Listening to God

The next section we focus on listening to God through Bible stories and trying to understand them. We're going to break today's story into three (well, five) sections. But first, let's pray for God's Spirit to help us focus.

rayer for Illumination

Lord, open our hearts and minds through the power of your Holy Spirit, that we will become more like you.

Amen.

- Message & Readings

We've been going through the book of Luke. Last week was a bit of a flashback to when Jesus was tested over scripture in the wilderness. Before that we'd reached Jesus going up the mountain to pray and being encouraged by Moses, Elijah and God - and then helping his disciples who still couldn't do what he asked.

After that Jesus told them he was going to be betrayed. Then the disciples argued which of them was the greatest... and Jesus told them to be like a child.

Then one of the disciples complained about somebody who was helping people in the name of Jesus, but not one of the disciples. Jesus told them that "whoever is not against you is for you."

And then we have the first of today's stories. In it you'll hear that Jesus and his students are going to Jerusalem. The shortest way is to cut through an area called Samaria - but it's still too far to walk in a day. They need a place to stay. Listen for what happens. How would you feel if you were one of them?

<u>Luke 9</u>: 51-56

^{9:51} When the days drew near for him to be taken up, he set his face to go to Jerusalem. ⁵² And he sent messengers ahead of him. On their way they entered a village of the Samaritans to make arrangements for his arrival. ⁵³ But when the Samaritans learned that his destination was Jerusalem, they refused hospitality. ⁵⁴ When his disciples James and John saw this, they said, "Lord, do you want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?" ⁵⁵ But he turned and rebuked them. ⁵⁶ Then they went on to another village.

Did Jesus and his students get a place to stay?

Probably, but not in this story.

How would you feel if you needed a place to stay and were told to go away?

...bad, sad, angry, frustrated, hurt, ...

Imagine you had great power, like The Hulk or Thor. What would you do?

...smash and destroy. hurt those that hurt you.

That's like James & John,

BUT what did Iesus do?

tell the disciples that was bad and walk away (with them)

and this reaction makes sense. Jesus has been teaching people to "love your enemies" and "do good to those who hate you". Jesus uses his powers to heal people and never to hurt them.

This is hard, especially when we are hurt.

Hitting back might make us feel better, but it just keeps the hurt going. Jesus wants to stop the hurt. In this case he goes somewhere else.

We're going to skip ahead a little more to another section that mentions Samaria. In between Iesus sends out 70 disciples to help and teach people - and not to take anything with them. They came back amazed that it had worked beyond their imagination and they had been a part of it. ⁴ Then we have the next story. I'm going to break it into three.

For the adults, remember last week's story where Jesus was tested by Satan, who used Bible passages to try and trick Jesus

into focusing first on himself and not God. Think about that when you hear the opening of this story.

For everyone, what is the person asking Jesus? What's he concerned about?



Reading:.....<u>Luke 10</u>: 25-28

10:25 An expert in God's law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" ²⁶ Iesus said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" ²⁷ He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbour as yourself." ²⁸ And Jesus said to him, "Good answer! Do this, and you will live."

What does the expert in God ask Jesus?

...how he can have eternal life.

What's he concerned about?

himself and his future

Did Jesus like his answer?

So, that should be the end of that.

In the next section Jesus tells a story. It's helpful to know a few things first.

- Jerusalem is up. If you have to walk up hills to go to Jerusalem, which way to walk when you leave? ...down
- If you see somebody who is hurt, do you want to help them? Maybe see if they are okay or get a teacher?

The same was try back then - perhaps stronger. It was expected that you'd stop everything and help the person first - even if you had plans.

I'm reminded of my first paper on a Bible passage in Seminary where we weren't allowed to use anything except what we already knew... and we discovered we knew enough to be on the right track.

- There were three groups of Jews: Priests, Levites, and Israelites. Everyone knew it. It's like people being able to finish these three: God the Father, Son and ____ (Holy Ghost).
- Samaritans and Jews did not get along. We kinda saw this in the last story. They each had their own ways of worshipping God, and they thought the others were wrong. They would call them heretics. Sometimes they just ignored each other, sometimes there were insults, and sometimes they acted like enemies and attacked each other.

Reading:.....<u>Luke 10</u>: 26-35

²⁹ But the man, wanting to justify himself, continued, "And who is my neighbour?" ³⁰ Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and took off, leaving him half dead. ³¹ Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. ³² So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. ³³ But when a traveling Samaritan came upon him, and when he saw him he was moved with compassion. ³⁴ The Samaritan went to him and provided first aid, disinfecting and bandaging his wounds. Then he put

him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. ³⁵ The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him, and when I come back I will repay you whatever more you spend.'

If you imagined yourself as the person who was beat up, what would you feel when the priest was coming? Hope? Everyone listening to Iesus would expect the priest to help... and be shocked when they looked the other way and kept walking.⁵ The same with the next person.

And the third! Not an Israelite, but a Samaritan! The person would probably have been afraid that now he'll be killed - except there's another shocking twist. Help is given.

It brings up the question of who we do not want to associate with. Who do we not look to for help?

Last Friday's mental health series focused on the importance of companionship. One aspect is being a neighbour.⁶


What does it mean to be a neighbour? (being friendly, watching over people who live near you, ...) The series pushes the idea of being neighbours to include looking for what you have in common and acknowledging it. This isn't passively waiting for something to happen, being actively looking. It's also not focusing on your

the others are: hospitality, respecting different perspectives, attentive listening, and accompanying

differences. How actively do you engage your neighbour? ...and who is your neighbour?

That was the expert's second question, but before we get to Jesus wrapping up the answer, what was the first question the person asked? (how to have eternal life) Let's listen to how Jesus finishes their meeting.

Reading: <u>Luke 10</u>: 36-37

³⁶ Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" ³⁷ He said. "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

Jesus takes his question that was all about himself and turns the conversation around so that now it is about others - even those you don't like or want to help.

We have one more story. It's often told separately, but it is good to hear it after a story where Jesus encourages people to help others - to serve them.

What's the problem here?

Reading: <u>Luke 10</u>: 38-42

³⁸ Now as they went on their way, he entered a certain village where a woman named Martha welcomed him. ³⁹ She had a sister named Mary, who sat at Jesus's feet and listened to what he was saying. ⁴⁰ But Martha was distracted by her many tasks, so she came to him and asked, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself? Tell her, then, to help me." ⁴¹ But the Lord answered her, "Martha, dear Martha, you are worried and distracted by many things, ⁴² Only a few things are really needed, perhaps only one. Mary has chosen the better part, which will not be taken away from her."



What's the problem here?

...Mary not helping.

Martha too much to do; distracted

But we just heard Jesus tell people to help out - which is what Martha is doing. She is trying to be a good host and look after everyone - especially somebody as important as Jesus.

Remember the problem with the Samaritan village - they thought Jesus wasn't their Messiah because he was focused on Jerusalem. They were focused on themselves and Jesus moved on. Then James and John to satisfy their hurt by hurting others, and Jesus said that was bad. Then the expert asks Jesus how he could have eternal life, to have his focus turned from himself to helping others. All of them are focused on themselves and not on others or on what God is doing.

"Martha is distracted by her many tasks." She is focused on

everything she has to do. She's not considering what Jesus needs from her. Sometimes that is helping others... and sometimes it is just listening - just being attentive.

Both doing and listening are important, but I think the big point is where your focus is. What's your motivation? Is it you or Jesus?

To God be all the Glory Amen.

Responding to God

In the last section of our worship time we focus on responding to God with singing, praying - and going out to share our experiences.

FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies.

Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Wonder: What are modern parallels for the Good Samaritan?⁷

Memories: Can you share an occasion, yours or someone else's, where hurt was not responded to by hurting?

(and share it)

Wonder: What does it look like to listen to Jesus? to focus on Jesus?

A particularly timely version, though distant from Montréal, would be an Israeli soldier hurt in the West Bank. The group captain walks by, some Israeli settlers, and then a Hamas soldier - who helps and brings him to a hospital that uses precious resources to heal. Perhaps in Montréal it would involve an 'upstanding citizen' being helped by a homeless person with mental illness and drug addiction (which reminds me a little of the movie *The Fisher King* with Robin Williams)

Values: What distracts you from focusing on Jesus?

Actions: How could you live more directed to Jesus - this

week?

Visions: Considering how Jesus answers everybody in a

different way than they expect... how can we (you) prepare ourselves for Jesus answering us? Where will we look? How will we notice? How radical

might it be?

Prayer: ...that we will be able to place God first and not

ourselves.

her young children and repay the debt and interest. Things got a little easier when her children turned 18, emigrated to the United States and sent money. She also received support from Fraternidad de Presbiteriales Mayas, PWS&D's local partner. She was trained in managing her cornfields, family gardens, backyard animals, and in topics related to healthy and nutritional diets.

Monday, March 24 We give thanks for the gifts and time that members of the Assembly Council offer, especially over these next few days as they meet at Crieff Hills.


Tuesday, March 25 We pray for interfaith movements and initiatives, from communal meals in our local places of worship to significant acts of diplomacy on the global stage.


