And so we come before you to strengthen our relationships.


In you name we pray: Father, Son & Holy Spirit - Holy and one. Amen.

- start with a continuation of Paul's advice to the church in Corinth. Last week he talked about not letting how he lives get in the way of somebody hearing the hope of God. Now he offers an analogy of how hard to work.
- highlights from Daniel. Leading up to this Daniel has done very well in the Babylonian government. It looks like he's going to be promoted to head administrator... but not everyone likes him.
- The passage from Luke (and in Mark & Matthew) is tucked inside a story about an important official asking Jesus to come and heal his daughter. The crowds are excited to see this.
- The psalm might be one athletes can relate to... and you as well.

Sermon: When the door is opened

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.<sup>4</sup> Amen.

For those who like watching sports, this is an exciting season. There was the Canadiens building to a Stanley Cup challenge, the Euros (and Copa cup), and now the Olympics. And the start

Psalm 19:14

of the Olympics ties in remarkably well to the next part of Paul's letter to the church in Corinth - the famous race analogy.

Paul encourages us to 'run the race' to win - like the athletes at the Olympics. And like them, he tell us to be disciplined in looking after ourselves and our training. How do we practice? ... with Christian practices. What's a Christian practice? It's something that Christians have done and find helps them walk with God. The two most obvious are praying and reading the Bible. Others that are less talked about include: community & hospitality, seeking justice, listening, using your gifts to help others (yes, financial, but also skills/talents & opportunities), reflecting on life, fasting (not just for Jews and Muslims), and sharing our stories. These are all practices or training techniques that have been well tested. They will help you 'run the race' to win.

They're not a promise to keep you out of trouble. Which makes sense. They don't take you out of the race; they help you practice for it. Sometimes, like in the case of Daniel, they might even land you in it. If he hadn't had the practice of praying to God then he wouldn't have been thrown to the lions... of course, he also wouldn't have had the strength, endurance and wisdom to run the course his life took.

Are you a runner? I'm not, but I can relate to something runners say, especially marathoners. There comes a point when

you feel like you can't go on, but if you push through it you find you can - and it's exhilarating. In this case I don't think it works with our analogy. Daniel didn't push through and survive the lions because of his strength and determination. He did it because he practised living in God's story - through prayer, and living by God's standards. (Such as an earlier story about him and his friends only eating what God wanted them to, and that he was uncorruptible.) His following God may have led him into the lions den, but God also lead him out again.

The writer of the Psalm had a similar experience. They sing, "I will exalt you for you lifted me out." We don't know out of what, but it doesn't sound like it was good. There's also the implication that things aren't going so well at the moment. "Hear, O LORD, and be merciful." But just because things aren't going so well, the writer doesn't lose faith. They practice remembering and reflecting on their life. They sing, "You turned my wailing into dancing." They don't lean on their own strength, but use their practice of reflection to lean on God's strength. They trust God to lead them up again.

One of the new events at the Olympics is rock climbing (technically: sport climbing). It's about going up. I think this makes a better analogy than running because there's no set route - like life. No one has a map of their life journey. In Sport Climbing the competitor doesn't see the other's attempts, or even the climbing wall until they



are to climb it. They have to decide the best route and go for it.

Imagine the advantage of being able to follow someone who knows the best route for you? That's one of the great things about following Jesus. He has climbed wall. He knows both you and the wall and how you can climb it. This is who Paul turns to when he tells the Corinthians (and us) not to "run aimlessly."

Unfortunately, like running, the climbing analogy also doesn't go all the way either, because Jesus doesn't mind if you reach out and grab his coat-tails. While that's not possible in climbing, it is

in cycling. There's a technique called drafting. Not only does the person in front lead you along the route, but it takes you less effort. Drafting behind Jesus takes effort, but less than if you're breaking your own way.



Where the cycling analogy breaks down is that God will actually give you strength. Think of the woman who reaches out to touch Jesus' tassels. She stretches towards God with the faith that Jesus can heal her - and it happens. Her life doesn't go back to what it was before she was sick, but she now has peace and is able to continue her life/journey/race. She is healed.

And so, while we may not be Olympic athletes, Paul reminds us that we are in a race - one that's different than running or climbing or cycling. Like for those races we need good practices, but unlike them we can follow Jesus in the best route, and reach out to find the Holy Spirit inside us - giving us strength, endurance and wisdom. This race that we're all in is also different

from the Olympics in that this is a race we can all win.


Here are some small examples...

# Food Assistance Provides Comfort During Difficult Times

In Afghanistan, Razia and her four children lost their home when they could no longer afford to pay rent. Abandoned by her husband and left with few



prospects to earn an income due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Razia and her children sought refuge in a spare room at the local mosque. Razia's son did small jobs to earn money, but it wasn't enough to sustain the family. Fortunately, the family was selected to be recipients of a food assistance project run by Community World Service Asia, a partner of Presbyterian World Service & Development. Monthly cash transfers were provided to 1,100 vulnerable families, including many who had returned to Afghanistan from Iran. "We were blessed as the cash helped us to purchase essential groceries. I have also bought warm clothing for my children so the winters will be warm and comfortable," Razia said.
