

Intro to the readings

- Mark passage continues on from last week. As you read it, do you wonder about any of the details?
- Jeremiah passage is skipping a few verses. The reason that the editors way way back broke up the hard accusing verses with some encouraging verses that are a bit jarring. You're welcome to read them.
- Amos includes an insult that is still used today (something I don't remember from the course I took on this short book). More to the point thought, how are Jeremiah, Amos and Mark using the image of fishermen?

Sermon: Fishing for

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.³ Amen.

Do you remember seeing action movies? They might give you a brief intro, but quickly dive into the action. The Gospel of Mark's a bit like that. Last week we were introduced to Jesus down by the riverside. Although it wasn't quiet as the heavens were torn open.

Now we heard a brief quiet bit (perhaps as the opening credits rolled) and the action starts.

You read only 8 verses, and in it

- Jesus was driven out into the wilderness
- tempted by Satan

Psalm 19:14

- been with wild animals
- served by angels
- John was arrested (literally 'delivered up')
- Jesus went to Galilee
- and started telling the good news that the reign of God has come near
- and calling for people to repent
- and then called some people to follow him
- and they dropped everything and did all in 8 verses!

Did it leave you breathless? Did it leave you with questions? Questions are a good thing. Curiosity is the main way that God created us to learn. Reading through this passage I wondered about a few things. Other Gospels tell about the temptations, but what we Jesus tempted with here? Was he threatened or served by the wild animals - or perhaps just a photo safari? What happened that John went from the talk of the land to arrested within 40 days? ...

This lack of details and events happening "immediately" after each other is very typical in Mark.⁴

Have you ever gone off for some intentional time 'away from it all'? I'm not talking about times when you've found yourself at home without anyone else, but times when the solitude⁵ has been intentional - and extended. Maybe you chose it, or maybe you were like Jesus and 'driven into the wilderness.' What was it like?

Here we aren't given much, but Jesus is faced with his demons.

It's harder to escape them with no obligations or TV to hide in. He comes back strengthened and with a vision.

Jesus immediately heads for the edge of Jewish territory and starts "proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news."

What's this mean?

We tend to take this as word of personal encouragement. Jesus is telling us that God is with us. We're not alone - which with angels attending him by the end of his time in the wilderness is something Jesus would know. We also take it as a philosophical comment. Jesus is telling us that it's time to consider how we live. This really makes sense with the challenge to repent (change directions).

What about the people who first heard him?

They lived in the Roman Empire with a local king. The soldiers and taxes made that obvious. Along comes Jesus talking about the Kingdom of God being near. Would they have been thinking personally change or a political revolution?

and then Jesus walks past some fishermen⁶ and says, "'Follow me and I will make you fish for people.' And immediately they left their nets and followed him."

What does Jesus mean?

presumably not taking people away with fish hooks.

What do you think Jesus meant by saying they would 'fish for people'? ...

⁴ the word 'immediately' is used 41 times in Mark. The translators find that repetitive and so use alternates, reducing it in the English to only 25 times or so. It's only used 10 times in the rest of the Newer Testament.

⁵ not really possible as God is always with us

Growing up, I heard this passage used to describe Jesus collecting his students from the ordinary folk to train them to spread the good news and getting others to join in. Is Jesus calling them to start Christianity? Are they to collect people together like fish in a net and form a new religion? They did, but I don't think that's what Jesus means here. Reading through the rest of the book Jesus doesn't seem interested in setting up an institution.

Or are they to hook people into following Jesus as their saviour? I think this is often how being 'fishers of people' is thought of. One of the great things about Jesus coming is that he was physically present as a human. It helps us have a personal relationship with Jesus. Peter and the rest of the fishermen not only have this relationship, but share this good news - but is this what Jesus and those fishermen were thinking of at the time? Is it what the original hearers would have thought as the stories were told and written down after?

There were aspects of it,

but it was much more than any personal relationship. Considering this is 'immediately' after talking about the Kingdom of God being near there is political dimensions. How could there be God's Kingdom and Rome's kingdom at the same time?

But how could being called to be 'fishers of people' be political?

The two passages we read from Jeremiah and Amos, and another in Ezekiel⁷, give a indication. These prophets talk about God sending fishermen to round up those who have broken the relationship with God - especially those who have oppressed others. Amos even uses the descriptive language of being taken away by fish hooks. Is this what Jesus had in mind when he called those fishermen? Did these fishermen think they were being called up to the revolutionary army to drag off the oppressors?

and what was the revolution supposed to bring about? Well, the Reign of God.

I say the Reign of God rather than the Kingdom of God. Kingdom brings to mind a geographic area. Reign is more about a time period. It's not about a carving out a territory from Rome, but a new beginning. This is about God being the leader - not Rome - not even priests in Jerusalem. It's revolutionary. One person I read this week put it this way, "What Jesus is beginning is the transformation of this world. That is why those in charge of this world as it was ended up killing him."

The Reign of God is about about making the world a better place for everyone - even the leaders who fear the changes. More is revealed through Mark as the action continues, but the Reign of God is a special world. It's not one of mindless bliss, but it is

one where nobody is stressed about having a place to live (though probably not in a mansion), or having enough food (though not anything environmentally hurtful), or stressed about their health (no longer a barrier to joy), or about their place in society (comfortable with God at the top), or if they are worthwhile or valued (all are loved). It will be a reign in which people will know peace with themselves, each other, with creation, and with our God.

and Jesus is calling forth 'fishermen' for this revolution - to help everyone experience the blessing of living in the Reign of God.

In the Gospel of Mark we don't get a lot of details. We are invited to wonder.

I wonder about our role as fishermen?

in the name of God our creator, Jesus, our saviour, and The Spirit, our guide, Holy and One.

Amen.

Providing Food for the Displaced

In Syria, conflict continues to plague the population, causing



over six million people to become internally displaced. As a result, many people are faced with a lack of access to food, loss of employment, high prices and inflation, making them very vulnerable. COVID-19 has only exacerbated the situation. Working with partners at Canadian Foodgrains Bank, Presbyterian World Service & Development is providing food baskets to 7,400 families to help meet daily food requirements. During these times of uncertainty, the food baskets will provide a source of sustenance for the families.


