This Sunday is called: Reign of Christ. This is not <u>rain</u> of Christ, but reign. It refers to how a ruler, like a king, rules. You could think of it as Rule of Christ Sunday.

Can you think of any stories about kings? Perhaps Shrek? or King Arthur?

Kings have the right and power to make all the rules and demand that people do what they want. When the

people do not obey, the king has the right to punish them. Good kings use this power and right well. Bad kings do not. Jesus is the very best king ever. Jesus has all the power and chooses to use it to take care of people. Even when his people disobey him and hurt others or creation, he forgives them and invites them to live better.<sup>4</sup>

Thtro to the readings

- We will start with an early reading from Luke. This is the song Zachariah sings when his baby son is named John though much of it is about what another baby will be like. We will be using it as our responsive psalm today.

Sermon: Power of the King

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Today is Christ the King Sunday, or it was. Now it's usually called the Reign of Christ Sunday. Why the change? Driving

home the title of King can be seen as needlessly lifting males up above females - or worse, excluding non-males. Having a king also implies a kingdom, which reminds some people of colonialism and all the suffering this caused. Hence the shift to Reign of Christ - the focus isn't on a king or kingdom/territory or how to expand that territory into the individuals... but on how Christ rules. This is a good focus.

A shift in focus is actually why Pope Pius XI started this tradition. It was 1925. After the nationalism that was tied into World War One the Pope wanted to remind the leaders of the nations that they were not the ones in charge. That their territories/kingdoms were not the ones that mattered. That there was a higher power.

It's a good reminder, though I'm not sure they noticed. I'd be quite surprised if today's leaders notice.

and since none of us are leaders of kingdoms, why do we bother?

Because it's good for us to be reminded that God/Jesus is not only our leader, but what sort of leader God is? and what it's like to live under God's reign?


Jesus actually had a name tag that read, "This is the King of the Jews." It was placed over his head on the cross as the charge against him. It could also be showing how pathetic the king of the Jews is compared to the might of Rome.

That said, he didn't act very pathetic. Despite being tortured, he appears calm. He's even asking that they be forgiven! This doesn't seem like someone who's defeated, or broken, or resigned to events. It seems like he's in control - even telling one of the criminals he will be with Jesus in paradise.

Difficult and painful situations do not scare our leader, our

God. Jesus is a leader that will go right into them and doesn't let them change the mission.



The mission is what got Jesus nailed to the cross in the first place. The two criminals he's with have an inkling, but neither are quite right.

Let's look at the second one first. He's generally thought of as the one who understands who Jesus is - but he doesn't; not entirely (and honestly, who does?). He calls Jesus innocent, but Jesus isn't. He's as guilty as they are. The charge against Jesus is treason, as it was for them. They were all pushing for another kingdom then Rome - which gets the death penalty. It is likely

that the other two were fighting for a Kingdom of Jews. Jesus was going around talking about the Kingdom of God. This was insurrection - and he was guilty.

Jesus was innocent of other things.

He was innocent of violence. He didn't fight off what they were doing to him. He didn't call down the Heavenly Hosts (army). He didn't even raise his voice. He did say, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." Who is Jesus forgiving? The grammar is very open. It could be the criminals beside him, or the soldiers looking running the executions, or the people condemning him, or those who fail to recognize him as the Messiah, or those who fail to recognize how God's Messiah works.

This is where the first criminal gets it wrong - and all of us at some point. He identifies Jesus as the Messiah, and then asks for Jesus to "save yourself and us!" By the grace of God, Jesus does bring salvation, but not by avoiding hardship and pain. God's grace is to help us through it to the Reign of God. We're not spared to hardship; we're not to passively accept it; we're not to inflict pain fighting it; …and we're never alone. Jesus is saving us from the rules of the world we live in, and leading us to the rules of the world God is bringing into being.

The first criminal thinks that being saved means being taken off the cross and returned to his life. Jesus is a leader who isn't about saving himself, but about giving himself. He is willing to give everything he is to be with people and show them what God's reign is like.

Which is reflected in his entire ministry. How does the reign of a king start? with a coronation. You could think of Jesus' baptism as his coronation. It's interesting to note that Jesus is one of many being baptized. That when the Holy Spirit descends on him, Jesus is the only one to notice. There's no pomp and circumstance. Jesus is not made the centre of attention. Throughout his ministry Jesus is definitely noticed and draws a crowd - but the focus isn't on the famous King Jesus being there shaking hands and cutting ribbons. It's Jesus showing through teaching and healing what the Reign of God is like - even to be painfully executed.

That's quite a leader we're following.

Imagine if all our leaders were that self-giving?

(political & business)

How can we follow?

It's a good question to ponder.

I would suggest it involves giving, rather than saving - not blindly, but in ways that support the Reign of God.

What's God's way like?


Jesus doesn't show vengeance. We can see that Jesus lives what he preaches about forgiving those who persecute and curse you. What would it take for you to respond with violence or a curse? What would it take for everyone to be safe?

In God's reign we hear of a wasteful son who is embraced by the loving parent before they can even apologize. It doesn't change that those opportunities have been wasted and are gone, but he is able to rejoin the community. How do we accept people? help people? respect people - as God does?

We hear, and see in Jesus going to the cross, of the Shepherd who will search and search until the lost sheep is found. Our leader will look for everyone not seeing The Light. Can we help? Can we be helped?

We are told how the Reign of God grows like the smallest of seeds into what most would call a weed - and provides shelter to all kinds. What weeds do we see in society that are providing shelter to those in need? What small ideas are trying to get attention inside you? How could we help them grow?

We hear about a rich man inviting any who would come to fill his banquet hall for a celebration - even the poor and the lame.

What's all this say about the Reign of God?

It's a place that accepts everyone who will come with open arms. It's a place of diversity. It's a place that might seem like a weed - growing from what seems like nothing. It's a place where everyone is saved.

Anywhere this happens, we see the Reign of God. We practice here at church, but it's not the only place. Look around you. It may not be perfect, but look for glimpses of the Light.

and the leader of this revolution, our leader, is someone who gave up the Throne to be born in a stable - and will go to the cross looking for people to save.

In the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Holy and One.

Amen.
