



Listening to God

Children's Time

You want to colour a picture. You look for the markers on the desk, and they're not there. You look on the shelf - not there. They're not under the desk, or chair, or couch, or any other shelves, or in the bedroom, or kitchen ... anywhere.

Your dad is sitting there and asks you what you're looking for. You explain you'd like to do some colouring and can't find the markers. He says you should try looking on the desk.

What would you feel about his suggestions?

What would you expect to find?

Would you do it?

In church we're going to hear a story about Simon Peter. He and his partners have been fishing all night long and didn't find any - and they know where to look for fish. I imagine they are tired because fishing with nets by hand is hard work, and they're probably discouraged. That morning Jesus, who's not a fisherman, suggests they should go try again - perhaps over there.

Do you think they expected to catch anything? I suspect not. They didn't really want to try again, but they did.

Do you know what happened?

They caught some fish - so much that they filled two boats so full they started to sink.

What do you think the point is? I suspect it's that if we do what Jesus says then Jesus can take something we're good at and do so much more than we expect or imagine.

Like fisherman who are ready to give up and go to bed catching so much their boats start sinking.

Prayer:

Dear Jesus, Help us to know what you want us to do, so that we can show how amazing you are.

Prayer for Illumination

Lord, open our hearts and minds through the power of your Holy Spirit, that we may hear your call and faith to follow. Amen.

★ Intro to the readings

Today we're going to start with the psalm. It's an interesting one that starts by acknowledging God as our beginning and home. Then remembers that God's sense of timing is very different from ours - which is particularly hard when we are suffering from our sins. The last part looks forward to God's steadfast love filling our days. I suspect it was selected by the lectionary mostly for the last part, but if you think of how long the Jewish people in Jesus' day had been waiting under occupation for God to save them... the whole psalm might be how Simon and his partners were feeling.

Our main passage continues the story of Luke... but not directly. Last week we heard about Jesus preaching a hard message in his home town that there are no favourites - even suggesting that he can't or won't do anything there because they're not willing to take ownership and participate. After that he went to Capernaum. There he preached. We don't know what about, but they didn't try to kill him. He also met Simon (later called Simon Peter) at the synagogue. Jesus accepted Simon's invite to lunch, and healed his mother... and many others.

This story story is told after that, though it's not to specific.⁵ Three short things before Yuka shares the readings.

A detail to clarify. It is set on the shore of Lake Gennesaret. This is another name for the Sea of Galilee. I can't find a reason why this name is used.

Curiously, in Mark I the events in Capernaum are reversed.

Roman's considered being a fisherman about the lowest form of work. We don't know about Jews, but it was hard physically and to make money.6

and I'd like to encourage you to consider why the people are there. There's a crowd, Jesus, Simon & his partners.

Sermon: Ready for change?

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Before we get into why the people were there, I want to address something that might be nagging at you. (It was at the Bible Study last Wednesday.)

The fish. We don't know what happened to the fish. As the boats were sinking they probably had water in the boat with them. Simon and his partners wouldn't have been able to pull the boats up, even if they'd wanted to, so perhaps the fish jumped out. Perhaps somebody else took them to market. As sad as it may make you, they don't seem to be important in this story. Sorry.

Now, why were the people there? We have the crowd, Jesus, Simon & his partners all hoping to do something. What?

The crowd: Often I think of the crowd gathering to see Jesus because of the miracles. They either want one, or to see the show. However here (and elsewhere) we are told that they "pressed in on him to hear the word of God." They're not looking for some amazing trick, or a quick fix. They want to hear what God is saying. They want to learn. I think a lot of people are like that. We assume something less than noble, but really they just want to learn - to become better.

And it seems that they are getting exactly that. Jesus is teaching them, with some difficulty. People are pushing to get closer. Again we can assume it's to touch the magic Jesus, but that is very much not in the text. They probably just had difficulty hearing, which means Jesus has a problem with why he's in the story. If he's trying to teach everyone the Word of God and they can't hear,

They had to pay to fish on the Emperor's water (Sea of Galilee), and pay for any fish that caught.

then he's not succeeding.

While they didn't have megaphones in this time period, they did know a solution. It's something you've probably noticed if you've spent time by a lake. Sound travels really well across water. Thankfully there are some boats there to help Jesus reach more people with the Word of God.

Jesus climbs into Simon's boat.

but what's Simon doing there to begin with? Despite having heard Jesus at the Synagogue, inviting him round for dinner, and Jesus healing his mother-in-law - Simon wasn't there to hear the Word of God. He was working. It had been a long overnight shift that had been a complete failure. Fishing by hand is hard work, even if the nets are empty. Before they can collapse though they need to attend to the details of the equipment.

Along comes Jesus and asks to teach from his boat. Simon agrees. Perhaps they've become friends or he thinks he owes Jesus something, perhaps he's just hospitable or is curious what Jesus will teach. Being in the boat will give a good opportunity to hear-if he can stay awake.

Like in Capernaum, we don't know what Jesus taught. That's not the point of these stories. Jesus wrapped it up and the crowd presumably went on their way.

Now things move past why people were there.

Jesus still has a problem. More and more people want to hear the Word of God and he can't reach them all. He needs some helpers. People who will listen and try, even if they think they know better. People who can work hard. People like... Simon and his partners. But how to help them move into a deeper role?

They've talked and gotten to know each other. He's helped them out. They've helped him out. Now Jesus invites Simon and I think this is something for us to remember. Jesus does call people suddenly to a big change, but it is often a gradual process involving something we know we can do - but getting us to trust in deeper water.

They knew Jesus, and that he wasn't a fisherman. Still, they go out. What do you think they expected? Considering this was their job, that they had managed to stay in business, and that they had been fishing in the same area all night... they probably expected zero results. Well, it seems God had other ideas. When they did as Jesus asked, despite knowing better, their boats were overflowing with abundance.

This is also something to remember and consider. Jesus came to Simon and his business partners during their work day. He interrupted their work and gave his 2¢. They listened, tried it out against all better judgment, and amazing things happened. Can you think of anything God might be calling us to do that goes against all common sense? What if it worked?



his partners to try something a little deeper - fishing in the deeper water. It's something they know; a good next step in their relationship.

B There are other period references to people addressing crowds from boats.

but back to our story, because Simon's reaction is important.

When Simon realizes what's going on he addresses Jesus not as Master, like earlier, but as Lord, the term used for God. He realizes God is present. There are many possible reactions to God showing up in your boat, or house, or church. Simon doesn't puff up with pride. He knows that before God he is far from worthy. (This is an appropriate response - and common. Most of the prophets say the same thing.) Simon tries to send Jesus away. He might be ashamed, or concerned his sin will contaminate Jesus - or both.

Jesus responds like the angels have done before. "Do not be afraid." This isn't a master who will abandon you when you make a mistake. This is the Lord who will get into the boat with you and lead you to something amazing if you have faith.

And Jesus makes a big ask. He's found some helpers who know how to work hard, and will trust him - even when they know better. He says, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people." This is the mission - to catch people - to get them hooked on God.

And then comes a line that used to disturb me. "they left everything and followed him." What about Zebedee, the father of James and John? What about Peter's wife? What about the fish? ...and even more concerning, what about us?

Two thoughts help me get past this and back to the story. One is that in the TV show *The Chosen* they have Zebedee there as well, and everyone realizes that Jesus must be the Messiah. His response when his sons look at him is something like, 'The man of God we've been waiting hundreds of years for has called you and you're worried about what I'll tell your mother?' For those who recognize Jesus, following him would be an honour.

The other is that catch of fish. If Jesus can fill the boats with fish, surely he can take care of the disciples' families.

Do we have to give up everything to follow Jesus? Maybe. Here Jesus doesn't actually ask them to, it just says they do. I think the willingness is what is looked for - and the faith. If God calls us to do something will we trust God to look after our fears?

Like many passages in the Bible, there can be many lessons. The two I'm hearing this week are that Jesus is looking for people to help share the Word of God. He's looking for disciples. The other is about becoming the disciple. This is an honour worth dropping everything for. It doesn't happen out of the blue (at least not here). It can defy what makes sense. Yet those willing to give it a try anyways can see unexpected, astonishing, results.

To end with a bit of a story. I know of a congregation that was struggling. Lots of things were working against them, including their building. They decided that they needed to sell it, or at least part of it. It was a lot of work practically and emotionally, but finding the buyer was easier than expected. A bit astonishing really. Some people left, but others felt more a part of the community. Since then more has happened, including many unexpected things - and there is growth in ways that are also unexpected, yet fit who they are. They are called: Kensington Presbyterian Church. We can follow in faith to join Simon-Peter and Jesus in sharing the Good News.

Spirit Sightings

This week something interesting happened. People in North America, and probably around the world, talked about a sermon. The same sermon. One given by the Rt. Rev. Mariann Budde at the interfaith prayer service closing the U.S. Presidential inauguration festivities.

Among other aspects of the message, she made specific appeals to President Trump to have mercy and compassion on people who need help - especially those his policies are already impacting (LGBTQ+ and refugees). She has received criticism and support for her words. Apparently some people who had given up on Christianity are now reconsidering it. She is trying to redirect the attention to those in trouble, not give too much attention to the comments, and to move on to her next role - organizing a racial justice conference. She made the point in an interview that being a Christian isn't just about one sermon, "We just need to continue to believe what we believe in and stand for the things we stand for — and that's the work, right?"

Georgina Musah became physically impaired due to polio at age five. She was stigmatized due to her disability and prevented from attending school in her community of Suamvuus in northern Ghana. Identified in a community survey by the PWS&D-supported Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) Program, Georgina received physiotherapy and a tricycle for mobility. Georgina also took part in



training in climate-resilient farming and dressmaking, enabling her to generate an income and improve her life. "My profound gratitude to the CBR and PWS&D for changing my life through well-structured interventions. I have enough from my livelihood activities to fend for myself and my children and to support my husband. God bless and sustain your work," she shares.
