
Kensington Presbyterian Church not like moths

Prayer of Approach²

Living God,

Sermon: Something old, something new

Dear Lord, please bless these words
and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.



Looking for something has its challenges - which is why you have to look for it. Looking in the dark makes it harder - not just to find it, but not to stub your toe. I'm sure you can remember an example.⁵

The darkness can be less literal. Perhaps you remember a restaurant, but not exactly where it

is - so you walk or drive up and down the street looking for it. Or perhaps you haven't even been there before, but heard about it from somebody else. Maybe they couldn't remember what type of restaurant it was, just that it was really amazing. So you're walking up and down Sherbrooke looking for this amazing restaurant that has several windows and a green awning.

or take another example. You know a baby has been born who will save the world from its problems... but you're not quite sure where, or who the parents are, or what the baby looks like.

I don't think even Google could find that baby.

This is what those Wise Ones were doing. They probably weren't kings, but Zoroastrian priests. They were expecting someone to be born who would save the world. Their studies taught them what signs to look out for, but the other details were in the dark. Then they saw a light - a bright light shining in the heavens.



In 2020 we learned about 'The Great Conjunction', when Jupiter and Saturn are so close in our sky that they look like one amazingly bright star. A previous time this appeared was near when we think Jesus was born. Perhaps this is what they saw.

Regardless, it was a light shining in the darkness. Their belief was that it meant the saviour had been born, and so followed the light looking for its source. When they arrive, they recognize the source of light for the world in the baby Jesus.

We know that Jesus is the light of the world, the saviour. We know about what he will teach, how he crosses barriers to heal, and how he will be put on the cross because of our sins... and then show there is healing beyond even that for those willing to travel with him. Even the first time listener of this gospel would be expecting the saviour as it's in the first line of the book.

This revelation of God at work is the exciting news that the Ephesians are being reminded of - and saying that "through the church the wisdom ... might now be made known". It makes a lot of sense that God would work through the church.

It even makes sense before the Gospels were written - back when Jesus was born. God had chosen a group of people to work through: the Jews. Some of them recognized, or had glimpses, of what was going on: Mary, Joseph, and the shepherds. These were people who had to worry about running a household, finding work, or protecting sheep. Still, the light of God reflects off of them bringing light to the world. However, it's the priests who had dedicated their lives to God that you'd expect to be the ones to recognize God at work.

Even more ironically, we have foreign priests recognizing that baby Jesus is the saviour of the world. They are commonly called Magi - the root of our word magician. There are various references in the Bible that say what they do is bad. While their intent is to find and celebrate the light born into the world, they also reflect it to us - showing us God healing division in the world.

The different Gospels all emphasize different aspects of God. In Mathew we start with showing Jesus rooted in the Jewish people with a list of those who have come before, but the story expands to include the stars in the heavens and people who are supposed to be bad.

It makes me wonder where God might be working now. I do believe that God is working amongst the leaders of the church-within the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and other branches of the church. One example of God working through us with others in the Presbyterian World Service & Development

responses to COVID 19.6 I know that God is also at work through people who are part of churches, but don't have leadership positions - Marys and Joesephs. But this story of the Magi coming and recognizing Jesus makes me wonder about seeing God reflected outside the church.

In October, CBC radio started a monthly series called 'Montrealer of the Month'. None of the three people so far work within a church. Church isn't even mentioned, but does that mean that God's light isn't reflected in what they do?

The first person recognized as *Montrealer of the Month* was Naveed Rehman. He's a nursing aid at St. Mary's where he's known for engaging patients and listening to their stories. "He'll do anything for you... and never asks anything in return." One story is how he recognized what it must be like for a patient who was almost blind to be alone in a room all day. He found them a radio to provide some companionship. I think he's actions brought light.

The next month was Anwar Alhjooj. He was a layer in Italy before coming to Canada to support his wife's education. Starting as a volunteer, he now works at the Montreal City Mission as a social worker and intercultural program coordinator. He is appreciated for the way he makes people feel secure, comfortable, and helps them find a way to contribute. He excels at going beyond listening to the outsider and including them.

Most recently Alia Jaafar⁹ was recognized for her dedication and warmth running a daycare downtown. The children are excited to go. Two things she has in common with the others: she loves what she does, and she if very humble about it. They all

bring light into people's lives.

How do we respond to this light?

because light is needed. We hear in Isaiah of a thick darkness covering the earth and the peoples. There are many types of struggles going on right now, layered upon each other. This is a thick darkness... but the same passage encourages us. "Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. ...lift up your eyes and look around....Then you shall see and be radiant."

Where should we look?

Look in the Bible, in prayer, in the church... and outside. To those who are reflecting the light of God. The writer of Ephesians talks about the boundless riches of Christ, and the rich variety of God's wisdom. Look beyond your boundaries, because God is big.

So let us acknowledge the darkness, and the light that has come in Jesus. Let us look up and look around. Let us be open to all the places and people that reflect the light of God, bringing

healing to the world. Let us remember that God's love is so boundless that it can put stars in the heavens to light our way.

To God be all the glory Amen.





