Sermon: Command: love!

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.<sup>5</sup> Amen.

Love.

How would you describe it?

I suppose to start - it's a feeling, or a collection of feelings. There's the warmth you feel from being in love, or receiving love. There's desire to spend time with your love. There can be confusion early on, but it grows into assurance as you learn to trust your love. The notion of love as a feeling is all around us; in the songs we hear, the TV we watch, the books we read, ....

So, what are we supposed to do with Jesus saying, "This is my commandment, that you love one another"? Can you be commanded to feel a certain way?

Imagine two squabbling siblings. They are yelling. Perhaps each trying to pull a doll away from the other by the hair - or perhaps pulling each other's hair out. Imagine telling them to, "Stop! You must love each other." This might remind them that they should love, but does telling them make them feel it?

Probably not, but it might get them to stop and try acting like it anyway.

And this might be where the command from God to love comes in. But I think there's a miscommunication, or mistranslation, going on.

An example of what I'm thinking of comes from the Apostle's Creed. When I first learned it we said that Jesus "descended to hell." Now "he descended to the dead." What's with the change? Hell conjures up pictures of fire and brimstone with devils torturing the souls of evil people. This relates to the to a concept/place called *Ghenna*, but the Apostle's Creed is referring to *Sheol*. This is a different vision. It's just the place were the dead go, bad and good. There's no judgment. Recent translators feel that saying 'hell' is misleading.<sup>6</sup>

I suspect we have a similar issue with 'commandments'. We think of a command as a rule that must be followed to the letter. What if we've got the understanding slightly wrong. What if when Jesus says, "If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love" it's not a threat about following a list of rules or fail to earn God's love. What if it's a description of what it's like to live (abide) in God's love?

There's lots of rules in the Bible. The most famous collection is the 10 Commandments. What if we look at them as descriptions of living in love? Going through them in reverse order:

- don't get obsessed with wanting what somebody else has, because that's going to build a wall for love
- don't commit adultery,
   because that will hurt people. It's not what love looks like.
- don't lie,

because that betrays people. It's not what love looks like.

- don't steel,
   again, betrayal & hurt.... not love
- don't murder... more hurt and betryal not love.
- honour your mother and father, because that is what love looks like.
- take the Sabbath for yourself and others, because times of work & rest are what love looks like.
- Use the name of God appropriately, because respect is what love looks like.
- don't make images of God, because limiting God to an image is not what love is.
- don't have anything more important than God, because that's just a pale reflection of love.

Does that help? They're not a list of ten rules to an end, but a description of what love looks like; a model for how to live love.

When Jesus is asked what the greatest commandment is, the answer comes from the Older Testament<sup>7</sup>. Jews call this the Shema and many have a version on the door of their house. The reply with Jesus is, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself."

Again, connecting the commandments to love.

This suggests that love isn't about a feeling. Yes, there are feelings with love, but that's not what it is. It's about beautiful relationships.

I'm reminded of *Fiddler on the Roof.* While I haven't seen the movie, we listened to the record a lot while I was growing up. There's a song in which the father in the story asks his wife, "Do you love me?" She reflects that they've been working and living together for 25 years - and now he asks. He reflects back that the first time they met was their wedding night. They were both shy and scared. He'd been told by his parents that they would learn to love each other, and now he's asking. They decide that yes, they do love each other. That their love grew out of their actions together.

So how do we love? How do we keep Christ's commandment that we love God and one another?

The Bible has many ideas on how to love God. We can see that in the 10 Commandments, and in how Jesus lived - and loved. We covered several ideas on how to love God last week.<sup>9</sup>

The same is true for loving others.

Now this can get into the question of who are these others that we are to love. In response Jesus told the story about

someone being helped out by the least likely person imaginable. Basically, we are to love they expected people, and the unexpected. People we agree with, and those we don't.

Which isn't to say we agree and support everything someone says or does. As a teacher and as a parent I've told kids that I care about them, but that what they did was not appropriate. Which is like the commandments telling us what is appropriate, loving, behaviour.

Which leads us to loving like the Commandments suggest - or taking the short cut and loving as Jesus loves.

Which is pretty tough. Jesus was prepared to give up a regular life and family to show love. He was prepared to die to show love. If that seems hard to follow, remember also that God knows you better than your parents, or teachers, or other lovers - better than you know yourself. God chose you before you chose God because God loves you.

So love God and love others.

Love as God commands. Love is about actions. Love is about relationships. Love others for who they are (children of God), and love yourself for what makes you valuable (a child of God).

As we heard in the gospel reading, "My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples. As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete."

In the name of God: Creator, Son & Spirit - Holy and One. Amen.






