🗽 Intro to the readings

Our last hymn was psalm 47. I suspect the lectionary chose this one because of it's celebration and global vision... and that it includes the word 'Ascend'.

- The passage from Ephesians provides a vision of Jesus in heaven. One where Jesus is not only more powerful than anyone on earth, but also accessible.
- Or Today's 'gospel' is actually found in Acts. It's also found at the end of Luke as the end of Jesus' ministry on earth - but it is told again here as the start of the acts of the apostles. What happens, and what do they do?

Reading: Please look up the passages in your own Bible,⁴ or click on the name to be taken to an online version (NRSV).

Ephesians 1: 15-23

Acts 1: 1-14

Sermon: Ascension - now what?

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.⁵ Amen.

Are we there yet?

You've heard this.

but try to distance yourself from the cartoons (or memories) of whiny kids in the back seat on the "long" trip. Think of when you've felt like saying it...

Chances are you were expecting to have arrived somewhere, and you hadn't. It was even obvious that you hadn't, because you

were still on the journey. I imagine you were feeling one of two things - maybe both. Either you had just woken up and were curious for an update on when you would arrive. The other is a need to express your disappointment, and perhaps frustration, at not being there yet.

"Lord, is this the time?" ask the disciples.

Now remember what it's like to be asked "Are we there yet? Jesus invited this group of people to learn from him. They journeyed from rural Galilee to Jerusalem, the centre of Jewish culture. Along the way Jesus taught crowds about the Kingdom of God through stories and gave them glimpses through healings and his actions. His disciples also received private tutoring from The Teacher to help them better understand. Then there was the trauma of the trial and crucifixion... and the shock & joy of his resurrection. After which Jesus continues to appear to them over the course of forty days - teaching them again about the Kingdom of God. You'd think they would be experts by now - but they're still not sure. They are wondering, 'Are you going to do it now Jesus? Is it time? Are we there yet?'

It's a question everyone is still asking - not just kids in the back seat. Do you remember first hearing about COVID? Ever since the pandemic was declared people have been asking 'is it time yet?' And for those of us who dream of the Kingdom of God in which the world is at peace and everyone is well... we ask God, 'is it time yet?' We are waiting to arrive into the promised Kingdom of peace, love and happiness. We're unsure about what's happening. Are we close? Why aren't we there yet?

As Jesus gathers the disciples on a nice hill outside Jerusalem the disciples were unsure about what was happening. They had the expectations of peace and happiness under the Kingdom of God. There were different expectations of how it would be done: perhaps Jesus would bring a big army of angels, or an army of the people, or make everything peaceful, or perhaps wave a wand.

Is it time?

'Don't focus on that,' Jesus replies. 'Instead, I want you not to leave town. You are going to receive power through the Holy Spirit and spread the dream from here to the ends of the earth.'

and then Jesus ascended...
not up a flight of steps or a ladder. "As they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight."

What's going on?

There's a few things.

There's the physical Jesus going up. We probably have a better idea of what that might have been like having seen movies where people float up into the sky. I would assume is wasn't supper fast. Maybe starting slow and then speeding up. Then again, maybe it's a poetic description. This doesn't seem to be the important part of Jesus ascending.

But it is important. While we don't talk about Jesus ascending much, it does show up in the creeds - summaries of what we believe. Take the Apostle's Creed, there's the line, "he ascended into heaven, and sits on the right hand of God the Father Almighty."

What important about this?

This is Jesus we're talking about. He is like us. Yes, a perfect example of what we could be, but still like us. His ascension shows a breaking of the barriers between earth and heaven. There is no spiritual realm and physical world. Physical bodies are not bad. They can go to heaven. We can go to heaven.

This was important to the early Christians. It's one reason why this story is included in the Bible and included in the creeds.

It's also a story of transitions. There's Jesus transitioning from his mission on earth to duties in heaven, and there's transition for his followers. They are told to keep sharing the dream.

Transitions can be exciting, and stressful; full of worry and the unexpected. Change is often hard. It's all magnified when there's waiting involved. Ignoring COVID for a minute, I'm sure you've all experienced this. Before starting in a new school, remember waiting through the summer. Perhaps you were moving out for the first time - exciting and concerning. What about starting a new job, or the trial of looking for one. Then there's waiting for the doctor to call. What would it mean?

Waiting. Wondering how the world would change.

What do you do?

What did the disciples do?

We read that they did as they were told and went back to Jerusalem to wait.

I wonder if that was hard? I can find waiting for something hard. They had seen some exciting things. They'd been told to go

out and tell people. How tempted were they to just start. Maybe get a head start on God.

But they waited. and they didn't do nothing.

Which I'll admit is a confusing sentence. Sometimes when people wait they do nothing - which is what they didn't do.

They stayed together. It's important to gather your community when there's a transition or change happening. And it wasn't just the twelve men, there were the women and others. People who were important parts of the community.

And they dealt with some administration details. The twelve were no longer twelve. Judas was gone. Figuring that Jesus had made a point of having twelve assistants, they elected a replacement. (It's rather interesting, and you can find it in the next few verses of Acts.) Even if we don't know what's coming in our lives, you can still do things to get ready.

And mostly they prayed - actually, always they prayed. In the original Greek it's a continuous verb. They prayed non-stop... until God moved them - but that's next week's story.

In the mean time, we can learn. We can remember that transitions are not new. That when we find ourselves in them we should be a community, sort out details so we can be ready to go when God calls us, and pray - lots.

And we can remember that Jesus is real. That Jesus isn't past tense, because Jesus ascended and is with God working to bring everything into God's way. We'll hear more about that next week when the Spirit comes in at Pentecost - but for this week, let's pray.

To God be all the glory Amen.

Responding to God

FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies. Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Wonder: How do you think the disciples felt when they saw Jesus disappear to Heaven?

Memories: How are you at waiting? Talk about times when you've had to sit and wait (yes, you can include now if you like). What do you do?

Values: What do you value/appreciate about transitions/change? It might be easiest to pick a specific example.

Etching: Share about different experiences you've had with prayer? (ex. verbal, written, collective, alone, silent, with movement, with images, making images, ...) You can start by listing experiences, but also share the experiences.

Actions: Pray every day this week for Kensington and our community. This can be done alone or together. It can involve questions/requests and listening.

Spirit Sighting

Often we hear of companies polluting the environment to save some money. Recently I read about over 40 European and UK companies who sent a letter to the Brazilian government saying that if they passed a new Bill that would make it easier to chop down the Amazon Rain-forest they would stop buying from Brazil. The bill is currently receiving lots of amendments. We'll see what happens, but having companies fight for the environment is a sign of the Kingdom.⁶

and the glory are yours



Transform Online Course

Last fall, ministry leaders from across Canada came together for The Presbyterian Church in Canada's Transform online course. Over four weeks, Rick Morse—co-creator of the New Beginnings church renewal program and author of Making a Congregational Plan


