Who is it?


How do you honour them or show your respect?

Sermon: Hallowin'

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

It's that Halloween time of year again.

What's this mean for you?

In Germany there is controversy as some companies are trying to encourage a North American celebration with scary costumes & an overabundance of candy. The controversy is that this is a traditional time to remember the dead - in a sedate and serious way. To go to their graves and tidy up, leave flowers, and share stories. The North American 'give me candy' hits many as highly disrespectful.

It's a good reminder. If you trace back our tradition there used

to be an aspect of 'hallowing' on 'all hallowed eve'.



This year as I was reading our passage from Luke the line that stuck out was the one about 'hallowed be thy name' - and it was reinforced by my readings.

There's two parts to this. God's name, and the hallowing.

A name represents or describes someone or something. The tricky thing is that God is so vast and complicated that any name we could say doesn't come close to describing the Almighty. It'd be like trying to build a box to put God in - impossible. That's okay, we don't need the name. The word isn't what we're hallowing - it's God. While God is hard to sum up, we do have glimpses of what God is like.


For starters, God is the creator, the originator, the all powerful Lord of everything, the one who has a caring & loving relationship with you - like the better example of a father than you can imagine. ...and is like that for everyone ...and everything. God is willing to go to the cross for people - as one of the criminals being executed with him recognized and received the peace of Christ. Like the wind, she's hard to see most of the time, but we refer to God's continued activity as the Holy Spirit - all

glimpses of God.

How do we hallow God's name?

I have a commentary on *Luke* by Justo González. He suggests that the whole Lord's Prayer is tied into the line, "hallowed be thy name."

After that line comes, "Your Kingdom come." You could think of this as wanting to live in a good place, or in a place where

everything is made right. This is true, but what if we think of it from the point of view of the previous line. How does praying "Your Kingdom come" honour and respect God? We're respecting God by looking for God's way to become the way the world works. Wanting this to happen shows that we trust God - that we believe God's way is the best way. We can act this out in various ways. The biggest is through prayer, and focusing on God.

The idea of focusing on God is a good link to the next line, "Give us each day our daily bread." This can be about so much more than just having some bread on the table.

For starters, this is about our daily needs. That could be bread, or rice, or a warm place to live. It even includes knowing you are precious and loved. 'Give us each day what we need.'

It starts with 'give'. This is what God does. It's not a payment. We don't receive this because we earn it. We don't trick God out of it. We are offered our daily needs.

The 'daily' part reminds González of Proverbs 30.

give me neither poverty nor riches;

feed me with the food that I need,

lest I be full and deny you

and say, "Who is the Lord?"

or I be poor and steal

and profane the name of my God."

If God gives us so much we never needed to worry, then we might forget that what we have was given by God. Not recognizing God's gracious gifts is not respecting God - not hallowing God. Can you imagine that?

If God doesn't give us enough, then we will have to resort to stealing or hording. As God followers, this will make God look bad. This also doesn't hallow God's name. Of course, there's the trouble defining what is enough. This week someone was telling me about members of their family that couldn't understand not being able to afford lots of fresh vegetables. What's enough? I also heard about advice someone was given about not bothering with crazy church stuff, but to go shopping instead. What's enough? What is it that we really need?

I wonder if the parable after the prayer sheds light on this. A friend shows up late and is hungry. You don't have any bread so you go to another friend and ask for some. Reluctantly, they get out of bed and help out. Is this how it works? Instead of worrying about our own need for bread, our prayers are answered by focusing on others having what they need?

González writes that when we ask on behalf of others, instead of ourselves, "we are given; when on that basis we search, we shall find; when on that basis we knock, the door will be opened." Jesus showed us that the great leader is one who serves others. This is hallowing God's name.

The next two lines are about forgiveness.

"Forgive us our sins". This is rather obvious. When we sin we dishonour God. When we sin we break, betray, our relationship with not only the Lord of lords, but also our Father. Like every relationship, when there's a break it needs forgiveness to mend it, and so we ask, "Forgive us our sins".

Did you notice the difference between what's in Luke and what we usually say in the prayer? It's not "as we forgive others", but "for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us." This helps distance it from any idea that you need to earn God's forgiveness. There's another change from what is normally said. Usually people say debts and debtors, or sin and sinners, or trespasses and trespassers. We use the same word both times. In Luke it's our sins, and their debts. This makes sense with the 'daily bread' line. If we have our basic needs looked after, then we don't need whatever they owe us. And, if we focus on how they are in debt with us then we are not focused on God. If you're not focused on God, then how can you be looking for "Your kingdom come" ...and you're not hallowing God's name.

Now, I don't think any of us are bankers, but debts still apply. It applies to more than money, just as bread means more than bread. We even use it in our vocabulary. You can talk about somebody owing you an apology. I know an example where someone feels this. Sadly, the other person is unaware, except that they don't talk anymore. It's a broken relationship because one person is focused on how they feel wronged. You can probably think of legitimate grievances with people, but even then, if you become obsessed your grievance then you're not hallowing God.

The last part of the prayer Jesus offers here in Luke is "And do

not bring us to the time of trial." We can pray this because we don't want to have any challenges in life. However, with the perspective of 'hallowing God' the focus shifts away from us. We don't want to let God down, so we ask not to be faced with a 'time of trial'. It's probably because we're afraid of being overwhelmed. Honestly, it's not terribly realistic. All the big people in the Bible face a time of trial. Jesus goes into the wilderness and has a 'time of trial'... but isn't overwhelmed. Moses and David also had times of trial - and sometimes their actions made God look bad - just as kids can make their parents look bad. But this is where asking for forgiveness comes in. Still, it's okay to pray "And do not bring us to the time of trial."

What about the rest? "For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours - now and forever." Well, it's not from Luke. The Lord's Prayer is also found in Matthew, and it's not there either. There's a document referred to as the Didache that was likely written in the first century. It contains this blessing on the end of the Lord's Prayer. So, while it's not part of the prayer in the Bible, it's been said with the prayer since the early church. It can also fit with recognizing God - and hallowing God.

Another piece of wisdom from the Didache: say it three times daily. It's like a doctor's prescription for healthy living. Take this prayer, and say it... lots. Be shaped by it. Let it focus you, all day long, on 'Our Father, who is in Heaven. Hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread. And forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us. And do not bring us to the time of trial."

To God be all the glory Amen.



FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies. Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Memories: How far back do you remember the Lord's Prayer? Sunday School? School? Church? Home?

Values: How does saying or singing the Lord's Prayer make you feel?

Values: Is the Lord's Prayer important to you? Can you describe why?

Actions: The two places the Lord's Prayer is in the Bible it's not the same. If it's more about ideas than specific words... what's it about? Try to write your version.

Prayer: As the Didache suggests, try saying the Lord's Prayer three times a day this week (maybe with meals).

When the war in Ukraine started, Irina's family was torn apart.
