-Sermon: Pentecost Pentkot خمسین Pentecôte ペンテコステ Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.⁷ Amen.

It's been a roller-coaster of a time for the followers of Jesus. The excitement of arriving in Jerusalem for the big festival of Passover that turned into a parade with palms. Then that special supper with Jesus - followed by his arrest, unfair trial, and crucifixion at the calling of the crowd. As they sit in shock, women bring the news comes in that Jesus is alive... and he is. He continues to teach them about helping people live God's love... until he disappears into the sky.

They are told they will spread the exciting news everywhere, but for now, just hang out and wait.

So they have.

We're told those who were learning from Jesus did a little big of preparation, but mostly they prayed.

I wonder if they were patient prayers, or questioning prayers, 'what's next' prayers, or 'hurry up' prayers. I suspect all of the above.

Whatever they prayed, there was no going back for them. They had witnessed a vision of a better way for the world to be. They have witnessed a hope for everyone that was more powerful than death. They didn't know what was coming, but they couldn't go back to the same old life they'd had before.

and then it happened.

Jerusalem was crowded again with pilgrims for the festival of Shavuot (Feast of Weeks). It's a harvest festival that celebrates God's abundant gifts (with help from the Biblical book of <u>Ruth</u>⁸). People journeyed from all over to be there.

Those first followers were gathered together when the extraordinary happened. It was indescribable - but later they try anyways. It sounded like a huge wind ripping through the house, except it wasn't. And there was a sparkling in the air, like sunlight on the water or flames without a candle. And this light rests on everybody's head.



Which was amazing. This wasn't just for Peter, or the 12 apostles, or just the men... this was for everyone.

and, Wow! The energy just couldn't be contained.

They burst out onto the streets overflowing with excitement. Everyone talking at once. You'd think it would be just a babble of voices, except it wasn't.

They were speaking clearly in languages from all over - from

where all those visitors had come.

Have you ever been like those visitors?

Travelling in a foreign place where they don't speak your language. Perhaps you have learned some of their language in school, or tried some Duolingo? But to be surrounded by crowds in an unfamiliar city, all speaking in a language you don't really know... and then you hear it.

Somebody speaking your language.

It's like a flashlight piercing the darkness. You may not see the source, but as it washes over you every molecule in your body relaxes into that sound. You don't even know what they're saying, but you are drawn towards it.

This is one of the things that happens when the Holy Spirit came that day. It was one of the gifts that was given. It was one of the ways barriers between people where broken.

At it's interesting that it happened like this.

God could easily have done it the other way around. The disciples keep speaking their language and everyone else becomes like them. But that's not what happens. God recognizes the differences and respects that. The Holy Spirit working in this way affirms that diversity is good and not to be feared.

and the diversity doesn't stop with languages.

Peter (you remember him, the one who was always 'putting his food in his mouth' and how had denied Jesus?), well Peter stands up a delivers a great sermon. He points out that the Holy Spirit has come for everyone. All ages are included; all genders; all income levels, people with status and without... God's Spirit is open to anyone.

It's not that your age, or gender, or language, etc don't matter,

it's that they aren't barriers for God.

Why does God bother with all this diversity?
Wouldn't it be easier if everyone where the same?
Wouldn't that make for a stronger body of believers?

Because together we are formed in the image of God. None of us has it all. Our differences help us know God better.

They also help us make the world better.

True; not all the time. Our differences cause lots of conflict as well. But when we are welcoming of others this makes the world better. Take languages as an example. Each language has different ways of structuring ideas. This creates different ways to see problems - and solutions. Each language has different words, or ways of expressing ideas or feelings. This allows a greater expression of ideas and feelings. It also helps us not get stuck in our own little perspective.

Diversity brings not just different ways of expressing something, but also different skills, wisdom, experiences, and energy. These aren't automatically used to make the world better, but they can be. The gift of the Holy Spirit can break through the barriers to bring people together.

Which is something to notice about these gifts. It's not like many birthday gifts. The gifts aren't for the disciples. Sure, Peter being able to give a sermon without saying something embarrassing is nice, but they're used to that. And the languages... not necessary for them.

But their gifts aren't for them. They are to share the Good News with the people around them - in this case, people from the ends of the earth.

Which is exciting for them. But that was then and this is now.

Except, that that's not quite true. Yes, that was a very special day, but it wasn't the only time the Holy Spirit came. We had a story a few weeks ago from later in Acts when Peter was giving another sermon to a centurion and his household. The Holy Spirit didn't wait for Peter to finish before flowing through those people who had different languages and customs.

And the Holy Spirit continues to be active - even now. We all have gifts - a diversity of gifts. Some are more up front like Peter speaking to the crowd, some of our gifts are more connecting with neighbours, or being passionate about injustice, or praying, or fixing things, or teaching, or listening, or organizing, or sharing through wordless languages of music, dance, math and other arts, ...

Today's Pentecost story is one of a new beginning when the Holy Spirit came down and dramatically moved the disciples out of their room, bridging the barriers between people - and between them and God.

It is today's Pentecost story because it is still happening today. We are being invited into a new beginning. We have been given gifts. If you're not sure what they are, ask your friends. We are being invited out to share God's love and hope.


In Hebrew, the word used for the Spirit is *ruach* . . . a feminine noun. Genesis Chapter 1 and Psalm 139 are two passages of scripture which speak of the Spirit in female images. These are reflected in this song.

At first, it may seem strange to use the pronoun 'she', but that is the fault both of the English language and of masculine-oriented theology which fails to grasp the liberating significance of Paul's comment that in Jesus Christ 'there is neither male nor female'.
