God of life,


your Spirit raised Jesus from dead.

seeing the light (literally & figuratively). Because of this he is caste out of the community and found by Jesus.

Sermon: What's the shepherd doing?

Dear Lord, please bless these words
and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Was psalm 23 the first psalm you ever learned? Somebody at the prayer group this week shared that she remembers saying it every week in the nursery when she was that young - and that it was a comfort.

My teacher training says that part of the reason is that repetition and pattern are comforting to young children. But this psalm is also very personal and full of caring. That is comforting.

There are times when it's good to leave it at that - just relaxing into the words and feelings. Personally, it's what I normally do with the 23^{rd} Psalm, but there's so much more in these familiar words. What's this psalm tell us?

Let's hear it again in the tradition King James translation.

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.

He restoreth my soul:

he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.

Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.

Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

The psalm starts with a beautiful vision. Is it of a fantastic future, or the present? It says, "I shall not want." Chances are there's something you want, so I guess it's the future. Although, I've met people who are wiser than me. They know God is there for them and while they have some desires, they don't have wants. They trust the Good Shepherd.

It is then all pastoral with lush meadows and nothing to fear. We are led to places we need to go to receive food, safety, and walk "the paths of righteousness."

What does it mean to follow the path of righteousness? One writer I came across this week talked about 'justice' being a better translation. It certainly would be nice to walk in a just world. Imagine a world where there is no discrimination by colour or gender or orientation or money or ability or language. A world were everything was fair.

But perhaps being "led in right paths" (New Revised Standard Version, NRSV) is less about what we are being led through than the journey we walk. This is very much 'righteousness'. As Christians, this means to live right with God, or to live the way God would like us to. Living God's way will look after our needs; it'll be the breath of life.

Could these three things (nourishment, safety, righteousness) be what "restores my soul"?

In Hebrew it's much more physical than 'soul'. It's about your life-breath. Think of those melo-dramatic moments in a TV show when everyone thinks the person has died, and then they draw in that life-breath. This is the breath you need to live - given by the LORD.

So, God is the Good Shepherd and leads us to all these things so that we don't want anything. Why isn't the world like that?

Because it was broken. God has set thing right, but it's not there yet.

One of the ways that this psalm brings comfort is it's acknowledgement that there are times when we "walk through the darkest valley," (NRSV), even under "the shadow of death." (KJV) There are lots of difficult times along our journey. I'm sure you can think of some examples. This psalm reminds us that we are

not alone. That The LORD is leading us. Our Shepherd has a rod and a staff to protect us from the worst.

Even the first part of the psalm has this under the pastoral beauty. It acknowledges various needs we have, and that God wants to lead us in ways that meet those needs. If there weren't challenges finding green pastures, then our Shepherd wouldn't have to lead us to them.

This is a source of comfort for the writer, and we are invited to take comfort from it as well. In following God there will be dark times, but in sticking close to God we are also protected.

And this isn't heading to a mere field, but to a glorious feast. This isn't an ordinary table, but the kings table. And the oil moistening our skin. While this is used for marking people with a special blessing (anointing), here the word is more sensual. This will be a luxurious feast.

I wonder about being in "the presence of my enemies." Is this like flaunting my success in their face, or is it that they are at the table with us. What would Jesus say if we asked him? Perhaps this is were we listen to the passage from John in which Jesus tells us, "I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice." Who are these others and what does it look like to include them? Are they our enemies? Are they also at the table? What would this look like here?

So, this psalm presents us with a view of the world - our world. The one in which we have needs, and sometimes feel the dark shadows surrounding us. It reminds us of God's leading us through these challenges.

Is the psalm just a call for us to follow God? Is that what it's about?

I don't think so.

One of the big reasons is the line near the end. "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life." The word 'follow' is a weak translation. Pursue or chase is better.

Somebody shared with me that when they were really young they were confused about why Shirley was following her - and she wasn't sure she wanted Shirley to. This line is almost saying God is stalking you - except it shouldn't be creepy. This is about a healthy love. A love that will allow us to go, but will never leave us. When you lose something, such as a coin or a sheep, you might look everywhere for it. To God, we are much more precious.

Which isn't to say that God doesn't try and direct us sometimes - or you could say lead us. A shepherd doesn't just use their rod and staff on attacking animals. Still, it's not just children in the nursery who find comfort in routine and rules. It's not just giving that shows love.

So, while this psalm talks a lot about us, it's really about God's love for us.

While this is drawing out the ending of the sermon, I'd like to share with you a recent translation of the psalm by Robert Alter, an expert in Biblical Hebrew.⁵

The LORD is my shepherd,

I shall not want.

In grass meadows He makes me lie down,
by quiet waters guides me.

My life He brings back.

take from The Book of Psalms by Robert Alter. 2007

He leads me on pathways of justice for His name's sake.

Though I walk in the vale of death's shadow, I fear no harm,

for You are with me.

Your rod and Your staff-

it is they that console me.

You set out a table before me

in the face of my foes.

You moisten my head with oil,

my cup overflows.

Let but goodness and kindness pursue me

all the days of my life.

And I shall dwell in the house of the LORD for many long days.

To God be the glory Amen.

Values: Read through a version of the psalm and share what

arises to your heart of mind.

Wonder: Ponder how God leads people. What examples can

you come up with from your own life?

Actions: Create your own version of Psalm 23. It could be a

poem or story with updated images instead of sheep. Perhaps something visual, musical, with

actions, or even culinary?

Daily prayers are submitted by the colleges, committees, agencies and mission societies of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.





