Intro to the readings
The story so far...

We heard in the second³ creation story that God created humans to look after the world. Unfortunately the humans didn't trust God's wisdom and broke the relationship. Thankfully God showed mercy, forgiveness, and continued to work with humans for better relationships.

Last week we heard about God choosing a family to be an example of what it's like to live with God. This seemed to be a ridiculous idea, but we can see how God used this family to change the world (and include us). While this family was able to show how God loves people and helps people towards a better life... there's also repeated stories of humans breaking relationships.

Abram eventually has two children - and sends the older one away due to jealousy in the family. His son Isaac continues the



family with twins: Esau and Jacob. We don't know a lot about Esau, but Jacob (with his mom's help) manipulated Esau out of his inheritance, and his dad out of his brother's blessing.

God also blessed Jacob and renamed him Israel.

Today's story is about Jacob's sons... and, of course, God.

Sermon: Family 'fun'

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

One of my Bible Profs commented that families have the worst arguments. He was thinking of early Christians and Pharisees, but it's true all the way back to Genesis... and now. Families can treat each other horribly.

I know some of you can relate.

It seems a little odd as families have so much in common. There's the nature side with their shared DNA, and the nurture side that shapes values. Even those that join a family through marriage have a lot in common, or they would never have joined up. You'd think families would always be understanding with each other... but we've all heard or experienced family causing suffering.

...though hopefully not as bad as Joseph's brothers. They didn't just say, "Oh, I wish he were dead.", they actually planned to kill him. Reuben (the oldest) talked them down so that they only beat him up, flung him down a cistern for a while, and then sold him into slavery. (I really hope nobody looks this up for Biblical family values.)

If you'd like a new Bible with helpful notes, I recommend the 'Life with God Bible' NRSV from Renovaré, ISBN 0061834963

or for the more academically inclined. The New Oxford Study Bible NRSV

You could read the whole chapter... or the whole loseph section from chapter 27 to the end of 50 (about 1/4 of the book)

Joseph's brothers were bad, but his dad wasn't a great example either. Even if we forget about how he treated his brother when he was a young man, he blatantly loves Joseph more than the rest - which causes problems in the family. For a family that is supposed to be living an example of Godly living... this isn't what God would want. God doesn't have favourites.

And then there's Joseph. Sometimes in the children's stories he comes across all innocent and picked on by his brothers, but that's not in the text. I wish I'd extended the lectionary back a verse. That's where Joseph is introduced as working with his brothers and "bringing a bad report of them to their father." There's no details as to whether this was justified or tattling. Either way it didn't help the relationship.



Verse two also tells us he's 17. Perhaps this is the reason he's not so socially unaware. We know that getting your brothers in trouble is probably not going to make you popular with them, but then to start telling your hard working older brothers that you're going to be the boss and they will bow down to you. Well, it's not surprising they get annoyed. Despite being an adult, in their culture, at 17 Joseph's brain is still developing the part that foresees consequences. Whatever the reasons, Joseph is also a

source of problems and pain in the relationship.

All together, they made a big mess of the relationships God had placed them in. Their actions lead to a lot of suffering. Jacob/Israel suffers deep grief thinking that his favourite son has been torn to pieces. The brothers suffer guilt, even after they've made up with Joseph. (The section we heard about them making up is not the first time it's happened, and it seems likely they made up the bit about father asking Joseph to forgive them.) Joseph suffers being torn from daddy, being a slave, and then forgotten in prison for years.

Sometimes people are beaten down so much the just fade into nothing, but often we ask why. When the brothers give themselves over to Joseph in Chapter 50, he has had time to think. This is about 20 years later. Not only is his frontal lobe fully developed, but he's been humbled by time as a slave and in prison. This older, wiser and successful Joseph replies to them, "Even though you intended to do harm to me, God intended it for good".

Does this explain why people can be so hurtful to each other? why families break each other's hearts? Is the pain we experience part of God's great plan?

It does tie into the idea that God is the King of kings and Lord of lords... but it is also so simplistic it's damaging.

To continue the human analogy of kings - they can decided anything inside their kingdom... but they don't decide everything in the kingdom. Whether they like it or not, many decisions happen without them. God is above everyone - and God could decide everything for everyone... but doesn't. This isn't the plan. We were created in God's image. We were created to participate in making decisions. God chooses to respect that and us by allowing us to make choices. God gives us freedom, room to grow, ...and make mistakes.

Joseph is wrong.

God did not intend the horrible things the brothers did for good. This is not consistent with what we know of how our Lord works. The psalm reminds us that our Lord works justice, mercy & is abounding in steadfast love. The tales of Jesus show us how God will suffer with us to make our relationship right again.

But what about the suffering in the world? As a friend told me recently, 'It rains on everyone - good and bad.' Sometimes the suffering is from nature, such as the flooding in Europe. Sometimes it is through change... which might be encouraged by the Holy Spirit. Sometimes the pain is from other people. They may be annoying like Joseph, or cause division like Israel, or lash out like the brothers.

What do we do with Joseph's suggestion that, "Even though you intended to do harm to me, God intended it for good"?

Joseph's not completely wrong. A necessary part is forgiveness of those who did you harm. Without that you will be stuck in the time they hurt you and not able to grow. And accepting forgiveness (from yourself and the people you have hurt), or you will be like the brothers who have been forgiven, but still continue to live in fear and grief. Forgiveness is part of going on from hurtful relationships.

Another part Joseph also grasped is that God is with us. As the psalms repeatedly sing, "the steadfast love of the LORD lasts forever." This means God will stick with us - like with Jacob, Joseph, and the brothers. God will stick with you - and the people you really don't like... possibly for very good reasons. So remember that God doesn't approve of everything they do - or everything you do

either, but know that the God's Spirit is with us.

The last part Joseph also got right - and this is the best bit. God was able to reform the damage that was done. God didn't plan or arrange for these people to treat each other horribly, but God was able to change them to bring healing. When we trust in God's ways, lives will be reformed to bring love, hope & healing. In Joseph's story this included him, his brothers, dad, and the Egyptians.

Let us also be open to being reformed into better versions of ourselves - ones that God will use to share blessings.

To God be all the glory Amen.



Responding to God

FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies.

Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Memories: Do you have, or know, an experience with God reforming a relationship that you can share?

Etching: In Genesis 37 everybody's heart is torn - from Joseph to his brothers to his father. If your trust is high enough, share about a time when your heart was torn.

Wonder: Is it possible that instead of reliving it you can allow God to reform it?

Wonder: Is there a way God might want to 'reform' you to be a better family member?

Actions: What do you need to forgive and let go of this week to move forward in your life more positively?

Prayer: ...for relationship(s) that you are currently having difficulty with.

Please reform lives into blessings.


