* Intro to the readings

Last week we heard about Ruth. Aside from a beautiful reminder of what love can be, she is David's great-grandmother. The same David who fought Goliath, wrote psalms, and became the greatest King Judah & Israel ever had. This week we're going to hear a little of his story.

The first bit will be an early David story. In the Bible it is told from Samuel's point of view. He's the great prophet at the time who speaks God's will to the people. In this case he's a little afraid to do that as King Saul is likely to kill people he doesn't agree with... or just kill them anyway. The version we'll hear today is from a children's Bible by Ralph Milton

One thing to remember is that when Alix reads about the Ark - this isn't like Noah's ark. This is a nicely decorated box that can be carried by four people. It contains the ten commandments and represents God being present.

We'll also hear about Michal. She is one of King Saul's daughter and at one point was in love with David and helped save him from her father. At different times her father promised she had to marry David, then another man, then she was given to David. She's not portrayed here very well in today's passage, but perhaps there are reasons why.

Sermon: Dance of Joy

Big tasks. We've all faced them.

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

How did you feel about school presentations or exams? Some of us have even had to write entrance exams. I remember being elected President of the PYPS (Presbyterian Young People's Society) and being very nervous about having to present a report at Synod. I don't

remember what happened; I think it went well (I do remember being encouraged by my friends). There are times when the boss asks you to do something that seems way beyond your capabilities - because they see something in you.


In David's case The Boss (capital B) tells David he will be king over Israel. That's pretty awesome - a good reason to dance and celebrate... though we don't hear about it here.

Imagine what that was like? Remember David was the youngest child... and I think he was still a child. Maybe the same age as

Alix. I imagine there were a lot of emotions swirling around inside. It would be exciting to think about being the king. He'd have a palace, and be more important than his older brothers. It would bring honour to his family - and to him. This would be mixed in with fear - after all, what does he know about being king. The current king was also chosen by God, and he's not doing so good.

Have you felt called by God to do something? Did you feel unqualified?



How are you at waiting?

It could be for some big 'opportunity' you are dreading, or something you desperately want. Remember being a kid and waiting for Christmas or your Birthday? (Hopefully you're still like that.) In this case God has asked David to do something but what about when you've asked God to do something - something big and vital. Do you wait patiently? With Christmas, it always comes, but what about that answer to prayer? Your body can't maintain the adrenaline of anticipation. Do you become complacent? forgetful? jaded?

David didn't just sit under a tree while waiting to become king. In fact, his life was a real roller-coaster. He lived in the fields tending sheep, in the palace helping the king, and on the run as an outlaw. He had lots of 'learning opportunities'. I don't believe God arranged for all the events to happen to David, there were definitely fallible people involved, but these opportunities prepared him for becoming the king.

I think it's the same with us. Our lives shift and change, and God can use our experiences to invite us to do things we never would have expected. I used to dread public speaking, but here I stand.

In David's case he did become king - after some 20 years of learning opportunities. King Saul had died. The people had seen David in action. He had proven himself to them, so they asked him to be their next king.

This didn't happen all at once. Since taking the promised land under Joshua, the 12 tribes of Israel had only united on special occasions. First Judah came to David. Later the rest of Israel. This was the first time they were all under one king (except God, but they weren't very good at that).

This is definitely a time to celebrate. For David, he'd finally become king. For everyone else, they are knowing peace like never before. This is great - a good reason to dance and celebrate ...though we don't hear about it here.

Now David knows he can't play favourites, so he doesn't choose any of the old capitals. There is a city in the middle of this new kingdom - Jerusalem. David makes it the centre for politics. Then he also makes it the centre of religion by bringing the Ark of the covenant to Jerusalem.

You could see this as being just a wise political move, but I think it's more. For one thing, there are the stories that show that God, and the Ark, are not to be used for political gain. I also think that David remembers who it is that made this possible. The one who is at the centre of it all is the King of kings, the Lord of lords, the almighty God, King of the universe ...who is physically represented not by a statue, but by the Ark. It is a reminder of the covenant God made with them - the promise

that God will be faithful to them, and are to be faithful to God. Bringing the Ark to Jerusalem will help them remember this.

This is definitely a time to celebrate - bringing God back to the centre of life. This is great - a good reason to dance and celebrate ...and *now* we hear about it.







The Joy of The Redeemed - Rebecca Brogan

There are harps & cymbals, drums & trumpets. There's dancing & singing - and food for everyone. It's a street party - except with the whole city. David isn't famous for his dancing skills, but here he dances with great enthusiasm and energy. Why? Because he's celebrating that God is with them.

This is something worth celebrating. It's something we can celebrate too - because it's still true. God has made our presence here possible. God's Holy Spirit worked in the lives of people before us to build the congregations that became Kensington. God continues to work in us and through us. How can we celebrate this? I don't think I could dance like David, but I can sing. I can tell others. What about you? How can you share the joy?

Sadly, not everyone joins in. Michal is portrayed as not approving of David dancing around in his underwear. That this is not respectable kingly behaviour. What do you think? What is acceptable for us to celebrate God? What is disrespectful to God,

and what are our social rules to protect us from being uncomfortable - because God has a tendency of inviting people into the uncomfortable. Not that we'd be alone, because God is always with us... which leads us back round to celebrating.

Remembering David, we also might need to be patient and live through many struggles, but when we bring God into the centre of our lives we will become a part of God's Dance - and that is something to celebrate.
