Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours Amen.






rayer for Illumination

Psalm 19:14

This morning is one of excitement and celebration, because we're adding another way of worshipping. We've become pretty good at joining in worship with the print version, coming together over Zoom, and engaging with YouTube. (Which is, surprisingly, a rather unique combination of options.) And this morning we celebrate the additional option of coming in person.

This is something Jesus was all about. Wherever Jesus went, there was excitement and crowds. Often they were joyous, sometimes not. Jesus even had a reputation for celebration. In the Gospel According to John, the first wonder Jesus does is to help a wedding celebration. Some people even suggested Jesus not be taken seriously because he celebrated too much.

Today we're celebrating that we can again gather in this building.

Now, we know that God is everywhere. God is just as much in our home as in the Kensington sanctuary, or in a park, or cafe, or wherever you happen to be reading or viewing the service... but many people find something special about a church building.

This came up in the prayer group about a year ago when we were able to meet in person for a few weeks between lock-downs. People shared how they knew God was with them everywhere, but it was easier to feel in the church building. They felt the peace of God just walking into the Sanctuary. I suspect it has to do with practice. We are used to noticing God here. There's also the memories of events: baptisms, pageants, choir anthems, communion, ... and there's the community. It was the thought of seeing people again that lit up Peggy's face this week.

She was feeling what Paul felt when writing to the church in

Rome. Paul couldn't wait for his work in Jerusalem to be wrapped up "so that by God's will I may come to you with joy and be refreshed in your company." The joy of being together.

This is an important aspect of joy, and one that has been hard to have during COVID. Joy involves connecting or interacting outside yourself. You might even say it involves something intruding into yourself.

Most references in the Bible to joy are more pointed than that. They usually refer to God's actions in the world. This could be people experiencing joy through creation - or even creation's direct joyful response to God. Isaiah writes,

"For you shall go out in joy, and be led back in peace; the mountains and the hills before you shall burst into song, and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands." 9

During this summer's vacation we went canoe camping. We

were blessed to experience some of the joy in creation come into our lives. There was the peace of the water, the wonder of the loons, and the sunsets. Madeline L'Engle writes that it's the joy something can have when it is being what it was created to be. 10



More often Biblical joy refers to the saving work of God. Sometimes it's about saving from earthly troubles - such as in today's psalm that sings of how we can enter God's house and leave our troubles at the gate. Although life isn't quite so black and white. It's more like how we describe the Kingdom of

Heaven; it's 'here, but not yet'.

This is one of the gifts of joy - it can come even while life is hard. Something else that Jesus is all about. We can see that in the way that Jesus descends into the lives of those who are sick or outcasts and lifts them up. He even descends into death and rises again. This is the Gospel; the Good News.

As Paul put it to the Romans, "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." ¹¹

How's that for Good News?

What would you do for that love?

which, admittedly, is an odd question if nothing can separate us from the love of God. But I think it's a little like my family experiencing the joy in creation this summer. It was there, but we also went looking for it. Without that, I'm not sure we would have noticed.

Back to the question, 'what would you do for that love?' or perhaps a different angle, 'how do you react to that love?'

Our Gospel passage gave us a joyful response. A person is cutting through a field when he finds a treasure. "In his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field." This joy intrudes into his life, and in joy he sells everything. He trades everything he knows for this treasure in the field. He lays aside his life for God's love.

This is a part of joy.

There's the interaction with someone or something, and noticing it. Then there the way you lose yourself to it. The way you are no longer aware of you and are filled with joy.

You didn't see Markus sharing his joy in jumping on one toe, but remember the way a child can be so consumed with a flower, or playing in the sand, or even just the way their hand works.

Joy and burdens are a bit like the chicken and the egg. Where does it start? Is it allowing yourself to be filled with joy that pushes aside your burdens? Or does laying down your burdens allow you to experience joy?

Really, like the chicken and the egg, God comes first. God is there loving us and leading us into interactions with people and situations; inviting us to lose ourselves into the joyous love of God.

To God be all the glory Amen.

You are Love, living and dancing through creation; You are Light, challenging and purifying our hearts;


You are Peace, deep and unfathomable, working through and beyond all pain and conflict.

An Education for Robina

Robina lives with her mother, father and five siblings in a make-shift house in Afghanistan. Both of her parents are unemployed, and Robina is the only member of her family attending school. In Afghanistan, 62 percent of children do not attend school. Often, families with many children cannot afford uniforms and school



supplies for each child. Girls are especially disadvantaged because of a shared cultural belief that if girls study, they bring shame on their families. Only one in five students in Afghan schools are female, and only about one in 10 adult women are literate. Presbyterian World Service & Development (PWS&D) is passionate about ensuring a world in which all children can access quality education. Working with local partners, PWS&D helps parents and religious leaders understand girls' rights—most importantly, the right to education.

Tuesday, September 14 We pray for LGBTQI+ student groups and their teachers as they build communities of love, learning and support in their schools.



Thursday, September 16 We pray for the members of the Continuing Education Grants Committee that meet this month.




Saturday, September 18 We pray for God's wisdom and guidance to protect creation and the world's biodiversity.
