Lintro to the readings

- Jeremiah spent decades relaying God's messages of impending punishment. Now that the Babylonians have brought destruction, Jeremiah is able to send messages like this to those in exile.
- Our psalm will be the whole thing, and familiar (from two weeks ago). Which half of the psalm are you relating to this morning
- While called a letter, Hebrews is more of a sermon that was a virtually delivered sermon (remembering that paper was the technology of the day). In this section the preacher is linking Jesus to the priest Melchizedek... would have been pretty forgettable with a couple of references, except his fame in this book.
- o In the previous chapter of the Gospel Jesus went up the mountain and met with Moses, Elijah, & God. Now Jesus turns towards Jerusalem and his fate there. Along the way people come with desires such as the rich man wanting a different life, James & John wanting glory and power. They receive hard invitations. How do things go in this encounter?

Sermon: Reaching out for Jesus - Alex Plant Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.⁵ Amen.

Today's Gospel reading is one of many stories we find Jesus healing those who call out to him. Their faith in Jesus' power heals them and we have a happy ending. So too do we have our stories of faith, where we prayed, reaching out to Jesus, calling upon his grace to bless us with healing and salvation. But sometimes we overlook the people that Jesus is healing, focusing on the actual act of healing rather than understanding the people Jesus is healing. And this isn't fully our own doing. Many of the healing acts of Jesus involve unnamed individuals. He heals lepers, but we don't know who they are. He cured Paralytics, but we do not know their names. He restores the sight of those who are blind. Some we do not know, but one we do know is the blind beggar we read from the Gospel of Mark.

Bartimaeus, son of Timaeus, was a blind man begging by the roadside outside of Jerico. Not much is known about this man. The fact that we know his name is a very rare piece of information. Others in the Gospels who were healed or resurrected that are named include Malchus and Lazarus. More often however, those who seek Jesus' healing power are left unnamed. I often struggle to remember names, and I'm sure I'm not the only one who does. When you meet someone for the first time, sometimes there's overwhelming information being given to us and our focus is on other things the person is saying rather than the biographical details given to us.

When we read about the miracles that Jesus did during his ministry, what do we know about the people Jesus is ministering

to? Sometimes we see that he ministers to crowds of people, while other times it's people in families or people who come to Jesus alone. In Bartimaeus' case, we know that his father's name is Timaeus and that he is a blind beggar sitting on the side of the road outside of Jerico, hoping that passers-by take pity on him. Here in Montreal, we too see those on the side of the road. We usually don't know much about them, we don't know if they are suffering from a medical condition or live in financial instability or if they were cast out of their family because of who they are.

Some of the homeless we see in Montreal are quiet, sometimes seemingly invisible. You may hear them asking for help as people walk by, sometimes they walk up to people directly, or some may just sit quietly on the sidewalk holding a sign or hidden away as they watch onlookers walk past. When we see Bartimaeus on the side of the road, we do not know what he is typically like. What we do know is that when he hears that Jesus is walking past him, he gains a determination to reach out to him like never before.

I'd like you to think of a time when you got really excited when you had the chance to be with someone you haven't seen in a long time or when you met someone you admired for the first time. I have a cousin who lives in British Columbia. The last 2 times I went out and visited her was 2005 and 2013. Just a few months before the pandemic hit, my cousin told me that she was going to be in Mississauga for a week. Being here in Montreal, I wasn't exactly close. But my cousin and I shared some very deep memories together, and I was not going to pass up a chance to visit my cousin. With the geographical boundary significantly shortened, I hopped on a train and off I went. My excitement was rising with each kilometer I went.

When I finally saw her for the first time in 7 years, she and I literally ran towards each other, hugged each other very closely, and began to cry. It felt like a reunion that was long overdue. I

never felt so excited and happy to see anyone in my life. It was a wild weekend. We caught up after 7 years, we visited the CN Tower, and gave her the grand tour of Toronto, as she had never been this far East before.

Now imagine Bartimaeus' reaction⁸ when he heard that Jesus was passing by. Like the excitement I had for seeing the cousin I hadn't seen in over 7 years, Bartimaeus "began to shout out and say, Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Such determination and emotion. Of course, Bartimaeus does not know what Jesus looks like, but he does know who Jesus is. Whether he learns it from passing conversation or if he is told, we do not know. But what we see here, is that he knows who Jesus is, not just the man or by the miracles that he performs, but as the Son of David. I took note of the work of Raquel Lettsome in their analysis of this story. They point out that this is

the first time in Mark's Gospel that Jesus is referred to as Son of David. Here, the political implications of Jesus' journey to Jerusalem are made known. Son of David is not just a genealogical reference to Jesus' genealogical heritage, it is a recognition of his messianic nature. Bartimaeus recognizes Jesus for who he is, and he calls out to him.

But as we see in the Gospel, the crowd attempts to silence Bartimaeus. And while we aren't sure exactly why they are

Pg. 199 silencing Bartimaeus, either because he himself is being a nuisance or because they don't like him calling Jesus "Son of David", nonetheless the calls to silence are clear. When we reach out to Jesus, do you feel obstacles getting in the way or

distractions trying to silence you? The pandemic is a very real example, where churches and worship spaces found themselves suddenly closed because it was no longer safe to gather together in worship. Some churches found themselves suddenly blindsided, uncertain of what to do. Many turned to online platforms, something which would not have been possible 20 years ago.

But do we sometimes silence ourselves? When we fear the judgement of others or the consequences of living our faith, do we see ourselves as being silenced, or the ones silencing ourselves. Bartimaeus had the courage to call out to Jesus. He heard the crowd

of people trying to silence him. He had no way of knowing how many people were trying to keep him quiet, but he persisted "Son of David, have mercy on me!" ... "Son of David, have mercy on me!" . Sometimes we can feel surrounded by fear and discouragement which keeps us silent in our faith. Others may try to make us feel ashamed of our faith.

When Jesus called Bartimaeus to him, the crowd suddenly changed their tune. No longer were they trying to keep him silent. Rather, they were encouraging. Take Heart! And when Bartimaeus heard that Jesus called for him, his excitement knew

no bounds. No longer was he sitting on the side of the road, hoping for a generous stranger to give him some money or food. Bartimaeus leaped and immediately went to Jesus. Like a child on Christmas Morning, rushing out of bed, throwing over the covers and jumping with excitement, getting to the tree as fast as possible to see what Santa Claus left them.

Bartimaeus came to Jesus and Jesus asked what he could do for him. Bartimaeus at this point did not ask for anything specific. He did not ask for a silver coin or some food, only to have Mercy. Bartimaeus wanted to see. He didn't seek fortune or a full belly, only the ability to see. And Jesus said to him "Go; your faith has made you well". We see that Bartimaeus believed in Jesus' abilities, he sought him out the moment he heard he was passing by, and he regained his sight. Like us too, we can often be blinded by distractions and our actions which selfishly hurt others, intentionally or otherwise. We lose sight of what is important and focus on all the wrong things.

Like Bartimaeus, we too are beggars on the road. Sin holds us back from being with God and we are left to ask for forgiveness and healing. Our faith has moments of doubt, our chaotic world seeks to distract us and blind us to Jesus' call. But Jesus is with us. He walks by us each and every day. When we call to him, when we seek his mercy, he stops and he invites us to approach him in prayer and in worship.

And there will be times where the crowds will try to keep you quiet. There will be times when sin tries to hold But Jesus leads the crowd, he commands them with power and glory. He calls you, draws you in with his love and his salvation. For Jesus is with us, and he is ready for whatever we bring him. Open your eyes and your heart to Jesus, for he is the way, the truth, and the everlasting life.





Tuesday, October 26 (Intersex Awareness Day) We give thanks for the work of intersex people in advocating for a more just and inclusive health-care system.




Thursday, October 28 We pray for the people, ministries and mission of the Presbytery of Waterloo-Wellington in Ontario.
