took a turn and now he feels alone... isolated... unable to go on. What does God do?
- The book of Acts has already told us how the followers of Jesus are waiting for something to happen, as Jesus promised. One day the Holy Spirit descended on them. It was amazing. They streamed outside and people from all over heard their amazement in their own language. Peter preached an amazing sermon and thousands believed. Then we have this description of their life.

Sermon: Communion with us

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.⁴ Amen.

Life for the first Christians was different than life today. For one thing, when it says "All who believe were together" I think it meant more physically than we are allowed to do this month. Not that they all lived together. Apparently "about three thousand persons were added" after Peter's sermon - added to those who already believed. That's way to much to live in one house, but it seems they did form a strong community; one that "had all things in common."

They also went to the temple "day by day" to discuss the way of Jesus. This, I'm sure, helped them grow in their faith. It is always easier to do that in a community.

Now, both they and the temple were still Jewish. But they were adding new ways of thinking and acting. One was to remember the way the Lord Jesus had sat at tables with people and shared the meal... and so they did that too. Our passage says, "they broke bread at home."

It's something that we do and don't do.

We do eat at home. In non-pandemic times many of us like to have friends over. But this is more. This is a reference to sharing the Lord's Supper in communion with each other and God. It is remembering what Jesus had done and what God would do. ...and doing it at home.

One of the sad things about living through a pandemic is that we can't get together. Even when we might have in the summer, it didn't feel safe then. Now we are stuck at home once again.

This passage is a nice reminder of both the importance of keeping in touch with each other, and that we can do church at home... even Holy Communion.

Some of my fellow students were Anglican. Their worship service generally focuses on the Eucharist. Even though they shared Communion every Sunday, if we didn't share the Lord's Supper in our school worship for a few weeks they would get a little unsettled. Personally, I've been missing it.

Communion is an important thing to share.

Why?

A simple answer is that Jesus told us to, but he did that because it's special.

At the risk of sounding 'like a child', "Why?"

Communion is a special way that God's grace is shared with us. Not that it's the source of the grace, that's God. It also doesn't make grace happen. God's grace is offered to us, not by a ritual we do, but because God wants to.

And in receiving God's grace, the Holy Spirit nourishes our souls and helps to grow our faith, and hope, and charity. Christians have found this since, well, the very first Christians.

Why is that?

We don't know. It's a mystery. and the experience is different for different people, and at different times.

We even have three names for this action: Holy Communion,

the Lord's Supper, and the Eucharist. *Living Faith*⁷, a statement of faith written by the Presbyterian Church in Canada, has a section on this. I invite you to join me in reading part of it.

In Holy Communion

Christ places his table in this world to feed and bless his people.

The Holy Spirit so unites us in Christ that in receiving the bread and wine in faith we share in his body and blood.

The Lord's Supper is a joyful mystery whereby Jesus takes the bread and wine to represent his atoning sacrifice, deepening our union with himself and with each other, giving us of his life and strength. Here Christ is present in his world proclaiming salvation until he comesa symbol of hope for a troubled age.

The *Eucharist* is thanksgiving to God. We pray for the world and with gratitude offer our lives to God. We celebrate his victory over death and anticipate the joyous feast we shall have in his coming kingdom. We pledge allegiance to Christ as Lord, are fed as one church, receive these signs of his love, and are marked as his.

What does this tell us?

Holy Communion brings people together from all walks of life, from all over the world, and from throughout time - even from different branches of Christianity. There are issues we disagree on. We even disagree on exactly what happens in this experience, but we are still invited into community, into communion, with each other and with God.

When we call it *The Lord's Supper* we recognize it is a tangible bridge between Heaven and Earth. This is the LORD's table present on Earth. This is a way that the God's Spirit feeds us. It's obviously no longer a meal, but still we are nourished.

Eucharist comes from the Greek word for gratitude. When we call it *The Eucharist* we remember the sacrifice Jesus made for us on the cross, and his victory over all brokenness - even death. We also remember with gratitude and hope the promised feast to come when all the brokenness is gone.

Now, I know some of you always ask, "What's this got to do with my daily life?"

Well, Ezekiel's story reminds us that when we are isolated or depressed, God will feed us. The act of Holy Communion, The Lord's Supper, The Eucharist is a way that we can experience the grace of God. It is a way that God meets us and nourishes us. It is a way that we remember Jesus and the promises to come. And the Acts passage reminds us that we can celebrate Communion in our home. It's not a daily event, but it is something that shapes us for our daily lives.

With that in mind, let us read the two remaining section of Living Faith on Communion.

In breaking bread and drinking wine
Jesus told us to remember him.
In this action
called Holy Communion, Lord's Supper, or Eucharist,
Christ offers himself to us
and we present ourselves to him
in worship and adoration.

Those who belong to Christ come gladly to his table to make a memorial of his life and death, to celebrate his presence, and together as his church offer him thanks.

We pray now for... [please add your own]


- for our neighbours and community.



Gifts to Presbyterians Sharing have enabled this congregation to faithfully provide ministry in the Mistawasis community. In addition to a yearly Vacation Bible School program and a women's craft club, Mistawasis Memorial PC has launched a new girls' empowerment program. After school, girls in grades 1–8 gather to learn about fitness and life skills. The prayer of this program is that these skills will help the girls live fulfilling lives.

Wednesday, October 7 We pray for all those involved in women's ministry—participants and leaders—who come together to share their faith.


Thursday, October 8 We pray for the members of the Committee on History in their ongoing work to help us better know and understand the historic witness of the church.

Friday, October 9 We thank God for those who have worked hard to care for elderly or isolated church members through months of sheltering at home.


Saturday. October 10 We give thanks for the blessings we see daily in our lives.


