☀ Invitation

Tonight we gather together in God's presence, to allow space for grief.

We know that Advent & Christmas can be a season with laughter, joy, and getting together with loved ones. We feel drawn to candles & fireplaces, light and hope.

However, we who are gathered here also know that Advent & Christmas can be a season of pain. It can be a month-long walk down memory lane that leaves us aching; a series of traditions that just don't fit anymore.

Tonight we gather together to create sacred space - space for grief, space for memories to run free, and space to remember loved ones lost. Tonight we gather together to testify to the darkness of the tomb and the darkness of the womb, believing that God is with us, not only in the light, but also through the longest nights.

We invite you to enter this space, bringing all that you are: your angers, your doubts, your sorrows, your hopes, your prayers, and your memories. Bring them all and simply let them be, for we are in the presence of God.

Let us worship.

Naming Our Grief

Grief is a heavy burden to bear. As we have just heard, "When you know love, nothing goes untouched." While not the only source of pain, the loss of love can be so painful. As a way to acknowledge our grief, I invite you to take the stone you received at the beginning of the service and write a reminder of your grief on it. You may wish to write the name of a loved one, or you may name a loss or circumstance that causes you to grieve. You can find permanent markers in your pews {or under your seats}. You may hold your stone quietly in prayer when you finish.

God of the here and now, I confess –


There is guilt that I carry, and memories to bury, but forgiving myself seems unnecessary... but is.

The Story


Christmas is a story of great joy. One of the reason is because there is hard times in this story as well.

Releasing the stones

No one has lived your life, but Jesus knows about how hard it can be. The Holy Spirit has journeyed with you, even when you never noticed. You can be completely honest with God.

I invite you to place your grief before God and to ask God for help in this journey, knowing that no matter what, God's grace goes before us.

When you are ready, I invite you to come forward and place your stone in one of the glass jars - symbolically releasing your

grief to God. We're not pretending that your grief will ever fully disappear, particularly not in this instant. In doing this we acknowledge grief is stifling and too great to carry alone. We accept God's offer to help.
