Sermon: The Necessity of Watchfulness - by Alex Plant Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.<sup>4</sup> Amen.

Did you get a good night's sleep last night? One of my favourite moments at the end of a day's hard work is the reunion between myself and my bed. When night has fallen and my body tells me "Its time for bed!", I return once more to the warm covers of my bed, snuggled into a nice deep sleep. But I remember many times, especially when I was younger, when I wanted the exact opposite.

Did you get the chance to have sleepovers when you were a kid? When you asked, begged, pleaded to stay at your friends house for a sleepover? Did you ever get excited spending the

night, playing games, reading comic books, eating junk food, just having a great time hanging out until it was lights out? Did you try to stay awake as long as possible, hoping to squeeze out every single second...only to find yourself falling asleep at just the right moment?

Some of my favourite sleepover moments were at the church, where the youth group would spend the night huddled together in one of the church's many rooms in the basement. The church had a different feel at night compared to Sunday morning. It was eerily quiet, shadows darted across the room as the moonlight shone through the little windows, revealing specs of light as we slept soundly in our sleeping bags in the choir room or the nursery. The church I had sleepovers in had a full indoor gymnasium with a full basketball court, a full-sized kitchen, we had every tool at our disposal to have a blast. We even had pancakes for breakfast the next morning.

Or perhaps you remember the time when you were a student, fresh out of the classroom, diving right into an assignment. Life of a University student can be full of surprises, and the life of a Seminary student is also equally chaotic from time to time. I had my fair share of late nights. When I had to pull all-nighters to get that 20-page essay done on time, or when I would be cooped up in a library until 2 or 3 in the morning. When I was a student at the University of Ottawa, they featured a newly renovated

cafeteria that was open 24 hours a day. I'm not ashamed to admit that I've had my occasional midnight snack as I was doing research for a paper. When



the library had their special 24-hour policy during exams, my friends would know where to find me.

Sleep is a delightful thing...when we get enough of it. Of course, get too little sleep and our mood decreases dramatically. Oversleep, and we are caught off guard, hurrying to make it to the bus on time to get to school or work. Today's Gospel reading shows us what happens when we are caught off guard. Get too little sleep and we not only don't have the right mindset to tackle the day, our ability to function takes a hit. Get too much sleep and we miss out on opportunities knocking on our door. Jesus teaches us about the necessity for watchfulness. But what are we watching out for?

There have been many examples over thousands of years to predict the end of the world and the return of Christ. Most famously was 2012, where the Mayan Calander was used to predict the end of the world. Thankfully, we are still standing here today. When we hear mutters of doomsday and Christ's return, we have to ask ourselves...when is it going to happen? Many have tried to predict the day...but Jesus is clear about this. "But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come."

We can ask...we can beg...we can plea to Jesus, tell us...when are you returning?!? We can try to guess, try to calculate, spend all of our energy preparing for the moment we think Jesus is coming. But it is not for us to know. It's not even for the angels in heaven...nor the Son. That is some powerful piece of Scripture. Not even the Son gets to know when heaven and earth passes away...when Jesus returns to earth. Only the Father gets to know the precise time. Jesus tells us to beware, keep alert. "Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come...or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what

I say to you I say to all: Keep awake."

I don't know how many of you have had the opportunity to stay awake all night long. It is not an easy thing to do even when you have the energy and the determination to do so. It may seem easy at first, but once 2 AM comes around, you feel that drop in energy. Sometimes being overtired plays tricks in our head. When our focus becomes blurred and we try desperately to keep awake. If you're lucky, that feeling passes and that feeling gets replaced with a sort of numbness, like keeping focus just long enough to get through the night.

There are multiple examples in the Bible where sleep often prevails over the tired and the weary, often with disastrous results.

The most prominent example is when Jesus is praying in the Garden of Gethsemane. He finds his disciples sleeping not once, not twice, but three times. He is in a moment of crisis, his death is at hand and his disciples cannot even stay awake with him. Their lives are not on the line, why should they stay awake? Yet we find that Jesus does not wish to be alone in this moment. Many times, he goes off alone to pray, but this time, he wants his disciples to stay with him.

What does Jesus want from us? Does he want us to stay awake with him? He tells us in plain English, or rather plain Greek... therefore...keep awake. We must be prepared, because we do not know when the hour is at hand. We must keep ourselves disciplined, keep ourselves ready at a moments notice. When we are stuck with a deadline that cannot move, do we not keep ourselves working, keep ourselves awake until the task is done? So too must we keep ourselves ready for Jesus.

Of course, we recognize that we cannot avoid sleep. It is in the

way that God designed us. He designed us to take moments of rest, to recharge our energy, and to plainly sleep. So when Jesus says "Keep Awake", its simply more than staying physically awake. We must keep ourselves spiritually, emotionally, mentally, physically awake. But we cannot do all of that ourselves. You try to stay awake all night tonight and see what happens. Very quickly you may find yourself dozing off on the couch or feeling the weight of your head dragging down until you find some kind of surface to rest your head. Its impossible.

That is where we must reach out to Christ. For just as Christ wanted his disciples with him in Gethsemane, so too do we need Jesus in our preparation. To keep ourselves disciplined. That

means...prayer, praise, worship, reaching out to Christ for forgiveness, mercy, and compassion. To make a genuine effort on our parts as Christians, as followers of Christ. "It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch."

Just as the man puts his slaves in charge with a doorkeeper on the watch, so too must we prepare ourselves. We must have those tasks

at hand to keep ourselves spiritually ready. That means praying regularly, that means praising unendingly, that means reaching out in every situation. We are not alone in our work. We are a community of worshippers. Each of us, here today, with our blessings and our concerns. We are gathered here together to worship God. The community of believers, like a team preparing the way for Christ's return, we must also support one another in our preparations.

It is impossible for us to keep awake. It is impossible for us to be fully prepared. But through Jesus, all things are possible. With Jesus, we can be prepared. Keep Awake! For Jesus is at hand. Keep Awake! For only the Father knows the true hour. Keep Awake! For you do not know when the master of the house will come. Keep Awake! For the master will arrive at any moment. Keep Awake! For we must prepare ourselves for his arrival. Keep Awake!

To God be all the glory.

Gracious God, hear our prayers.


And in your love answer.

#### **Equipping a New Leader in Nepal**

In November 2021, the United Mission to Nepal (UMN) will welcome Dhana Lama as its first ever Nepali Executive Director. In addition to being UMN's first Nepali Executive Director, Dhana will be the 13th Executive Director since its founding in 1954 and the third woman



to lead UMN. Outgoing Executive Director, Joel Hafvenstein, said, "Dhana is a strong and forthright leader who is also a listener, with the humility not to fear change or the acknowledgement of mistakes. Her passion for service to Nepal's poorest people is unquestionable." As an international, interdenominational Christian mission, UMN receives funding from partners designated for specific projects, which doesn't leave much for staff salaries. Through Presbyterians Sharing, the PCC will join the Church of Scotland, the Presbyterian Church in Ireland and Asia CMS in financially supporting Dhana Lama during her tenure.



**Saturday, November 20** On **Transgender Day of Remembrance**, we pray for an end to violence and hatred towards trans and nonbinary people in Canada and around the world.


