



We'll have two Gospel passages today, one from Luke and the other from John. Both involve amazing feasts. You could call them miracles. In John the preferred term is 'sign'. The distinction isn't... distinct, but you can think of a miracle as showing the connection between God and the person (in this case Jesus) while a sign reveals something divine about Jesus (so, it's a bit more specific).

Listen for what these stories, and the psalm, tell us about Jesus & God.

Reading: Please look up the passages in your own Bible,³ or click on the name to be taken to an online version.

Sermon: Abundant lessons

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

The Bible has many roles. There are good examples of people living as God would like us all to live... and examples of people getting it wrong. The Bible also tells us about God through rules, messages (prophesies), and through stories. All these combine to help us know what to expect of God, and what God expects of us.

Today let's treat our passages as signs - wonders that teach us about God.

Something we heard in last week's story when Jesus was on his way to the Pharisee's house for dinner, and today when Jesus was taking the apostles off to a quiet spot to hear how they'd done on their first outing without him, and when Jesus was attending a wedding as just a guest... Jesus' plans get interrupted. What does this tell us about Jesus - about God? That God is open to interruptions. People with needs intrude and Jesus stops what he's doing to teach them, heal them, feed them.

This is nice, though it can be a challenge to apply to our lives. Many of us don't want to be a bother to anyone, or you believe you should be able to handle it... whatever 'it' is. We don't like to go to others for help, or even accept it when it's offered. One thing we are reminded of in these passages is that it's okay to approach God at any time about anything. You aren't being a bother or a burden. God doesn't mind.

A central part of these stories is food and drink. Jesus understands that there's more to life than talking about God and theology. Our physical bodies are important. Much in our society agrees with this. This valuing of the physical body is a hard balance in our society. There's pressure to be shaped like those presented as attractive or healthy on TV. There's pressure to eat certain ways to be like them, but also to treat yourself. Neither obsession over our physical body or neglecting it are healthy. Obsessions mean our focus isn't on God, and neglect means we aren't respecting how God made us. Except for a few passages in the Bible where lust takes over, how our bodies look isn't important. Our bodies come with needs. People need food, and God provides.⁴

Now, it's not all physical with Jesus. We don't have any details this time, but there was also teaching and healing before the feeding of the multitude. Based on other teachings I would assume this included talk of being in healthy relationships with others, and with God. You could think of this as feeding your spiritual life. It's important to acknowledge both spiritual and physical needs. You can even combine them: such as having a meal, with others, and include prayer - or going for a walk with someone and building to deep discussions.

Today though, the stories remind us not to neglect the physical parts of life.

And eating & drinking are definitely aspects that can't be neglected - though it doesn't need to be wine. The recommendation from the Federal Government is that alcohol isn't something we need, but back in Biblical times alcohol was often safer than the water.

Jesus is presented with people's physical needs, and he responds by meeting them. This leads to exciting Bible stories, but what about people praying for food now. We know there are

Exercise is also important. I suspect it doesn't come up as a need in the Bible because everyone walked everywhere. Again, being obsessed about it is bad. Only be obsessed with God.

people experiencing food insecurity in our community. We haven't had a community council meeting in a few months, but the last I heard the local food banks were turning new people away. I don't have an easy answer. Some people say that these stories aren't about now, but are really about the feast to come when Jesus returns. I do believe that that will be a glorious feast... and I believe these stories aren't just about when Jesus comes again.

I came across a quote from a sermon given by Augustine of Hippo (about 1600 years ago). He reminds us that the one who multiplied the loaves is the same one who multiplies the seeds in the earth. That from a few grains a barn can be filled. Yet we don't find this amazing, even though it is, because it is repeated so often. This helps remind us that there is abundance around us. Thinking of grains in the ground, according to the UN⁵ there is enough food produced to feed everyone - though at least 10% of the world is hungry. Why doesn't God do more and make sure food gets to everyone who needs it?

Today's passages tell us something about this too. Jesus/God doesn't feed the multitudes, and he doesn't serve the wine. Jesus takes what is offered (bread, fish, water), blesses it, and gives it back to them to distribute. It is people who offer what's available to God, and then distribute to the people. In both cases God is involved, and so are people. This tells us how God chooses to work - through empowering people. We're not all asked to pass out bread, but we are all asked to share God's love. This could be literally planting seeds and gardening (such as with the New Hope or Food Depot gardens) or taking on grocery store chains over bread prices. If those aren't your skill-set, perhaps you can sit with someone and talk - there are a lot of lonely people in our

community.

Hunger is an important issue to work on, but remember a lesson from earlier - Jesus was open to interruptions. Sometimes he even planned to get away and have a little fun.

Think about the feeding of the multitude. Jesus doesn't snap his fingers and take away their hunger, or pass out food and carry on teaching while they eat. He has them sit & eat together. Imagine what it was like. To sit down with the group of people you'd been listening to Jesus with and sharing dinner. I expect there was lots of excited talk about what had been said and seen and maybe wonder at where all the food came from. Have you been to a party that had both energy and 'how to fix the world' discussions? That's probably what it was like.

And then the wedding party. Everyone was having a good time (or at least drinking lots) when, unexpectedly, the best wine ever starts flowing. You might say it was divine.⁶

Why? What does this tell us about God?

These stories, and last week's celebration with Levi, show that

This doesn't mean that God wants us to drink lots of wine - but that it was the common drink at the time, and probably easier to get than safe drinking water.

Jesus is willing to have a good time. There's more to life than just work. Having a good time isn't something we sneak into life, it's part of how God wants us to live. There's stories about tough times, but good times too. If you have an opportunity to take a break, don't feel guilty. While at the wedding celebration there was lots Jesus could have been doing to save the world - but instead he made the time to celebrate. God thinks it's important to enjoy life.

One last thing about what these passages teach about God. They show us how God gives. There is a serious lack and God responds by giving way more that is needed. With the multitude 12 baskets of leftovers are collected. At the wedding Jesus turns enough water into wine to fill about 700-800 bottles. And these aren't isolated incidents. There's the quail and manna delivered during the exodus, the reference in today's psalm, and many others. People worry about not having enough, and God gives abundantly.

So, with these familiar miracles, or signs, we are reminded that God doesn't mind being interrupted; that God values our physicality; that God does miraculous multiplying all the time; that God invites us to participate in making it all happen; that God takes time out from work, and takes time to have fun; and that God gives abundantly.

God is good.

To God be all the glory Amen.

With support from Presbyterians Sharing, ARISE Ministry provides compassionate outreach and spiritual care to survivors of



sexual exploitation, trauma, and abuse in the Greater Toronto Area. This past spring, ARISE partnered with the production company of "Angel's Bone," the Pulitzer Prize-winning opera that follows two vulnerable youths who are lured into exploitative relationships by their traffickers. Along with members of the production team, ARISE engaged in an awareness and education campaign about human trafficking in Canada leading up to the performances. ARISE was also present for Q&A sessions after each performance to provide context for the show and to highlight ongoing efforts in Toronto and Canada to combat trafficking.



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
