
Jesus left us a prayer to guide us into a healthier relations with

Sermon: What is the church?

Dear Lord, please bless these words

and the meditations of our hearts.⁵ Amen.

The last of the schools got out for the summer this week. For those graduating it was different than normal. The stories I heard had less sitting in a hot stuffy hall and more about fun activities outside the school - there even seems to have been some divine intervention with the weather.

Now school is many things. It's a place were people are gathered by age, and latter by interest and ability. It's a place where we learn about subjects, relationships, and life. There are rules laid down to help us succeed... and other rules we learn through relationships. At school we practice these skills in the

hopes we will succeed in life. They try to give us hope.

This last week is the shifting of seasons for those in elementary and secondary school. Times of change.

We are also going into a season of change for the church as well as we consider our emergence from COVID. Though before we can entirely figure out what that will look like, we should consider what is church?

If we were to ask people on the street what church is, I suspect they would point us to a building probably an old looking one with stained glass windows.

Buildings have a lot to say. They can also provide an atmosphere that stills the soul and help us to focus.

Is that what church is, or is the building just a womb?

If you read through the Newer Testament you'll find the word for 'church' pops up over 100 times. In none of them does it refer to a building; it always refers to a gathering of people. Specifically, a group of people gathered by the Holy Spirit.

And what do they do together? They meet, sing hymns, pray, celebrate Communion and baptisms, try to sort out what it means to live like a Christian, have disagreements about it (which is what much of the letters in the Newer Testament are trying to sort out), and they share the hope they have found in God through telling their encounter of the Good News and helping others.⁶

I'm sure there's much in that little paragraph you can relate to. The first part sounds like a typical Sunday morning: hymns, prayer, maybe Communion or a baptism. There's also study and questions in Sunday school and book studies - and a little bit with sermons.

Is this what church is? a series of actions we do together?

What do you remember from school?

I suspect it could be boiled down to relationships. Relationships with friends and with teachers. Hopefully you had one of those magic teachers who could help you relate a subject to your life - and that life is about more than just you. While it can sometimes seem like school is about going through a series of actions, there are deeper relationships going on.

And relationships are key to church as well. Personally, when I think of 'what is church' I have lines from the 1972 hymn *We are the church* going thorough my head?

This hymn talks about a gathering of people - and that is definitely a part of church - going back to those Biblical roots.

Now, as with students ending their school semester for the summer, 'the church' needs to figure out what to do with itself. There are a couple of things to reflect on to do that.

Student, and the church, will probably want to do something that reflects who they are and that they find interesting.

Who is the church, or more specifically, who is Kensington? How would you describe us?

There's the building, and our practices/actions. And there's the people.

We are a multi-generational and multi-cultural group of people pulled together by the Holy Spirit from a variety of backgrounds. Something which, I've heard, has become stronger since selling part of the building is that we've become a stronger community. We're a group that values music, and a diversity of it. We want to value our children. We are a group of individuals who quietly reach out to help others and hope not to be noticed. The individuals gathered in Kensington by the Holy Spirit (you) bring all sorts of wisdom and skills.



Of course, Church is not just about a great group of people. It's about our relationship with God, and God's relationship with us and the world. That's the trouble with thinking about church as a building or a series of actions. We forget that God is the centre of it all. One way that the church is described is 'the body of Christ'.

The song says "the church is a people." "We are the church."

The church is the Body of Christ. We are the body of Christ. How do you feel about that?

If you'll remember back in recent weeks we've heard that God coming close can bring fear... and peace. It's okay to be a little afraid at being the body of Christ in the world.

One aspect of this that brings me peace is the collectiveness of it. We are the church. Not *I* am the church. It's not all up to me. For that matter, Kensington is not the church either, just a part of it.

Thank God!

Through the Holy Spirit we have all become a part of Kensington - we are all just a part of the Body of Christ. And, just as the Holy Spirit has pulled us together, so we are being called into the next season.

We can look back at what we've done before, but we need to take the right lesson from that.

Marie-Hélène read a section of Hebrews about great heroes of faith. There's three important points to remember today. None of them were ordained for ministry, and the didn't do the same thing. Could you imagine Moses building an ark because it had worked before? Or if Daniel had decided to confront the king like Moses instead of praying? The third is that they were all considered faithful.

Remembering what we've done and who we are will give us clues as to where we're going and what that will look like - but it hopefully won't be the same. We pray it will be better.

How does our building serve what God is doing?

How do our practices or actions serve God?

This language of serving is an important part of the Christian understanding of what is church. Jesus didn't come and telling people sweet stories and instructing them to build special buildings to huddle inside and be nice to each other. He told his followers to spread the Good News; to share the hope they have found in life, and to help people.

Noah did this by building an emergency shelter; Moses and his team stood up to the government; Daniel stayed at home and prayed.

What's something we do that may serve God?

Take for music for example. Church music can help us express our lament and joy, challenge us to do justice and bring us peace. This is good, but it can do more. Music can be a connection and a witness to our neighbours - and *from* our neighbours. It can be a vehicle for all those in need of expressing themselves and finding hope. This takes music from something we do and allows it to serve beyond ourselves.

Is this how God is calling us to be in the future? Or are we to be making connections with other faiths? Or reaching out to the young families in NDG... or all the dog owners? There are many areas we can focus on in our next season, and thankfully we aren't called to tackle them all. We are a part of a larger body - a larger church.

Where's the clue?

Where do we see God at work?

Well, there's the passage about where two or three are gathered... if you have a notion, and you can find another one or two people this might be a good sign.

Take for example youth. Recently a couple of people have felt the pull to help the youth and children in Kensington, so they contact Antoinette to see how they could help.

What is church?

Well, it's a bit like school. It's a collection of people practising for life and being a part of society... but it's more than that to. Church is a collection of people called together by the Holy Spirit to support each other as we practice, together, what it means to be Christ's body - to look for how to join God in the world.

To God be all the glory Amen.

Memories: What are some memories you have of school?

Etching: What have you appreciated about church?

Values: Identify some issues in your local borough or global village.

Actions: Pray together about this issue, and for Kensington's reopening.

Equipping New Leaders

Growing up in a village in northern Malawi where the nearest health facility is 30 km away, Dorica Nkhata knows about the importance of accessible health care. Working at Embangweni Mission Hospital as a nurse and noticing a critical shortage of doctors, she



decided to pursue her dream of becoming a doctor at the Malawi College of Medicine. She approached the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian, Livingstonia Synod, for assistance. At our partner's request, the PCC accepted Dorica into the Leadership Development Program. With financial support from Knox Presbyterian Church in St. Catharines, Ont., and Presbyterians Sharing, Dorica is on her way to fulfilling her dream and serving those in need in rural Malawi. Presbyterians Sharing supports leadership development through medical and theological education and training programs in Kenya, Malawi, Lebanon and Eastern Europe.
