Intro to the readings

At Christmastime there are many things we do to decorate and get in the spirit. The children have been exploring these, and the idea that they mean something more. In a variety of beautiful (and sometimes delicious) ways, they can remind us of God.

There will be 12 sections, like the 12 days of Christmas, in which we'll see a video of the children asking about something, hear Cathy & Dean explain it and share a scripture passage, and sing a refrain.

* Children's Message: Symbols of Christmas

Dear Lord, please bless these words

and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

(Children & Ines are decorating their house for Christmas. As they add different items to their home, they discuss the meaning behind each item and how they all lead to Jesus.)

1. evergreen tree

Animator: OK Kids! Are you ready to get the house ready for Christmas?

Helper A: I love getting ready for Christmas! Helper B: It's my favourite time of the year! Helper C: It makes me get in the mood for Christmas.

Helper D: This stuff just fills up the house and gets in my way.



Animator: Boys, I'm so glad you are excited about it. But you have to remember that this "stuff", as Helper D put it, means something as well.

Helper A: What do you mean?

Animator: Why do we celebrate Christmas?

Helper C: It's Jesus' birthday! It's when we remember that Jesus came into this world as a baby.

Animator: That's right.

Helper A: Why do we have to decorate then?

Helper D: Yeah, why do we have to fill up our house with all this stuff?

Animator: Well, let's talk about some of this "stuff" and what it all means. Let's start with the evergreen tree that we are decorating.

Reader: An evergreen tree has a very appropriate name. It is ever green – always green. It does not become dormant in the winter as other trees do. The colour green represents new life and the needles of the evergreen always point up – heavenward. It symbolizes our everlasting life with Jesus Christ. We should be as the evergreen tree – always full of life, never becoming dormant in our life with Christ as our arms are lifted heavenward.

2. Ornaments

Helper A: I didn't realize.

Helper B: I didn't know it had a meaning.

Helper C: I just thought it was a tree.

Helper D: What does this other stuff mean? Animator: How about the ornaments?

Reader: Ornaments are used to decorate
Christmas trees each and every year.
People look for the perfect ones to fit on
their tree. Our Christmas tree just would
seem complete without our ornaments.
Ornaments can symbolize the blessings in
our lives. Our lives just wouldn't be
complete without God's blessings.
Everything that we have is due to God



loving us so much that He wants to shower us with His blessings. Just as ornaments are all different shapes and sizes, blessings are all different as well. God picks and chooses each blessing for us so that it will be just right. The next time you decorate your tree, and as you put up each ornament, think of a blessing that God has given you. I think you'll find that you'll run out of ornaments before you can run out of blessings!



3. Lights and candles

Helper A: We have so many blessings. Helper B: We have our home and our family.

Helper C: It's hard to think of all of the blessings that God has given us. Helper D: Ok, so I guess that's not so

bad. And it does look nice.



Animator: Oh, there's so much more. How about we talk about the lights and candles.

Reader: Lights and candles are used to give light. When a room is full of darkness, it is dark. But, if you light a single match in a dark room, the room is light. There may be more darkness, but the light overpowers it. We are that light. We can be the single light in a world of darkness. We must share our light with the world so that the light increases.



"You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house." Matthew 5:14-15

4. Bells

Helper A: I love the lights!

Helper B: I didn't know it had a meaning.

Helper C: Let's put more lights on.

Helper D: I guess I never looked at it that we are the lights for God.

Animator: Exactly. Let's put these bells on the tree next.

Reader: The bell rings out to guide the lost sheep back to the fold, signifying that all are precious in the eyes of the Lord. Jesus is our shepherd, and He laid

down His life for us so that we may spend eternity with Him in heaven. He is calling us to follow Him through His Word. Are you going to listen?



"If a man has a hundred sheep, and one of them has gone astray, does he not leave the ninety-nine on the mountains and go in

5. Candy Canes

Helper A: The bells sound so beautiful. Helper B: I didn't know it had a meaning. Helper C: Jesus is our shepherd. We are His sheep.

Helper D: He would go looking for me. Animator: Who likes candy canes?

All Children: ME!

Animator: Let's put these on next.



Reader: The Candy Cane symbolizes multiple things. If you hold it upright...it looks like a shepherd's crook. The shepherds were some of the few people who were able to see the baby Jesus in Bethlehem.

If you turn the candy cane upside down...it looks like a "J". Jesus starts with the letter "J".

The colours of the candy cane are also symbolic. The red represents the blood that Jesus shed for us on the cross and the white represents the purity of Jesus. There are candy canes with three small red stripes running around it. These stripes symbolize the Trinity – God the Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit. Who knew that this delicious simple candy was so profoundly symbolic of our Lord Jesus Christ and His simple birth?

6. Star

Helper A: These are delicious!

Helper C: There seems to be a reason why we do everything that we do.

Helper B: I didn't know it had a meaning.

Helper D: I can see now how this "stuff" has meaning.

Animator: I'm so glad that you are changing your mind about some of these things. I have some stars to put on the tree next.



Reader: The star is a heavenly sign of prophecy fulfilled ages ago, the shining hope for all mankind. The star led the wise men to find the baby Jesus. These wise men travelled many miles following a star in the sky. The star was their "guiding light" to the Savior. God was the wise men's travel agent, of sorts, leading them to the greatest destination known to man – the Savior. We now have His Word as our "guiding light" to lead us to be with Him in heaven. Are you going to follow Him?



"And behold, the star which they had seen in the East went before them, till it came and stood over where the young Child was. When they saw the star, they rejoiced with exceedingly great joy."

Refrain: O Come all ye faithful (chorus)

7. Angel

Helper A: I like that the star was their "guiding light".

Helper B: I didn't know it had a meaning.

Helper C: They were able to follow the star to



Jesus.

Helper D: God's Word will lead us to Jesus.

Animator: Well, I think our tree is almost finished. We just have to put the angel on top.

Reader: Imagine...you are a lowly shepherd, watching over your sheep. This night seems no different than any other. Then all of a sudden, an angel of the Lord is in the sky above you... telling you of the Savior's birth. You, a shepherd? Why did God send an angel to tell shepherds? Because the message that God had about the birth of Jesus was for all people! Not just for the right, not just for the Jew...EVERYONE! God chose His #1 messenger to tell the lowest of people (in the world's eyes) of His Son's birth! God looks at the heart – not what the world looks at – thank goodness!



"And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone 'round about them: and they were so afraid. And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David, a Savior, which is Christ the Lord." Luke 2:9-11

8. Holly

Helper A: Our tree looks beautiful! Helper C: The angel was like a messenger of God.

Helper B: I didn't know it had a meaning.

Helper D: But what about all the

other "stuff" that we put around the house.

Animator: Well, Helper D. Let's talk about this holly that we're going to put on the table.

Reader: We see holly as decorations during the Christmas season. But do we really understand what holly stands for?

The leaves represent the crown of thorns that were placed upon Jesus' head as He was being crucified. The berries symbolize the blood that He shed for us. He endured criticism, excruciating pain, and embarrassment... all for you and me.

The next time you see a decoration with holly on it, remember what was done for you so that He could spend eternity with you. I know that I will. "And twisting together a crown of thorns, they put it on His head and put a reed in His right hand. And kneeling before Him, they mocked Him, saying,

9. Wreath

Helper A: That's amazing what He did for us.

Helper C: He went through all of that for me!

Helper B: I didn't know it had a meaning.

Helper D: That's quite an amazing thing to think about during this Christmas season.

Animator: That leads us to this wreath that we'll hang on the door.

Reader: The wreath has its evergreen branches bent in a circle so that the ends touch, having no beginning or end, just as there is no beginning or end of Jesus' eternal love for us. Just as the wreath looks the same throughout and seems to not change, so He will always be the same.

10. presents

Helper A: I just love how it looks on our door.

Helper C: It's nice to know that He will never change.

Helper B: I didn't know it had a meaning.

Helper D: That's a great reminder that even though we change and



grow, He'll always be right there. Now what about the presents? Those can't have a meaning.

Animator: Well, you will be surprised then.

Reader: These days, the world has forgotten the reason for Christmas. Most people seem to think that getting presents is the greatest thing about Christmas. Other people seem to think that presents have nothing to do with Christmas. Well, they are both wrong.

The wise men came to visit Jesus as a young child and gave Him presents. They have His gold, frankincense, and myrrh. They offered Him hold, as a king, paying Him tribute; frankincense, as God, for they honoured God with the smoke of incense; and myrrh, as a man that should die, for myrrh was used in embalming dead bodies. These men...these wise men...saw this child and knew that He is a king, is God, and that He would die for the sins of the world. How can anyone, with the knowledge that we have now, not believe?

Helper D: I never knew that the

wise men's gifts had meanings. What about the wrapping? That's just something that we came up with, right?

Animator: Yes, and no. The bows and ribbons do have a special meaning that would be good for us to remember.

Reader: Many people spend hours wrapping all their presents during Christmas time. They use ribbons, garland, and bows to make sure that their presents are as beautiful as possible. What they don't realize is that the items that they use to complete the outside of the gift have more meaning than the actual gift inside.

The bow ties our present with a beautiful ribbon, just as Jesus ties us as Christians together in His love. We may not be in the same family, but we are all in the family of God. Jesus is the ribbon that binds us together.

12. cookies

Helper A: I just thought the wrappings where to hide the present inside.

Helper B: I didn't know it had a meaning.



Helper C: There's really a lot to think about.

Helper D: That's for sure. I never knew that all of this "stuff" had meaning.

Animator: People do get a little crazy with the "stuff" of Christmas. The parties, the gift-giving, the "busy-ness" of the Christmas season. What we need to do is slow down and enjoy every moment by remembering the true meaning of Christmas. Who wants a cookie?

Helper D: I know there's not a meaning in the cookie.

Animator: Oh, you'd be surprised.

Reader: Making cookies is a favourite pastime for most families during the Christmas season. Cookie cutters are used to turn ordinary dough into edible masterpieces.

God doesn't use cookie cutters when He creates each one of us. He makes every one of us so special and unique that He would have to break the mold after just one use. He is the potter, and we are His clay. He wants to mold us into His masterpieces. We only need to be moldable and willing to follow His lead.

While in worship we'll be passing around the prayer diary to form our prayers of the people, you may choose to use the following. It is based on the "O" Antiphons, a traditional Advent prayer that is probably most familiar through the hymn "O Come, O Come, Immanuel."

O Wisdom, coming forth from the mouth of the Most High, pervading and permeating all creation, you order all things with strength and gentleness: Come now and teach us the way to salvation.

Come, Lord Jesus.

O Adonai, ruler of the house of Israel, you appeared in the burning bush to Moses and gave him the law on Sinai: Come with outstretched arm to save us.

Come, Lord Jesus.

O Root of Jesse, rising as a sign for all the peoples, before you earthly rulers will keep silent and nations give you honour: Come quickly to deliver us.

Come, Lord Jesus.

O Key of David, scepter over the house of Israel, you open and no one can close, you close and no one can open: Come to set free the prisoners who live in darkness and the shadow of death.

Come, Lord Jesus.

O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: Come, shine on those who live in darkness and in the shadow of death.

Come, Lord Jesus.

O Ruler of the nations, monarch for whom the people long, you are the cornerstone uniting all humanity: Come, save us all, whom you formed out of clay.

Come, Lord Jesus.

O Immanuel, our sovereign and lawgiver, desire of the nations and Savior of all: Come and save us, O Lord our God.

Come, Lord Jesus.

God of grace, ever faithful to your promises, the earth rejoices in hope of our Savior's coming and looks forward with longing to his return at the end of time. Prepare our hearts to receive him when he comes, for he is Lord forever and ever.

Somalia has been devastated by drought for the last six years. Among the many pushed to the brink of starvation is Hawa Ahmed, a resilient mother of eight. When the lack of water and food made the situation increasingly dire, Hawa made the courageous decision to relocate her family for the chance at a better life. Her new surroundings came with a harsh reality: as a displaced person, she was stripped



of her possessions and support system, leaving her feeling alone and anxious for a solution. Things changed when Hawa joined a program supported by PWS&D that provided families with emergency cash. With this financial support, Hawa was able to purchase food and ensure access to clean drinking water for her children.
