★ Intro to the readings

- Genesis: Jacob. So very different from his twin brother. Esau went out hunting, while Jacob stayed home and schemed. After tricking his brother & father out of Esau's birthright Jacob ran afraid for his life. After working for another schemer, Jacob married Rachel and (through cunning) built a flock. He then took his family on the run. His father in law catches up and they make up. Now Jacob is nervously heading home towards Esau. Is this a good choice? What's waiting for him? How is Jacob feeling as he gets ready to meet his brother?
- We'll be focusing on the Gospel passage today. Leading
 up to this Jesus has been telling those gathered about the
 coming of the Kingdom of God, and that the waiting will
 be tough like Noah and Lot as they stuck with their faith
 in God despite what life appeared like to their
 neighbours.

One commentator I read says he hates today's parable.

• At this time of the year we lift up our eyes to the hills and see beautiful colours and God's glory. When this psalm was written the hills along the roadside were where the bandits came from. When looking at dark possibilities, where does your help come from?

What's going on in the Gospel passage?


It's a parable, so that's always a good question - and likely there are different answers depending on where you're at.

In the set-up the narrator tells us this parable is about prayer. Is that what's going on? Is it just telling us how to pray? Some writers say it tells us about God. Is that it? One of the commentaries I have thinks these suggestions skip over the characters in the story: the Widow and the Judge. They suggest these characters might be teaching us about ourselves. I'm sure you noticed them, but what did you think of them?

What do you assume about the Widow? Do you imagine her poor and powerless? This is likely the situation, but maybe not. There are various Biblical examples of widows with resources and influence - but also many passages that talk about the need to look after widows. Do you assume that her cause is just? This is likely, but maybe not. We don't know anything about it. Most widows in the Bible are presented as good examples, but they can also be scheming. Do you assume she tried to sort out the conflict first? Hopefully she did, but maybe not. What if instead

of a widow the story was about a prince? or to update it... a CEO of a successful company? or a member of a street gang? They know what they want. They keep after the person who can give it until they 'wear them down' (to quote verse 5). The Greek for 'wear me down' is actually a wrestling term for 'hit me under the eye' or 'give me a black eye'. We just don't say that about widows in the Bible. Do we assume the widow is peaceful while persistent? Hopefully, but maybe not. What's going on?

And what about the Judge? Is it bad that he's not worried about other people? Isn't not being influenced by others a good thing in a judge? The part about not fearing God is seen as good in some other contemporary writings, but I think it should be negative in the Bible. Has he always been unjust? In the parable it doesn't come out until he gives in to the Widow? Is that



his problem? What's going on?

Amy-Jill Levine suggests that one of the important aspects of this parable is for us to reflect on our assumptions. What do we bring to it? and to everyone we meet? If it's telling universal truths, how does changing the characters, but not the actions,

change our interpretation? How do you feel when we think of the widow as a rich man? or a criminal?

Personally, I assume that the Widow is honest and the Judge can't be bothered with her case - which is bad.

I think Levine raises a good point. Recognizing that we have stereotypes helps us to see people for who they are. This is good. I also think, and she agrees, that it's not the only point.

What else is going on?

One common interpretation of this parable is to equate the judge with God. There is a Jewish style of debate that was used back then in which you presented an example that's bad to show how much better the good example is. In this case, the judge is obviously bad by not helping the widow right away. We all know that God is good, so how much more will God help people? (the answer is 'a lot more')

Is that what's going on?

They're good points - that God is good and answers prayer. However, the way the parable does it raises some issues.

The problem comes when we pull ourselves out of the Bible and into our life. If it's about prayer and how God gives persistent people what they want... well? is that your experience? Have you ever prayed for something? (It's okay if you have, the Bible encourages it.) It could be for a job? or a relationship? or healing? or a safe trip? or a place to live?

Did you get it?

I suspect the answer is, 'sometimes yes; sometimes no.' How does that work with this parable?

If you don't get what you ask for, does that mean that God is a failure? Was God not able to do it?

No!

God, the creator of the universe, and you, can do anything. God is still alive and active. God chooses to care and be involved with the ultimate revelation of this in Jesus. This is very different than the Judge.

If you don't get what you ask for, does that mean that you are a failure? Are you just not persistent enough? If you'd just asked one more time, or a hundred more times, then you would have got what you want? Are you the failure?

No!

We do fail at things, but we are not failures. We are beloved children of God. The Judge doesn't love anyone.

Which raises another issue - what if you get your request? Does God just give in to us children if we whine persist enough? I'm sure you've all see a child in a store whining or kicking up a fuss to get what they want. Do you think the parent should give in? What do you think of parents that do? Was it ever you?

If God were to give in just because we are persistent in our requests, then God becomes something we control. God's not our tool. It doesn't matter if you're as scheming as Jacob or as open as Mary, God cannot be controlled. The Judge - seems to be controlled by the Widow.

So, is God really like the judge?

Not at all.

and thinking this leads to problems.

What's going on?

What if it's about us?

Are we like the judge? Probably; sometimes. Are you ever inclined not to get involved in something you don't have to? Something that may cause a fuss or a headache... or a social black eye? Do we sometimes give in just because somebody is wearing us down? No matter how you interpret the judge, he's not a good role model.

What about the widow?

Can we learn from her?

The first thing we learn about her is that she lives in the city. Then we hear that she keeps going to the judge. She is persistent. This is admirable. In the previous passage Jesus talks about the coming of the Kingdom of God... and that there'll be some waiting. During that time the disciples will need to be like Noah and Lot, waiting faithfully despite the ridicule of their friends and neighbours. The disciples (and us) need to be persistent, and the widow models that.

What is she persistent in? Seeing justice done and being willing to speak up to the powerful to do it.

This teaches us about prayer in two ways - yes, prayer is one of the things the parable is about. One aspect is how the widow received her answer to her persistent prayer. Sometimes we have no ability to do anything at all about what we ask for. Often we do. Here we have a widow, who is usually powerless in Biblical times, find that she does have some power to see that her prayer for justice is answered. We all have more agency than she was likely to have. We can write to leaders. We can choose which companies to support, or not. We can safely raise our voice.

The other part is that the focus of her prayer is on justice. Other passages show us other topics, here she is praying for things to be made right. In the Widow's case, this isn't selfless. She wants justice in her life. That's okay. The prayer asking God to make things right is in line with the larger passage of the

coming Kingdom of God.

Is this what it's about? being persistent in making the world right. Yes, ...and more

The narrator who starts by asking about prayer ends by asking, "When the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?" What would Jesus find in the Widow? Somebody who persists in asking and who stands up to people with power is somebody with faith. You don't keep asking somebody to do something if you don't believe they



can. Without faith that God can, more than enough - Sheesley and will, act to make things right; it's only up to us. That's an exhausting thought, not to mention impossible. Her faith is something to be admired.

What's the parable about?

For all of us it's about waiting for the Kingdom to come, and there are different lessons depending on what you're going through right now. Perhaps you need a reminder to check your stereotypes. Perhaps a reminder that even reluctant people can 'do right' with enough pressure. Perhaps it's the three aspects of the widow: persistence, acting for justice, and faith.

that, or even answered the way she wants them to be - but Kathryn witnessed God answering prayer.







MISSION MOMENT

In Pakistan, after repeated and prolonged droughts, Rano and her husband, Jeevo, were left with land that was unable to produce a harvest. As they were contending with worries about how they would feed their family, the situation turned worse when Jeevo's mother died, and they had to take on significant debt in order to pay for the funeral expenses. Jeevo went to Karachi to work, while Rano purchased food and necessities for the family on credit. Unfortunately, Jeevo's earnings were only enough to pay their debt and nothing else. Things finally improved when



Rano and Jeevo's family were selected to be part of a Presbyterian World Service & Development (PWS&D) food assistance project, where they received food packages of oil, wheat, rice, sugar, tea and salt. **As a church, our Christian response to hunger is put into action through PWS&D and Canadian Foodgrains Bank.**

DAILY PRAYERS

Sunday, October 16 (Students and Colleges Sunday) We give thanks to God for our three theological colleges—The Presbyterian College (Montreal, Quebec), Knox College (Toronto, Ontario) and St. Andrew's Hall/Vancouver School of Theology (British Columbia)—and we pray for the students as they prepare for ministry.

Thursday, October 20 We pray for the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan and for Nancy Lin, Ecumenical Relations Program Secretary, as she recovers from a medical condition.

Friday, October 21 We give thanks and pray for those working in nursing and long-term care homes and hospitals as they provide care to people, often in understaffed facilities.

Saturday, October 22 We pray for the people who gather and serve at Edmonton Urban Native Ministry in Alberta, and we give thanks for their ministry.
