Intro to the readings

- Today's Mark passage continues the story. It is the Sabbath (until sundown) and Jesus has just lifted heads and dropped jaws at the synagogue with his authoritative preaching. This is right after.
- The Psalm has some great lines. Which ones stands out for you?

Reading: Please look up the passages in your own Bible, or click on the name to be taken to an online version (NRSV).

Mark 1: 29-39 Psalm 30

Sermon: Vaccines or Variants?

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.³ Amen.

How did you feel about this week? We've been hearing about the vaccines arriving and being distributed. I even know people who have had their first dose. While there's talk of smaller shipments than initially promised, apparently we're still on track for everyone to have their chance by the fall. Then there's the talk of the Variants. Variations in the virus that are proving more contagious, and maybe more dangerous.

I don't know whether to be feeling good that things might get better soon, or bad that they might get worse soon. I want to hope, but it's a bit up and down.

This uncertainty isn't new. If you're anxious about uncertainty - you can turn to much of the Bible for stories of people in the midst of hard situations.

Some examples:

- Joseph as the favoured son, then his brothers selling him into slavery, then getting into a good home, then accused of rape, then a leader in prison, then a leader of all Egypt and saving his family... who in later generations became slaves
- but those slaves were (eventually) saved by God through Moses, to be let into the wilderness where there wasn't food or water... until they trusted God to provide.
- Later stories have Elijah in a glorious display lighting a soaking wet alter, and then needing to go on the run for fear of his life. Did God abandon him?
- Ester wins the beauty pageant to become the Persian Queen, then learns of a plan to kill all the Jews. Can her people be saved?
- Ruth's husband dies, but she decides to stick with her mother-in-law. Will it work out?
- Peter's mother-in-law so sick she couldn't make it to the synagogue. Would she get better soon, or worse? Would she die?

I don't know how she felt about her week, but we know what happened. Peter invited Jesus over after the jaw dropping sermon at the synagogue.

I wonder how she felt about that?

Did you ever have somebody bring over unexpected house guests before? How about at a time when you felt down - perhaps so sick you couldn't get out of bed? Are you the sort that want to host guests and make them feel welcome? I heard this week about a mother who felt hosting was very important, and needed to be done right. When she got to old to host for herself she drove her daughters crazy with her exacting demands (her sons didn't mind being told what to do, so they took over).

Peter invited Jesus over. He reaches down and raises her up.

(I know our usual translation says "lifted her up", but in Greek it's the same word used later to describe Jesus being raised from the dead.)

It seems like her life is looking up. Having been healed, she can return to her role in society, probably something she considered very important, serving. Not only that, this is what Jesus himself had come to do - serving people. It's interesting that she might understand Jesus' mission better than the disciples. For us, in a week of vaccines and variants, it's a story of somebody who was sick and incapable of participating until Jesus came along. Then she is up.

And so is the whole city. Possibly this is an exaggeration. Can people really be that excited about Jesus? The streets were probably narrow and easily crowded. But, imagine if somebody said the vaccine was available on a 'first come first serve' basis in the Jean Coutu parking lot? There'd be a lot of people showing up. People were excited about Jesus' healing. His disciples were probably excited about this powerful person they'd hooked up with. With that high, what dreams did they have that night?

Until the next morning when Jesus was nowhere to be seen. Had God left them? They go beyond feeling down. They panic. They hunt for Jesus everywhere. Do we do that? If you're feeling down, or that God has let you down, or left you... do you hunt for God everywhere? Perhaps that was easier for them when God was incarnate in Jesus... or perhaps it's easier with us where God can be everywhere.

I wondered if they remembered Psalm 30; it's full of great reminders.

It starts with thanking God. This isn't thank you for a beautiful day, or because we have food on the table. This is a thank you because they were near death. They were dismayed that God was nowhere to be seen. There was weeping at night, but joy

came as the sun (son?) rose. "You have turned my mourning into dancing; and clothed me with joy." Why? because God had healed them. God had raised them up from the pit. They weren't experiencing the uncertainty we've been addressing. God was hidden to them; they were down, but God responded to their cries.

It turns out, of course, that Jesus hasn't abandoned the fledgling disciples with their hopes up. He just needed to ground his day with prayer - with personal God time. (It's something I also find helpful. How about you?)

The disciples find him and things are looking up again. They tell him everyone is looking for you. Can you imagine if everyone were looking to come to Kensington? Jesus takes this excitement and announces a new program... they'd leave town. Leaving their new fame (and homes) behind was probably disappointing, although there might have been excitement at what Jesus might do next. It sounds like a bit of a roller-coaster for them, and it's only been two days.

And this pattern of the disciples being uncertain continues, especially in the Gospel According to Mark. The older ending to the book even leaves it uncertain as to whether the disciples share the good news of the resurrection... except of course somebody told, because we know.

Which brings us back to this week of Vaccines and Variants. Yes, there is good news and bad, but we know the stories. We know the stories that despite however down things may be, God is there. We know that Jesus can raise us up - even from death. We know that there is hope.

In the name of God our Creator, Christ our Servant, present in the Holy Spirit, God in Community, Holy in One.

Amen.

Etching: Create a list of 'places' or methods you have seen God so that when you feel God id hidden or has left your hunt will be easier.

Invitation to the table

Meals were exciting times with Jesus, but his last supper with the disciples was exceptionally special. They were on the high of an exciting week that started with the triumphant march into Jerusalem, and then great teachings at the Temple. It would be followed by the darkest days of his trial and execution. It is a meal of God with us, and us with God. Even if things are going to get worse soon, they will get better soon.

In these strange times it may seem odd to share Communion. We are not gathered at one table, or even at one time, but we are gathered with one Lord.

Still, it is the will of Jesus that those who want to experience him should meet Jesus here.

your Spirit connects us across any distance, and has fed us through this sacrament, making us one with Christ


and showing your love and kingdom here on Earth.
