Amen


Assurance of Pardon

Intro to the readings

- Except for the psalm, these are very familiar readings. Try and listen for things that stand out. What can help in the Gospel passage is that Mark tells the story a little differently than the other Gospels. Is there anything that is a little different for you?
- A side note: a teacher could ask a student to do anything... except untie the teacher's shoelaces.
- The psalm is about comparing the power of God to the most powerful things in nature. It doesn't really come into the sermon, but there's a good FaithTalk question about it

Sermon: Rising from the dark

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.⁴ Amen.

Have you been experiencing COVID brain? There are various symptoms. It can include foggy thinking, difficulty concentrating, and forgetfulness. Last week I had the toughest time remembering what day of the week it was.

This isn't the first time things have seemed formless and dark. Take the start of the Bible, "In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep...."

I suppose the opposite of formless would be order. Give things a place and have them stay there. It's one of the recommended ways of reducing your stress, to create some order in your life. Have a predictable pattern to your day and week. Set some boundaries as to when it's okay to snack or wear pyjamas; set some times to go for walks or watch TV.

This isn't a new concept. One of the themes of the entire first chapter of the Bible is God creating order. It's also one way to look at the cleanliness rules in the Bible - rules for life to happen 'decently and in good order.' It included guidelines or rules about what is proper to eat (ex. sheep is okay, but goat is not), rules about how to behave with each other (respect your parents, do not steal), and where things should be (blood should be in the body and not come out). If anything was not in the decent order than they believed it threatened a healthy relationship with God, because how could God associate with chaos - but all was not lost. There were various ways to make things right again. One technique, especially when it involved your body, was to have a

ritual washing. This could be just your hands, or your whole body... such as a baptism.

Baptisms weren't a new thing with John. They'd been happening for a thousand or more years. Somebody recognizes that something has happened to separate them from God, and they need to come to God for a blessing to be made right again with God.

John, however, was disturbing the usual pattern.

This shouldn't have been a surprise to anyone. If somebody was walking around with a deerstalker hat and pipe you'd think Sherlock Homes. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey... so everybody thought of Elijah. Elijah was a prophet from back when Israel had their own kings. Like most prophets, he intruded unexpectedly into people's lives - breaking boundaries if you like. Although if you listened to his words, he was railing against boundaries of behaviour that had already been broken.

Elijah was known for challenging those in power and doing amazing things (like getting God to light a water soaked alter without a match). Now there's John, dressing like Elijah and challenging people to "a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins." This is challenging to those in power, and everyone else. John's talking about sins, not if you had been touched by blood. He's calling for people to change their way of living. He connects this with the 'forgiveness of sins'... something that only God can do. This talk attracted a lot of attention. Will God show up at the baptism? Some came to see amazing things like Elijah had done, and some came because they listened to his words and accepted the challenge to change. They acknowledged the darkness their lives were submerged in, and they were lifted into the light.

This is one of the things that makes these passages relevant for today. There is darkness in our world. Some of it is external and some inside us. Some of it we can't do anything about, others we can.

These stories acknowledge the darkness, but don't end with it. They are about rising into the light.

Jesus joins the people "from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem" in going to John. He descends under the water, into the dark, and rises from the dark.

This is a bigger moment than anything Elijah did... although it's unclear in this passage if anybody except Jesus experienced it. Still, it was a defining moment. The Heavens are torn open. The Spirit comes down. The voice of God speaks, giving identity and encouragement.

This acknowledges who Jesus is and what his ministry is going to be like - a good beginning to a book. Although it's not really the beginning of the story. That goes back to John, and Elijah, and way back to creation when God created light and made a place for dark and a place for light.

This story of Jesus' baptism reminds us about God being in the darkness and adding light.

But here, it isn't as tidy as the understanding in Genesis 1. The Heavens are "torn apart." Did those words jump out for you? In Matthew and Luke, both written later, they tone it down and say, 'the heavens were opened.' But here in Mark they are "torn apart". This isn't God opening the window and calling down. This is God breaking the barriers between the heavens and Earth in a way that can't be undone.

Is this God creating chaos? undoing the order of creation? No.

While it might feel that way at times, the world is not going back to being formless and a void. What is happening, like in Genesis, is that the Spirit of God is sweeping through the darkness and bringing a new order. This is good foreshadowing how Jesus will go into all sorts of dark places and bringing light into the lives of people there. It may seem formless or dark, but day will come - and God said it was good.

FaithTalk These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies. Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Memories: What's something you appreciate about baptisms?

Etching: What does baptism mean to you?

Values: How do you create order/stability in your life? Do you give space for the in-breaking of the Holy Spirit? (and how do you make sure it's God talking?)

Actions: Psalm 29 compares God's power to various examples in nature. Share ideas on how you would write it now. What comparisons would you make?

Wonder: People used to think the passage in Mark 1: 5 was exaggerating when it said everyone was listening to John, but we've seen how the world can be listening to everything one man tweets. Can you imagine a way the church could capture large scale attention in a good way? What would the message be?

Paving the Way for a Brighter Future

Anxious and unsure about his future, Abdul was 14 years old when he joined the electronics and computer program offered by the Joint Christian Committee for Social Service (JCC) in Lebanon. Now 19 years old and equipped with a diploma and five years of experience, he has a good job and an income to support his family. JCC's vocational training programs teach marketable skills and offer hope for many young Palestinian refugees who are out of school and living without a dream or ambition. Through gifts to Presbyterians Sharing, the PCC has been supporting this lifegiving program since 2018. Sylvia Haddad, JCC Director, shared that "equipping youth, and especially refugees who have nothing, with a skill or vocation is very important. The challenge is great, but we cannot give up and are grateful for your support."


