

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Listening to God

Children's Time

There's a story in the Bible about somebody who's a bit like a child, and not at all. He's got an important job with people working for him - and if somebody makes a mistake he has to pay for it. But he also reminds us of a child. Partially because he's short, but also that he runs around and climbs trees. His name is Zacchaeus - and we've got a special song about him.

Let's sing it and then we'll pray.



We're skipping ahead a little from last week's passage in Luke. Some of what we're missing include:

- Iesus saying that "things that cause people to sin are bound to come"
- 10 lepers are healed and do what they are supposed to, except one who comes back to thank Jesus.
- Jesus tells them that the Kingdom of God is within you (a recurring theme)
- there's a story about a pharisee and a tax collector praying at the temple. The Pharisee is thankful that he's so much better than the tax-collector. The tax-collector is humble being honest about his flaws with God and asking God for mercy.
- then is the story about humility with Jesus telling the disciples to let the little children come and we have to receive the kingdom of God like a child
- and just before today's reading another Rich Man asks Iesus about how to inherit eternal life. This time the answer refers to the 10 commandments - but he does that. So Jesus challenges him to place his trust entirely in Godgiving everything away and following him. He doesn't.

Before Stewart reads the passage I just want us to remember two stories from earlier in Luke, and give you two things to listen for.

We've heard a story about being on the road to Jericho - what was it? (Good Samaritan)

Luke had just told the story about children - what are children like? (short, playful (climbing trees), some of them are always in a hurry)

As characters come into what Stewart reads, consider how what the original people and listeners would have thought of them.

And there will be a small grammar change in a familiar story that changes it - can you find it?

Sermon: Assumptions

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts.³ Amen.

I expect you fall into two categories, either these stories are familiar to you, or you don't know much about the society. These stories would have been entertaining to the original listeners, and shocking for those originally experiencing them. They challenge the normal assumptions and expectations.

Let's start with an easier one. There's been at least three. stories so far about rich people in Luke. There was the man who had the huge harvest that he figured was all for him, but before he could even fill his new barns he died. There's the Rich Man who asked about eternal life and was refocused on showing mercy now. Then there was the story just before our reading about the Rich Ruler who also asked about eternal life and was told to give everything away and focus on God. None of them were able to accept what Jesus taught.

We can assume rich people won't follow Jesus. But here we have a rich tax-collector who hurries around to see Jesus, welcomes him, and experiences salvation.

What's going on? Traditionally when Jesus invites himself over

and Zacchaeus changes his life for the better - which is the sign that "salvation has come to this house." However the story is a little different. I learned this week that the Greek verb is about what he is already doing. "I give to the poor... I pay back four times as much." It seems that those who were blocking Zacchaeus and grumbling that Jesus would visit a sinner were wrong. Zacchaeus was giving back more than the tithe of 10%, and following the rules if somebody was cheated. Jesus provided him a very public opportunity to explain himself - and "salvation has come to this house." In this reading salvation isn't through Zacchaeus' change of heart, but that of the crowd. They, presumably, understand he is a good part of the community and now include him. The crowd's assumptions are seen as wrong and healing comes.

Another common assumption is, understandably, that somebody blind can't see. However there are differences in seeing - both physically and in bigger ways. In today's story the Blind Man sees that Jesus is the "Son of David" - implying that he should be the king. He shouts this out. Those in the front of the "crowd going by" told him to be quiet. Why? I can think of two reasons.

They might have been offended by his technique. He shouts out. When he's told to stop, he keeps making a fuss. Hasn't Jesus told several stories about being humble? What's going on? Simple. Humility is about not putting yourself above people and looking down on them; it's not about putting yourself down. I know many people who suffer in silence because they don't want to be a bother. I think an unhealthy assumption of humility is part of the issue - and here's a story that reminds us to be like little children when we need something.

The other reason is fear and misunderstanding. At this time Rome decided who would be king. If they heard that somebody else was gathering people and claiming to be king they weren't very subtle about squashing rebellions. Those in the crowd were afraid... and they didn't understand the journey Jesus was leading them on. Which is a bit odd as they were probably disciples - though perhaps the apostles (there's a distinction in Luke) hadn't told them Jesus' confusing words about how when they got to Jerusalem he'd be tormented, killed, and rise again on the third day. We are told that the apostles couldn't wrap their minds around this (despite being told three times). I imagine Jesus hoped they would understand that him coming as the King would mean there would be retaliation - and not to be afraid.

Which leads into a bigger set of assumptions. What sort of King was Jesus? What would "thy kingdom come" be like?

Well, Jesus is somebody who will stop and listen to those others grumble about or push to the margins. He cares for all God's children and will listen to those with something to say whether the positive examples from this week or the negative ones from earlier. He doesn't jump to conclusions that all rich people are bad, or what the Blind Man might need. Jesus knows he'll be attacked and is planning to let it happen - or rather, he's not planning on fighting back. It's not because he's afraid. He could easily walk the other direction or take a break and let things cool down. He goes through with it because this is the plan, because he loves them and knows that the cycle of sin won't stop until someone stops. This is humility. He is not putting himself above others, and he isn't denying his need to reconnect people with God.

While not a part of this story, I suspect there's also the still the mistaken assumption that God's coming kingdom will be geographical - a territory like the kingdoms they know. Despite

Jesus telling them back in chapter 17 that it is within them.

Today's stories played with people's assumptions.

- that Jesus' special students understand... no
- that people who appear to have less abilities are worth less attention... except the Blind Man saw what they didn't
- that people you know are bad... may not be
- that acting childish and shouting out or climbing trees is degrading... Jesus respects them
- that humility isn't the same as self-denial
- and that God's kingdom will be brought through force or resistance but is about bringing people together

Since people close to Jesus had to check their assumptions, we should take some time to check ours - and Lent is a good time to do this. Also, if you try and don't feel you know it all... you're doing as good as the apostles.

To God be all the glory Amen.

Responding to God

Friday's film will take an interesting look at this: Babylon 5: Passing Through Gethsemane

FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies. Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Wonder: What is something you don't understand that you would like to ask of Jesus?

Visions: How would you describe what sort of King God is?
What would it be like to live under that reign?
...and what does it mean that the Kingdom of God is within us?

Values: Who do you prioritize?
Who gets your back up?
Who do you turn away from?

Actions: Continue to reach out to your neighbours starting with easy connections (like "Bonjour Hi") and progressing through the weather to how was their week and onto hopes for the future. As trust is built you can ask their insight into things... and you may find they see like the Blind Man and Zacchaeus.

Prayer: ...that we will follow Jesus, even when we don't see clearly

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
