

∠ Sermon: Now what? …love

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Context is important. You know this.

Do you remember when your mother would kiss you good night? That was good. Was there a time when your mother kissing you in front of your friends was embarrassing? ...even though it was still comforting at bedtime?

The context of today is that we are living after Easter. Christ has died.

Christ has risen.

And while this has been true every day of our lives, today is part of the Easter Season of the church year. The last few weeks we've had Bible stories from soon after the resurrection. The difficulty believing the news of the resurrection. The question of how to respond - what to do next? Today's gospel passage is set earlier - the evening before Jesus' death. It's famous for the 'new commandment' Jesus gives us about love - but the context is important.

As I said, Jesus and the disciples have gathered for a meal - all of the disciples. Jesus washed their feet, even though some protest that this is not the actions of a leader, but a servant. He is willing to be a servant to all of them. He says that this is an example for them of how to live. Then he tells them that one of them will betray him, and encourages Judas to go.

Jesus also knows what will be coming. That Judas will not be the only one. Peter will deny him. The disciples will be afraid and unsure with his death. This is his last chance to tell them what they need to know before he dies.

Does he warn them of betrayals and tell them how to root out the snakes in their midst? Does he tell them how to be morally pure? give them a set of rules like the Ten Commandments to tell when somebody is right and wrong? Does he tell them the secret knowledge they need to have, or how to be theologically correct? Does he give them a statement of faith saying what a true Christian does and doesn't believe?

No.

He tells them to, "love one another. Just as I have loved you."

That sounds easy, but what's it mean?

Often love is portrayed as nice. It's nice to be loved, and showing love is being nice. This isn't wrong, but it's not a simple 'nice'; nice as in pleasant. A better way to think of it is that "Love is... kind" as Paul reminded the church in Corinth. Being kind can mean having coffee ready for someone when they wake up. It can also mean telling that person when they are being grumpy and need to drink their coffee before talking again. Loving someone means telling someone when they've done you appreciate, and when they haven't. This isn't nice in the usual sense of the world, but it is kind. It can help somebody either improve what they are doing, or discover that God is calling them to do something else. It can help everything work better - which is kind for everyone - which is loving. You can see this in the way Jesus will correct people's perceptions and actions - such as the dramatic cleansing of the Temple.


Paul also reminds us that "love is patient." You can see this in the way Jesus repeatedly tries to help the disciples to understand what is going on, and what will happen. At this point in the gospel they have been travelling with him for three years... and they still don't seem to get it. Like hard conversations, being patient can also be hard. It's not that Jesus was always calm. Again, there's the flipping over the tables incident. But that was righteous anger about separating people from God. That's different from somebody failing to follow through on your love. In other instances you'll find him teaching, telling and showing. Then giving them time to let it sink in, and sometimes opportunities to practice. Then he has to go over it again. He doesn't trad this group of disciples in for a new lot, but shows them love - as seen in his patience.



The part about somebody, like the disciples, repeatedly falling to understand the point would be frustrating. This is another hard part of love. People are always failing. When you fall in love you might put on some rose coloured glasses, but love does not make anyone perfect. The disciples love Jesus, yet they still betray him. Judas turns him over to the priests. We don't know why, but

there's nothing to suggest he hated Jesus or wanted Jesus dead. Then there's Peter, who before the light comes will repeatedly deny knowing Jesus. Was Peter afraid of the consequences of loving Jesus? of the commitment? In both cases Jesus ate dinner with them that night. He washed both of their feet. He knew what would happen - and he loved them anyway.

There are other huge examples of the church letting Jesus down. I had a course on the reformation in Seminary - and Christians killed and tortured each other because they were more concerned with the right belief than with love. Then there's the

crusades, and antisemitism, and the participation in the residential schools. Many of the people involved in these events thought there were good reasons, but the pain was not a sign of healing and love. The scars are still present.

Those are examples that involve lots of people. I'm sure you've experienced this in your own life - personal examples. People you love who have let you down, ...failed you, ...even betrayed your faith in them. . .

This isn't new.

This is part of loving one another.

And, when you are honest, you have also let people down, failed them, betrayed their faith in you.

What do we do when faced with a betrayal, or somebody not understanding, or the need for a difficult conversation?

Jesus says, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you"

Back in the book of Leviticus a whole series of instructions are given to the Israelites. This includes "you shall love your neighbour as yourself... you shall love the alien as yourself." Loving one another is not a new concept - it's not even a new commandment. Why does our passage say it is? One explanation is that Jesus is a new covenant between God and the people, and love is foundational to the covenant. Another aspect is that Jesus doesn't say to 'love one another as you love yourself", but to "love one another as I love you'.

But what's it mean?

How does Jesus love?

Leviticus 19:18, 24 bible.oremus.org/?passage=leviticus+19

We've already covered some of this. Jesus is patient; Jesus is kind. Jesus invites and serves everyone, even people who will not always act loving. Through teaching and stories Jesus gives people glimpses of what it is to be living with God. He spends time with those others would not. Jesus also heals people - each in their own way, and allowing them to rejoin the community - a powerful act of love.

These are ways we can be loving as well:

- be kind & patient,
- find & share stories that reveal God,
- find people who need someone and be their friend,
- bring healing. This doesn't require being a doctor, but does require reaching out in love.

And who is included? Jesus says, "love one another" to the disciples. That could be read to just include the people in the room, or perhaps the Jews who believe in Christ, such as the original listeners of the gospel. However, I think it's more.

One reason is the famous passage early in John. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."

God so loved the world.

That is more than the disciples. It's more than the early Jewish followers of Christ - and we heard about some of that tension in the passage from Acts.

God so loved the world

Jesus says, "Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." Would that not be great and wondrous? but how to love like Jesus.

How can we do that?

The psalm says, "Teach me your way, O Lord, that I may walk in your truth." Find stories of God's love in the Bible, and out of it. Pray for help and courage - because loving requires sacrifice. I pray you won't face anything like a crucifixion, but you will have to give up parts of your desires as they become God's desires. Opening your heart to love will also open it to pain as well as joy. Still, have the courage to practice love.

I say practice, because like all our other skills and actions, it needs it. There will be times when you don't do so well, and there will be times when wonders happen - when God's healing and grace and love find a channel through you.



One final thought - a last note on the context.

Jesus isn't talking just to Peter, or any one person. Jesus is talking to the collected group. The commandment that we love as Jesus does is not an individual activity; it's a team. Don't try and do it alone. Share your struggles and joys with God, and also with other people. Tell them, and invite them to share in your experiences - share love.

...and they'll know we are Christians by our love, by our love. Yes, they'll know we are Christians by our love.

To God be all the glory Amen.

Friday, May 13 We pray for clerks of Session as they, with ministers and elders, provide leadership and pastoral care to congregations across Canada.





WE ARE ONE IN THE SPIRIT Irregular with refrain










