Transfiguration of Jesus - C Monsma







Transfiguration from Jesus MAFA

#### Intro to the readings

- Or Today's passage from Mark is a big jump. We go from the beginning right to the middle. There's a reason for this... it marks a big turning point in the book. So far Jesus has been going around teaching and healing. After this the journey focused on Jerusalem and what will happen there.
- The psalm paints us a picture I invite you to imagine being there.




<u>Psalm 50</u>: 1-6 <u>Mark 8:27 to 9:9</u> Sermon: What do you see?

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.<sup>4</sup> Amen.

Our gospel passage starts with Jesus asking the disciples, "Who do people say that I am?"

This is an important question in Mark - and Peter answers with flying colours. "You are the Christ." Now, you and I know that this should be the answer, but he is the first in the gospel to identify Jesus as the Messiah.<sup>5</sup> But what does this mean? What does he see in Jesus?

What do you see in Jesus?



- 4 Psalm 19:14
- 5 Christ is in Greek, Messiah in Hebrew

Perhaps for you Jesus is...

- a leader to provide a set of rules or to sort out when something unjust happens, like a king;
- the 'go to' person when help is needed, like a servant;
- to tell the word of God, or provide a vision for how to live right with God, like a prophet;
- somebody who loves you, like a parent or a lover.

Are you not sure which to pick? That's okay. A great thing about this passage is that all of those ideas are in it.

When God's voice says, "You are my son" it might be referring to Psalm 2:7 where the Lord says, "You are my son" while talking about establishing a King. Of course, you don't need to make connections like that. When God says "You are my son" that makes the person heir to the throne of the King of kings. Kings are the ultimate judge and preserver of justice.

The idea of the Law is even stronger in the passage. Moses received the 10 Commandments and taught the Israelites how to live in response to God's love. Moses' presence shows this side of Jesus.

Then there's an idea from the other end of the palace hierarchy - that of the servant. While it's not in the version in Mark, in the Gospel According to Matthew God also says, "with him I am well pleased." This could be a reference to Isaiah 42:1 where God says, "Here is my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen, with whom I am well pleased; I have put my spirit upon him; he will bring

forth justice to the nations." Of course, there are stronger examples of Jesus being a servant in other passages, but this could be a reference to our King being a servant - somebody who humbly helps us with our needs... often without being asked, thanked, or even noticed.

Then there's the presence of Elijah, probably the most legendary prophet of old. Elijah shows the prophet part of Jesus - the one who delivers the word of God so that we can have a vision of the Kingdom of God.

And then there's those two words in the middle of God's declaration, "the Beloved." Because it comes right after "my Son" we tend to think loved like a parent loves a child. This certainly matches the many times Jesus calls God 'Abba' or Father; but after our time in Song of Songs last week where the two lovers are constantly talking about their 'beloved'... well, it reminds me of who much God is passionate about us. This is, perhaps, an appropriate reminder at the beginning of Lent that we are journeying to Jesus' crucifixion, also known as 'The Passion'.

I also find that meeting Moses and Elijah on a mountain reminds me of when they previously met God on a mountain: Moses in earthquakes and Elijah is silence. This reminds us that you might meet Jesus in big powerful earthshaking moments, or in stillness.


#### What do you see in Jesus?

I don't know if you picked one of those, or something else, but they are there. It's most likely that you see different parts of this Jesus picture depending on where you are in life at the time. When you are feeling vulnerable, Jesus loves you. When you notice something that isn't fair, Jesus is King. When you are trying to figure out what to do, Jesus is the Prophet.

If this sounds like too much to hold in your head at once - it is. God is too vast for us to know all there is about God. Not only is this okay, but it means that God will be there no matter what. It also means that sometimes you may not have a clear vision of Jesus, or you might be disturbed by what God is asking.

You're not alone.

This happened to Peter too... right after his realization that Jesus was the Messiah. Jesus starts to talk about how the leaders of the people are going to resent his vision so much that he will be killed. This is not Peter's idea of the Messiah. Either he's afraid, or he's unclear of what the Messiah is. Either way, Jesus treats him like he's possessed by a demon.

Six days later, Peter has a mountaintop experience.

I'm sure you've had them. An occasion when something amazing happened. The rest of the world paused, and turned on that moment. How do you respond?

A small example might be after a series of gloomy days the sun breaks out from behind clouds. It is glorious. You want the

moment to last. If you imagine yourself walking down by the river then you might be tempted to buy a house there. Except life doesn't work that way. Even if you stayed there, the world keeps spinning and the sun would move and disappear. It'll be back, but things will have changed. This sounds a bit depressing, but only if you resist the journey.

Peter has a glimpse of the glory of God and he wants to stay in it... except life doesn't work that way. It is a mountain-top experience. The world both stood still and changed in the moment. The direction of Jesus' journey is now to Jerusalem, where he will experience great suffering and rejection. Again, not what Peter had in mind.

It's 'interesting' getting to know someone. Remember getting to know a new colleague or neighbour - although a better example is having a new love. It doesn't matter if this is one of those pre-teen loves with an actor or musician in a magazine, or one with a person later. You see beauty in them, and more. Perhaps they inspire you or make you feel special. As you spend more time together you see more about them: what makes them angry; what makes them laugh, or cry. Different skills and talents they have. Different ways they respond to you and you respond to them. You discover what a complex person they are.

Jesus is like that, and more. In today's passage we have references to Jesus as servant and King, judge and visionary, law giver and lover - and the last one is key. It's what links all the aspects of Jesus, of God, together.

## Igniting the Power of Women and Girls to Decide Their Future

In the small village of Bihar in India, 13-year-old Poonam learned that her parents had arranged for her to be married in a few months.

In many parts of India, early marriages are a common practice and a significant issue—58 percent of girls are married before the age of 18. Girls who are forced into early marriages are taken out of school and made vulnerable to sexually transmitted infections and early pregnancy.


At a PWS&D-supported information session that addressed issues of gender, sexual and reproductive rights in her village, Poonam shared her worries about her marriage with the session leader, Meera.

The next day, Meera met with Poonam's family. The information shared by Meera helped Poonam's parents understand how important it was for Poonam to stay in school. As a result the wedding was postponed and a jubilant Poonam will be able to complete her education.

This Lenten season faithfully respond to empower women and girls with the tools they need to break down barriers of inequality.
