# Listening to God

### Children's Time:

A couple of times last week I heard about children asking a good question. They figure out that Christmas is Jesus' birthday. Then they wonder why, if it's Jesus' birthday, we get the presents and we don't give presents to Jesus.<sup>3</sup>

One story I heard involves a sister and brother, Hannah and Nicholas. They not only figured out about the birthday, but had been told that the Christ child would visit on Christmas eve.

Hannah, who always thought deep thoughts, said to Nicholas, "If Jesus comes, what if Jesus comes to us? Maybe we should have a gift for him."

Nicholas was the practical one, "That's a good idea, but how would we recognize him... and what would we give?"

Hannah suggested, "We could get three presents, that way one will be good."

Still not knowing what to get, they asked their mom what a baby needs. She told them, "When babies are warm they know they are loved." So they took all the fabric they found in the sowing bin and made a colourful blanket.

Then they asked their dad. He suggested that it's good to be able to see where you're going, so perhaps a flashlight. So they took their money down to the dollar store and found a wind-up flashlight - that way it would always be ready.

Wondering about the third gift, they decided chocolates were nice. So they re-wrapped a box of chocolates they'd been given

The first time was from somebody at the New Hope lunch. The second was looking through the book Dirt, Mess and Danger' ed by Glendon Macaulay. What follows is adapted from 'A Christmas Story' by Rev. Sally Foster-Fulton

(one they hadn't started yet).

All ready, they started wondering about how to find Jesus to give the presents. Just then, the doorbell rang - but it wasn't baby Jesus. It was Mme Miriam from across the street. Their furnace had died and they were wondering if they could borrow a heater to stay warm. Hannah and Nicholas offered their blanket. She was very grateful.

That night they went to church for Christmas Eve. This, they figured, would be a good place to find Jesus. On the way they passed a broken car. Somebody was trying to see the problem with the engine - so the children gave the flashlight. They were very grateful.

At church Hannah and Nicolas were a little disappointed they only had one gift left - and then they heard that the Kim's had their house broken into and all the presents stolen. This was sad.

Their son, Seo-jun, was in Nicolas' class at school. He looked at Hannah and she nodded her agreement, so he offered their last present to them.

Afterwards the worship time they shared with the minister their idea and disappointment that they hadn't met Jesus, and no longer had any presents to give anyway. The minister told them about something Jesus said when he was grown up. "Whenever you give gifts to somebody who needs them, it's the same as giving gifts to me." ...and they had given their gifts to Jesus.

## ☀ Intro to the readings

We have four books about Jesus' life in the Bible, the Gospels, and they focus on his life, and how it leads towards his death and resurrection. However two of them also include stories of his birth - how the Son of God came into the world. Matthew focuses on Joseph and the Magi. This year we're going to focus on Luke (from now until after Easter). Luke starts by telling us about how both John the Baptiser and Jesus were conceived. John has been

As Rose reads about Jesus' birth we will also hear from some of the characters in the story.

#### **Luke 2: 1-5**

<sup>2:1</sup> In those days Caesar Augustus ordered that all the world should be registered. <sup>2</sup> This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. <sup>3</sup> Everyone went to the towns they came from to be registered. <sup>4</sup> So Joseph went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Bethlehem in Judah, the city of David, because he was a descendant of David. <sup>5</sup> He went with Mary, his fiancée, who was pregnant.

Caesar wants to make a list of everybody. Everybody!

Does he really think he rules the whole world? It would be laughable except that Mary is so close to giving birth. To make his list for tax wishes he turns our wishes upside-down.

How come he gets to upset our lives like this?

### **Luke 2: 6-7**

<sup>6</sup>While they were there, the time came for Mary to deliver her child. <sup>7</sup>And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth and laid him in a manger, because there was no place in the guest room.

Can you believe it?

It started with God picking me to birth his son into the world. That was crazy. I'm a nobody. When Joseph and I finish getting married I'll have a connection to King David through himbut I'm no princess, and we don't have money or comforts. We don't even have experience raising kids. And still, God picked me.



And now... Jesus has been born. The Son of God. The Saviour. Born just like any other baby... except the Son of God is sleeping in a food trough in a barn.

What's this say about God?

#### **Luke 2: 8-14**

<sup>8</sup> Now in that same region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. <sup>9</sup> Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. <sup>10</sup> But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid, for see, I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: <sup>11</sup> to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. <sup>12</sup> This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." <sup>13</sup> And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying,

<sup>14</sup> "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!"

Can you believe it?

God's chosen people are being squeezed by the Romans, especially the common people, and God sends in the army of angels.

And what military manoeuvres we get to perform.

Not fighting, but delivering the greatest news ever. The people shouldn't be afraid because the Saviour has come - and I don't mean us. This is fantastic - a great joy for everyone.

To help prove the point, we don't go to the leaders, but to the people. God doesn't descend on a cloud or ride in on a horse, but was born a human baby - not behind palace walls or in the Temple sanctum, but down with everyone else. It's so awesome that we raise our voices and sing of peace on earth.

What's this say about God?

#### **Luke 2: 15-20**

<sup>15</sup> When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see what has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." <sup>16</sup> So they quickly went and found Mary and Joseph and the



child lying in the manger. <sup>17</sup> When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child, <sup>18</sup> and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them, <sup>19</sup> and Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. <sup>20</sup> The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, just as it had been told them.

Can you believe it?

Angels! Talking to us!

We were a bit terrified. Us shepherds, we live off the grid. Life's easier when the leaders don't notice you. Having a spotlight from the heavens light up your life is... a bit terrifying.

But then we got the message.

Don't be afraid because everything's going to become good - so good we'll be filled with joy... and not just us, but everyone can be included.

Which may seem upside-down, mighty angels telling common shepherds about how God is saving the world. You'd think it'd be the priests or kings - but this message is for everyone.

We can't not check it out - and everything's just as the Lord shared with us. And you could tell. There's just something about the baby. Helpless, but peace and joy just come out of him - like the glowing of a candle.

This must be what God's glory looks like.

It was wonderful. So wonderful, we couldn't contain the good news and ran around telling everyone.

What's this say about God?

It's one of the questions we always ask when reading the Bible.

The angel's message is not only in the middle of the passage, but says a lot about God. It starts with 'Fear not.' I talk with a lot of people, and there's a lot of concern about... lots of things. The environment, expenses, landlords, health, governments trying to limit freedoms, or having leadership issues, or civil wars, or wars with neighbours. Biblically speaking, 'concerned' is used in relating to something. (ex. from Jonah when God says, "Should I not be concerned about Nineveh?") When talking about something that troubles or distresses you, the word 'fear' is used. So, while we might say we are 'concerned' about \_\_\_\_\_, this is 'fear'.

God sends a message. "Fear not."

What's this say about God?

That God knows we have reasons to fear (or be concerned), and that God invites us to trust that things will be okay. There is "good news of great joy for all the people." This 'fear not' message isn't just for the shepherds, it's for us too. We are part of "all the people."

As is everyone else. It's no surprise. This has been part of the narrative we've been hearing through the Older Testament. God includes the powerful and the ordinary, the chosen and their enemies, those who live good lives and those who don't. Nobody is a nobody for God. You, your neighbours, and people you think are crazy. Everyone is invited to share the good news of great joy.

and what is this "good news of great joy"?

The Saviour has been born in Bethlehem and is lying in a

manger.

How is this good news?

It shows that God is very different from other leaders, such as Caesar. Jesus wasn't born in Rome, the capital of the Empire, or Jerusalem, the local capital and centre of Jewish faith. Jesus isn't born in a palace, or even a house. The Son of God is born in Bethlehem and is lying in a manger.

Caesar orders that the lives of everyone in 'all' the world be disturbed so they can be shaken down for more taxes and for labour for his projects. A common labourer in Galilee may not know, but Caesar should know that he doesn't control all the world. The Ethiopians, Picts, and others were definitely outside his influence. Still, it says something about his leadership and priorities.

God doesn't try and bend the world to serve him. Jesus comes to serve - and shows this by arriving in the most humble of ways. There's nothing glorious or honourable about being born to a common family (which includes being poor) - in a stable - out of wedlock. God arrives needing help, and Jesus grows up seeking to help people who are lost. It doesn't matter whether they have done things to separate themselves from community with God, or been separated from their community due to some sort of illness or behaviour... Jesus reaches out to help them back - to help turn their lives around - to help them repent.

You get a similar message about leadership with the host (Biblical for army) of angels. Rome has an army and uses it to enforce their will. God has an army of angels, and uses it to sing about the "good news of great joy for all the people."

This is a very different type of leadership. It tells us that God humbly looks to help. God could use force, but doesn't. God inspires people to join in sharing the good news - to bear it into the world.

Which says something about God.

Though is it good news?

It is if you value a leader/Lord/Saviour who knows there are reasons to be afraid. Who respects you, wants to include you - to involve you in saving the world - in bringing joy and peace to all who want to live in God's realm.

Which is good news of great joy. Can you believe it?

To God be all the glory Amen.



FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies.

Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Memories: Share fond memories of Christmas.

Values: Thinking of Caesar and God both bringing their values into people's lives in the Christmas story... which values do you choose to embrace? How would you describe them? Why? How do you live them?

Wonder: How would you explain this news of great joy for all people to someone who doesn't go to church?

Visions: A baby in Bethlehem is a small thing. What is a small thing that would make the world better now?

Visions: Can you imagine the enthusiasm of the shepherds?

When have you felt that irresistible urge to tell everyone about something?

Prayer: ...that we will have opportunities to both see God grow, and share the good news with the enthusiasm of the shepherds.

## ☀ Spirit Sightings

This week I heard about Collective Kitchens.<sup>5</sup> They started in Montreal in the 1980s, and there are now many throughout Québec. While they function separately the gist is the same. Families pay a small amount for a Christmas dinner... but they have to come and help prepare it. This provides a meal they could not afford, and teaches cooking skills, builds community, and creates a good family experience.

The article didn't mention church or God - but the way the program reaches out to people, gives them skills, meets needs,

to recognize the fears of those in their care and to reach out to help them...







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## MISSION MOMENT Sunday, December 22

Somalia has been devastated by drought for the last six years. Among the many pushed to the brink of starvation is Hawa Ahmed, a resilient mother of eight. When the lack of water and food made the situation increasingly dire, Hawa made the courageous decision to relocate her family for the chance at a better life. Her new surroundings came with a harsh reality: as a displaced person, she was stripped



of her possessions and support system, leaving her feeling alone and anxious for a solution. Things changed when Hawa joined a program supported by PWS&D that provided families with emergency cash. With this financial support, Hawa was able to purchase food and ensure access to clean drinking water for her children.
