

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Today you are going to hear a familiar story. If you've grown up coming to church, then it's a friend you've had your whole life. I expect it's spoken to you differently depending on what you're going through at the time - one of the miracles of the Bible.

This isn't the parable about the lost sheep, or the lost coinalthough they are related. These two parables come just before the one we're going to hear in the Gospel According to Luke.



It's interesting to note how this section starts. Tax Collectors and sinners are coming to listen to Jesus, and the Pharisees and

scribes are grumbling about Jesus spending his time with 'those people'. It's important to remember that the Pharisees and scribes were recognized by the community as being the best and most Godly people. These were the good boys that everyone was honoured to know. The tax-collectors and sinners were not.

Hearing the grumbling, he turns to the good boys and tells them about the shepherd who leaves the flock alone to go looking for the one that was lost; and the woman who searches high and low for the lost coin. In both cases there are celebrations in Heaven about the lost being found... but not about those that weren't lost.

How do you think they were feeling about that?

Then there's the next parable.

We're going to hear it in two sections. Each section features a different character. To try and interrupt the familiar thoughts you may have when hearing this story we're going to hear from the two characters before the scripture. For those that don't know the story, I don't think you'll have any trouble following along.

reading: <u>Luke 15:1-3</u>

Younger Son

What a ride!

It all started when I finally lost it on the old man. I was sick and tired of doing what he wanted. He was constantly on my case telling me that if I only lived his way I'd have the best life ever. Really!? I'd seen the ads. Being on the family farm wasn't the height of excitement, or anything close.

So I told him, 'I wish you were dead so I could get my part of

the inheritance.'

The words just burst out, forced up by the frustration of not being able to do things my way. There was a moment where I wondered if he'd hit me or just throw me out of the house. Instead, he slumped and turned away. I wanted to take back what I'd said so I wouldn't lose what I have, but pride and fear froze me. I waited. When he turned back there were tears in his eyes... and he agreed.

I couldn't believe my luck. The old man turned out to be a pushover. I knew the rest of the community wouldn't accept the shameful act I'd done, but I didn't care. I had money, freedom from responsibilities, and could live any way I wanted to.

So I took off. I'd heard from merchants about cities where you can buy anything you desire. I left my old ways in the dust and headed there.

and it was amazing. The city never stopped. You could buy anything there... things I'd never imagined. But there's that small and important word. The one that shapes the world, or at least the world I'd chosen... "buy". It was great as long as you could buy your way in. When you run out of money, that's another story. I saw both sides. I suppose it's the old man's fault. He taught my brother about financial stuff so he could take over. It's no wonder I couldn't keep track of the money until I had none.

and now I'm at a loss - in every way.

I've lost my money, my independence, my family, my community (back home and the one here that liked my money), and my honour - several times over.

Now, I've got nothing.

I'm back to working on a farm, but now like a slave. I look after the pigs - an animal that back home nobody's honour would let them be caught dead with. I collect the garbage from the

kitchen and feed it to them... and it's starting to look pretty good - the garbage. I'm actually envious of pigs, and when you want to be a pig - that's a sign.

I think everyone back home was better off than this. Actually, I know they were.

As I've lost everything else, I might as well lose my pride. Maybe dad would let me work with the slaves.

I'd better figure out what to say. . .

And who am I? I slave away for him and he doesn't show me any special treatment - and that other one gets a party! I guess it shows where I stand.

Which is the one who should inherit it all... except now the old man is using up my share on the other son.

Doesn't he see he's being taken advantage of?

He's such a fool.

and everyone sees it.

It's so unfair!

I really don't get it. I've done everything he says. I've done more. I've been like a slave. I've always been good.

Why isn't he celebrating me?

Why is my life not perfect?

Why is this happening?

Speak of the devil, here he comes now. The Old man is heading right towards me. What can the fool possibly want of me now?

He's so lost.

reading: <u>Luke 15</u>: 24-32

What attracted your attention?
Which character could you relate to?

Often we are encouraged to see ourselves as the younger son and are reminded to repent for our sins. In the two parables before this one Jesus talks about repentance afterwards, but this parable just ends. Perhaps it doesn't need repeating. The younger son has a speech, but does he practice it because he's repentant, or because he wants to manipulate his father.

... does it matter?

The father doesn't wait to hear why the lost son has returned before running out to greet and honour him - of which both actions would have seemed foolish. Running was undignified. Associating with such a dishonourable person would have brought the father dishonour. This would lead people not doing business with him, because then they would be contaminated with the dishonour virus.

Does this mean we don't need to repent?

That feels unfair to those of us who try to be good - like the elder son.

Are you more like this son who tries to do the right thing? Who tries to be good?

Who is willing to sacrifice their desires for the benefit of others?

This sounds like most Christians. If so, what is the Bible saying about fairness, justice, ...and love? Here it is saying that God's love is so big that nobody is ever not welcome back. Like the sinners & Pharisees at the beginning of the chapter, they just need to be there. That's enough for Jesus to reach out to them.

Notice I said, "sinners <u>and</u> Pharisees." Jesus is getting a reputation for being with sinners. The parables in this chapter tell about this favouritism towards the lost... as Jesus is reaching

out to the Pharisees, the good sons ...just as the father comes out of the party to try and talk the older son into coming in and share the joy.

I wonder what he did? What would you do? What do you do?

Can you think of a relationship where you have been unfairly treated. Do you want justice or love extended? Which would bring healing to them? to you?

In a lent devotional I've been following from Biola University, a story was shared⁷ about the author meeting with a married couple in conflict. They were so obsessed with each other's faults it was consuming them... rather like today's psalm. "While I kept silence [about my sins], my body wasted away through my groaning all day long" (Psalm 32:3). The writer ends up saying to the couple that their relationship may not be saved, but they need to forgive. Their focus on the sins of the other, and denial of the sin in themselves, was poisoning their spirits (and probably their minds and body as well).

Love needs to be extended. This does not make everything back to the way it was. In the case of the parable the father tells the elder son, "all that is mine is yours." The younger son doesn't get back what he squandered. In a case that involves abuse, the victim needs to not be placed in a situation where they may be hurt again. In that case the abuser is invited back into a different part of God's house to learn to be a part of this large family.

Repentance is important. So is justice and fairness. The Bible has many stories about them. They help protect victims and heal those doing the harm.

This story emphasizes the other part - the love for all. A love that reaches out no matter what. A love that celebrates anyone who turns towards God.

May we all chose to join the celebration of joy.

In the name of God the loving parent,

Jesus the Son

and the Holy Spirit, working in all of us.

Halidu's Shop Equips Others in Ghana

Halidu Dayuma spends his days managing a prosperous and bustling training center in Ghana, where he teaches kente weaving and dressmaking.

When Halidu was just 13 years old, his right leg was amputated after a chronic sore he developed didn't heal. Halidu spent three months in the hospital, recovering and learning how to use his new artificial limb.

During this time, Halidu also enrolled in PWS&D-supported workshops where he learned weaving, tailoring and dressmaking. After graduating, Halidu started his own business teaching other students. So far, he has helped train 44 apprentices.

Wednesday, March 30 We pray for the people who gather and serve at Winnipeg Inner City Missions in Manitoba, and we give thanks for their mission and ministry.


