Listening to God

Children's Time

The Bible is an important book because it tells us about people's experiences with God. By reading it we can learn about God... and this can teach us to see the world like God does.

It's good to read big chunks of the Bible to get a bigger picture, but let's hear a short story. It's about Jesus and children.

Afterwards I'm going to ask what Jesus thinks of children - and

what that means about how we should live.

Some people brought children to Jesus for him to place his hands on them, but the disciples scolded the people. When Jesus noticed this, he

was angry and said to his disciples, "Let the children come to me, and do not stop them, because the Kingdom of God belongs to such as these. I assure you that whoever does not receive the Kingdom of God like a child will never enter it." Then he took the children in his arms, placed his hands on each of them, and blessed them.³

What Jesus thinks of children? (likes them, important, ...)

Intro to the readings

We're leaving the lectionary this week because I want to share with you a bit of what I've been doing as a part of a national committee that's been asked to find stories of hope and possibilities for the future of the denomination.

We started by getting to know each other and sharing stories that brought us hope. We felt it was important that anything we were to propose be based on the Bible - a bit like what we did in the children's time. We shared various passages from the Bible that spoke to the denomination now, and decided on the end of the Gospel According to John. This led to us spending time with this passage and considering what it was telling us. You'll hear it soon.

Leading into this passage Jesus was crucified. Peter, another disciples, and Mary Magdalene discovered the tomb was empty. Mary then talked with a couple of angels, and then Jesus. She tells the disciples. That was in the morning, the passage starts in the evening.

You'll hear that the disciples were afraid of the Jews. This is odd as they were Jews. Most likely they were afraid of a group of people, such as those who had arranged for Jesus to be killed. Broadening this to include all Jews likely reflects when the gospel was written 60-90 after the events when the early Christians were separating from their Jewish roots.

As you listen, think about

Who do you relate to?


- Where is God? What is God doing?
- What's it saying to us?

Even if you've never heard anything from the Bible before, I think the Holy Spirit will bring things to your attention. As it's a long passage we'll give her two chances. After which you'll have a chance to share your thoughts, and I'll share some thoughts we had.

* Sermon: Where is Jesus

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

- Who do you relate to?
- Where is God? What is God doing?
- What's it saying to us?

The first thing we noticed is that this passage includes us. It's not just a nice story of the original disciples. After Thomas declares he believes Jesus includes all who believe.

We then noticed that the disciples were afraid. There's lots of reasons they had, and lots of reasons we can have, to be afraid. This passage acknowledges that, and provides hope.

For example: Jesus appears with the disciples in unlikely, even impossible, places. Jesus goes to where they are (such as the locked room)... and is out in the world ahead of them (he already has fish on the fire). For us this would have Jesus showing up at church, in your home, and everywhere you go (grocery store, the bus, ... Take a moment and think of some places that you go during the week - and think about Jesus being there.)

Jesus gives them peace. Jesus gives us peace. Do you feel it? I expect that you do sometimes, but not all the time - neither did they. A week later they're still afraid in the locked room. I encourage you to notice when you feel peace, and to practice leaning into Jesus/God when you don't - because Jesus is there - no matter how much you've locked yourself away from what is disturbing you.

Jesus breaths into them *the Spirit* - like God breathing into humans in the creation story. This gives them life and power. You

and I also have this power.⁵ You may or may not feel powerful, but when working with God's Spirit... impossible things can happen.

We liked that Jesus had breakfast ready for the disciples. They'd worked hard doing what they knew, and Jesus fed them. God, our creator, recognizes our needs.

Jesus is compassionate. The disciples keep not getting things right. On that first night Jesus sends them to share God's amazingness. A week later they are still in the room with the door locked. That said, they did have a chance. Thomas came to them. Someone who was one of them. He should be the easiest person on the planet to convert - and they are total failures. Still, Jesus comes to them. And later Jesus finds they've gone back to their old ways - and still not caught any fish. (did he mean people?) And so he feeds them. Don't worry about failing. Jesus gives compassion and forgiveness to all who want to do better.

What is Jesus interested in? What should the focus be one, if not success and failure? Belief. Faith. Inviting the world to grow in faith, and sharing God's gifts of love, hope and healing. Part of

this story is that Jesus (not a fisherman) tells the professionals (who know what they're doing) to do something that is silly/ridiculous - to throw the nets on the other side. They do what Jesus says, and the ridiculously impossible happens. Success beyond their imagination. What sort of crazy ideas can you imagine? Perhaps we should pray & talk about them. It seems that God can do wonders.

Which makes this a story of hope and possibility (the mandate of the committee⁶). It acknowledges the fear that is in the denomination. It also reminds us that Jesus is with us when we gather, when we go out, and that Jesus sends us out. When we go engage outside, God's Spirit will give us strength and Jesus will nourish us. We will fail, but God will not leave us. We 'just' need to focus on following & believing - and incredible things will happen.

and we believe this will help the denomination (and Kensington) have a future... but that it's not about us - it's about Jesus.

and to God be all the glory Amen.



FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies.

Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Memories: When have you felt at peace? What did it feel like?

Values: How can you lean into Jesus/God/Spirit for peace?

Wonder: Where will you be today? tomorrow? What appointments do you have this week? Think about each of these events, and that Jesus is already there.

Visions: Consider what God wants and ignore all logic or practicality - what would Kensington be like? Then pray for this (and that God's will be done)

Actions: Consider how you could gather (possibly the conversation you're having now), and be sent out.

Remember to respect how God made you (interests, gifts, nature, and current abilities)... and to allow God to help you grow.

Prayer: ...thank God for your belief, and to help with your unbelief.⁷

* Spirit Sightings

This week I heard a number of stories at the meeting. One of them is about a congregation that was vacant and wondering about their existence. In the midst of this an immigrant or refugee showed up among them - unexpectedly, even improbably appears. They decided to drop the examination of vision and finances and committees. Instead they started a group that shared a meal, a study on one of the gospels, and prayed. They build community and relationships - and more people have appeared. They focused on Jesus and something is happening.

This is the Holy Spirit at work.

In addition, the project raises awareness among young men through workshops where they learn about machismo, identify what violence against women looks like and promote commitments to eliminate it.


