Intro to the readings

We're part way through Advent, the season of getting ready for Christ's coming. What can we expect?

Today Mary<sup>3</sup> is going to help us. She reflects on her life and what's happened before in scripture and uses this to interpret what's going on. In the Magnificat she starts by saying "My soul magnifies the Lord" (Magnificat is Latin for magnifies). If you think of this as Mary believing that she makes God bigger, then she's

got a pretty big ego. It's also impossible. God is already bigger than our ability to grasp. Instead Mary is like a magnifying glass that shows a portion of what God is doing in more details.

Let's do that. We'll follow Mary's example of looking back on scripture and her life to see what God is doing - which will help us with our preparations for the Advent of Christ(mas).

Let's quickly run through the stories we've heard this season.

- With Adam, Eve & God we heard that we can't go back after a mistake, but with mercy and forgiveness there is a way forward
- With Abram and Sarai we (you and I) are invited to be a part of God's impossibly big vision
- With Joseph we hear again about forgiveness and are reminded that not only is God with us, but God can re-form people who are hurt into people who can bless others.
- with Moses we heard about the importance of remembering and celebrating what God has done because this shapes us.
- Then the Golden Calf reminded us that God is not fixed, but is about helping people experience justice (which includes mercy) and love.
- Hannah, Samuel's mother, models giving our deepest desires to God (in her case, having a child) - making God's desires her desires.
- David's desire to build the temple shows how good intentions are only good if that's what God wants <u>us</u> to do (it might be for someone else)
- We heard that the great prophet Isaiah felt unworthy when God asked him to be a prophet, and that into those

troubled times God helped him deliver warnings and hope.

- In Ezekiel we see that God is working in outsiders to prepare them to meet God through us and enables us to bring life to each other.
- Jonah's story is crazy and impossible all through it. One big lesson is that we should not assume about outsiders because when people hear about God they can change for the better.
- and last week Daniel and the Lions reminded us that God is more powerful than anything, can work through outsiders, and wants us to humbly participate in our communities.

We might boil that down to

- Our focus should be on following God
- God enables crazy impossible things
- God invites everyone to join in us and people who are different (sometimes so different they are enemies)

One last bit of back-story before we hear about Mary. Luke starts, after a traditional greeting, with the story of an angel visiting a priest in the Temple. He and his wife were both great people and good examples. They were descended from the original priests. Their only blight was that over their long life they had never had children. The angel tells Zachariah that he and Elizabeth will have a son. Zachariah doubts this, and so can't speak until it comes to pass.

Sermon: What's Mary Magnifying?

With Elizabeth's help Mary is able to look at what God is doing in the world - through her. She becomes a magnifying glass through which we can notice God.

That God is doing the unexpected. This includes all the characters so far.

Zachariah shouldn't be surprised to meet God in the

- temple, but this role has just become normal and normally one doesn't notice God at work.
- Elizabeth becomes pregnant well past menopause.
- Mary isn't described with the noble lineage or blameless life that Zachariah and Elizabeth have. She doesn't live in Jerusalem, or even Judea. She's a nobody from nowhere. She hasn't slept with a man making it even more impossible for her to have a baby than an elderly woman. Yet, she's the one to give birth to the Son of God.

We see in these lives that God does the unexpected, sometimes even the opposite of what's expected. We also see that for those involved it is wonderful, as in 'full of wonder'. Their lives aren't made easier, but are filled with joy and hope.

God does support them with the added difficulties. One way is by being true to past experiences. Mary, Elizabeth & Zachariah can look back at how God has acted before, like we did before the reading, as see the pattern. While I won't go into it today, we can see this in how what is said here reflects those stories. In their lives God is continuing to be consistent with doing the unexpected and impossible and inviting all types of people to join in.

This could be exciting for us because anyone (you, me, the person next door) could be touched by God to be involved in something impossible that will change both our lives, and the world. It could also be a little terrifying - which we're told both Zachariah and Mary felt - though Mary's fear is also mixed with wonder, hence the translation using the word 'perplexed'. Afraid or not, God could invite anyone.

God also invites the formation of community to support each other - the angel tells Mary that Elizabeth is also impossibly pregnant and they support each other in their improbable lives.

Together they can reflect what they see God doing in each other's lives - and the words of the prophet Joel, "your old shall dream dreams, and your young shall see visions." Dreams we hear in Elizabeth's words of blessings and Visions we hear in Mary's song - and later in Zachariah's (after today's passage). They are also both blessed with supportive spouses. We don't know the details, but they are there when they could have left. For us this means the church, Kensington, and other connections.

And God sends the Holy Spirit. Acts is the sequel to Luke and includes the glorious story of Pentecost - when the Holy Spirit comes to the disciples like wind and fire. But this isn't the first time. Chapter one of the Bible talks of the Spirit blowing over the waters. Chapter one of Luke talks about Elizabeth & Mary being filled with the Holy Spirit - who also helps them feel God's love, hope, and presence. What's exciting is that as the story continues we will be reminded that like God's plans, God's Spirit is for everyone. God is present in you, and those around you.

What can this look like now?

I'm reminded of the minister of St. Andrew's Presbyterian in Nanaimo telling about when a young man walked in with questions. It was perplexing that somebody with no background would walk into a quiet Presbyterian church - but it was one he walked past and he followed 'his instinct'. He kept coming, became a Christian, and felt called to bring this to his job as a nightclub DJ.





If you want a quick peek, look up Hannah's song in I Samuel 2

They pondered with prayer and asked practical questions - but also said "yes Lord". St. Andrew's now supports a nightclub church combining floor shaking beats with thoughtful open discussions. None of them saw this coming, but it is building faith and reaching out.<sup>7</sup>

So how does this help us prepare for the Advent of Christ - the coming of the Messiah? Like Mary:

- prepare to be perplexed (and probably worried) though it will help people grow in faith and share God's gifts of love, hope and healing.
- Take time to ponder.
   God's patterns and others are a big help here.
- Probe. Asking questions about details is okay Mary did it.
- And be willing to go along. Tell God "Here I am." Literally do all this, and God knows what will happen.

FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies.

Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Memories: Describe a wedding you really appreciated.

Memories: What has God done in your community (Kensington or otherwise) that is worthy of praise and humble celebration?

Actions: Can you be like Elizabeth and describe for someone else what God is doing in their life (including details of who and what)?

Etching: Mary interprets God's actions through her experience of God. What's your experience of God/Jesus/Spirit? How have you seen/experienced/felt God, and what does this show about God?

Actions: If we are incapable of living God's way without letting God's Spirit in, how can we do that?

Prayer: ...that we will see the wonder-full actions of God bringing love, hope & healing into the world... and that we can say, "Here I am."



I want to mention two places where the Holy Spirit has been at work. One is the Montreal Children's Theatre Community Dinner last night. I don't know how many people were here, but in many rooms there were people enjoying food, entertainment, and each other's company last night. The Children's Theatre isn't a church, but God's Spirit is working there.




