


# Listening to God

- The Psalm is an interesting one. The first verse is one that Jesus says on the cross, and so we connect it with that.
- In our Gospel reading Jesus has gone beyond the 'other side of the tracks' to the other side of the sea. Just in case we might

- have forgotten that the people here are not the chosen people, there's the mention of how important pigs are to them. A Jew would never keep pigs.
- Our last reading is from Paul's letter to the churches in Galatia. This passage can sound like Paul is against the Law, and perhaps even Jews. Please don't go down that road. In other places Paul emphasizes that Jews, of which he is one, have a special and important place with God, and that this relationship includes the law. They were given it and told to follow it... though, as Paul points out, not us none-Jews.
  - If that's not the point of this passage, then what is?

Sermon: Under the Cost

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.<sup>5</sup> Amen.

While you may not be reading this on the Sunday, I'm speaking it on Oct 31<sup>st</sup>... Halloween. It's one of the big festivals in our society. It's changed from it's Celtic origins, and the modification to speak Christian truths. Now it's mostly about costumes, candy, and parties. There's an element of being scared, and perhaps even acknowledging that death and evil exist in the world, but in a light-hearted way.

There's been changes, but there's still similarities. The Celts would remember their dead at this time, and this is also what Christians did. The Christians just added the reminder that the dead go to live with God, and that we can still learn from them. The Celts also had a tradition of dressing up so that the evil spirits that were wandering on this night wouldn't recognize them. In the Christian version the costumes were more about scaring off the evil spirits. Our modern tradition of costumes is about having fun: imagining ourselves as somebody else, or getting a reaction out of others.

One of my costumes as a kid was Batman. Much later I got into reading Batman comics. The topic of his costume comes up in a number of stories. One of the ideas behind it, in the stories, is that it turns the tables on the scary bad-guys by scaring

them. Another is that it's important to have a mask to protect the ones you love by hiding your identity.

While Halloween can be an obvious time to wear a mask, it's something most of us do at other times as well. Not costumes like Batman, but some that serve the same purpose. You may 'put on' a behaviour to protect yourself and the ones you love. It might be words or behaviours so that you'll not attract unwanted attention, or ways to try and gain acceptance by others, or even, like Batman, to scare or fight against what you feel threatened by. What makes it a costume? That your behaviour, in hindsight, isn't something that fits with your values. It's not who you really are, or want to be. It's not your identity.

Ines. His first comment was that I used the wrong joint for plywood. I'd put a lot of work into designing and building this, and that first comment hurt. I could have reacted by quietly mumbling something, or redirecting his attention to something else. I could have expressed appreciation for something he had built, and the wisdom and skill behind it - without sarcasm... or I could have attacked with sarcasm. These responses wouldn't reflect who I really am. They'd be a mask or armour. It's hard to think through a response when you're hurt. In this case I explained why I'd copied the joint from my chest of drawers, and the increased glue surface seemed to be doing okay.

Sometimes the costumes we wear are put on us by others. This would be when somebody assumes something about us, and we live into that role. This week a neighbour we've recently connected with shared a memory of her son in costume. He was dressed as an Egyptian mummy. She used lots of wide masking tape - lots. It was great until he tried to get on the bus and couldn't bend his knees enough. A funny story of being trapped by a costume.

More seriously, I remember a poem from grade 6, I think. It's about a father who was so proud of his son because he didn't need to wear old work clothes and work on the farm... and his son felt choked by the tie he wore Monday to Friday at the bank. He was trapped by living somebody else's expectations and denying who he was created to be.

This week I heard (from an American) about a black man who dresses up in a suit and puts on an accent when he goes to see the doctor. Without doing this he finds that he isn't taken seriously. He has to change who he is to be accepted.

Co-incidentally, there's a new movie about this. It's called

are, or want to be. It's not your identity.

I remember showing a friend the chest of drawers I built for

Passing and is about a woman in 1930s New York hiding her identity as a black woman by pretending to be white. I haven't seen it, but it sounds like an examination of trying to balance 'freedom' with the peace of being who you are underneath.

And there are many other examples of assumptions put on others that trap them. It might be your name, or gender, or sexual orientation, or economic status, or education, or how you speak or dress. Assumptions that can become an identity.

This is not the way it should be.

In Paul's letter to the churches in Galatia he reminds them of their identity. Yes, some are Jews and others Gentiles (not Jews), slaves or free, male or female. These are important in their daily life. Some of these distinctions can be helpful to living out who they, or we, are created to be. At other times they get in the way of God's dreams for us. They trap us, or stop us from being able to get on the bus.

What's worse, is that we can forget who we really are.

Underneath any mask we put on, or any role that is put on us, we need to remember what Paul told the churches in Galatia. "For in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith."

How far does this extend? The Greek grammar is unclear who's faith this is through - yours or Christs. Personally I hope it's Jesus' faith as he has a lot more than me.

The story from Luke does hint at the extent of God's reach. Jesus is talking to a man everybody else avoided. I suspect he even tried avoiding himself. This man wasn't a Jew. Despite all that, Jesus is treating this man like he's a child of God - and the man gains a new identity... or perhaps he just remembers who he really is.

And this is what we need to remember too.

Everyone is a child of God.

Living that out can be hard, and will take a much longer sermon.

Today remember that you are a child of God.

No matter what, God has chosen you, loves you and wants the best for you. When we embrace this identity we discover God's love, hope and healing.

To God be all the glory.

## Spirit Sighting

While mental health is still a sensitive topic in many homes, it is a blessing of the Spirit's work that our society is starting to be more open out this.

Another part of this is allowing people to be who they are, and not forcing them to be like you. We see this work happening with more conversations about racism and gender inequality in Canada. We are different, and all God's children.

We pray that more people will be able to live as a child of God, growing into God's dream for them and the peace that brings.

FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies. This week they are a little more personal than usual. Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Memories: What is your favourite Halloween costume?

Memories: Share a time when you felt completely accepted for

all that you are - no 'costumes'.

Wonder: Reread all of Psalm 22. What does this say about

life?

Actions: How can you treat yourself as a loved child of God?

Etching: This can be hard and needs an encouraging and

listening ear. Look back at when you find yourself acting in a way you feel is not like a child of God. How did you react? (see examples in sermon) What triggered this? Take this part of yourself and pray for healing. You may also want to talk more.

Actions: How could you treat \_\_\_\_ (another person) as a loved child of God?

## **Relief Through Food Assistance**

Mohammad and his family had to leave their home behind when COVID-19 made finding work difficult in their community in Afghanistan. Unfortunately, Mohammad and his father were seriously injured by a bomb blast on the journey. Mohammad's right knee now causes him a lot of pain. Mohammad still worked hard to provide for his family through the harsh winter, but it was far from enough. Things improved when the family was selected to take part in a food assistance project. Five monthly



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cash distributions were made to 1,100 vulnerable households—allowing families to purchase much-needed food and essential items. "This assistance has brought relief in my life," said Mohammad. This project is implemented by Community World Service Asia, a partner of Presbyterian World Service & Development.
