Call to worship²

Gracious host and servant Lord, Jesus washes his disciples' feet then shares a last supper, sign of the new community in him. We behold him: a king holding no political office,

Listening to God



Intro to the readings

Last Sunday we celebrated Jesus' entry into Jerusalem with an exciting parade, and heard how Jesus wept because he knew that Jerusalem would not learn the ways for peace. They would not recognize God in their midst. Over the next few days Jesus would challenge the leaders, and be challenged in return. They'd debate paying taxes, life after death, and what it means to be ready. He would again predict the destruction of the Temple.³ When the chief priests and scribes were looking for a way to have Jesus

killed they were joined by one of Jesus' disciples, Judas. Our story picks up after their arrangement.

This year as we journey through the day Jesus died, from the last supper to the cross, I invite you to not just imagine yourself in the story, but to imagine how we are still living this story.

Passover

Reading: Luke 22: 7-8, 14-15, 19-27

☀Meditation

Jesus gathered them around an annual celebration. One that helped define who they were. Those who were oppressed and led to freedom by God.

It was a familiar celebration. In it Jesus takes the normal and gives it special meaning - inviting them, and us, to remember God's saving actions in the normal parts of our lives - whenever we eat humble food or lift a cup.

Jesus invites them all - even the one who will betray him. He knows, and still keeps the relationship going.

But who is it?
Who isn't it?

We don't know Judas' motives, but we see familiar motives in the rest. The way they turn from Jesus to themselves. They way we want to be appreciated, well thought of, important... and fail to remember Jesus and the ways he teaches.

*Meditation

Before the last set of trials that would lead to his rejection and death, Jesus prayed. In other gospels we hear about Jesus asking his closest friends to come with him; to support him. They fail, as we fail, to stay focused on Jesus - to stay focused.

...and so the time of trial comes.

Jesus, lamb of God,

We admit we can't stay focused on you and your needs. It is so

hard to sit with you without letting our own needs overpower us - driving us "into the time of trial."

betrayals

Reading: Luke 22: 47-57

Meditation Betravals.

They can come in so many ways.

An obvious one is not respecting what the other wants. Jesus taught to love your enemy and forgive. Instead his students respond to their feelings of fear and pain by inflicting pain and fear. They lash out. We understand this. We've felt it. We've done it. But what did Jesus do?

The opposite of betrayal is love - but they can become so mixed up. Love can look like a kiss: welcoming; accepting. But this can also be used to force someone into harmful situations - a Judas kiss. Manipulation isn't love; its betrayal.

Then there's the chief priests who try to control the relationship. They had lots of opportunities to meet Jesus, but they wanted it on their terms. They want their desires and hopes to control the interaction - the relationship. How open are you to Jesus? Do you put limits on what God can do?

And then there's denial. Peter denies knowing Jesus. We don't know if the servant-girl noticed Peter out of curiosity or accusation. We do know that Peter denied knowing Jesus. When you are with people who wonder about values or hope or God-do you mention God, or deny Jesus?

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Prayer

Dear God,

we are thankful that your steadfast love endures forever, because we don't.

We can use feelings to manipulate people, we try and control situations to feel safe, and when we don't feel safe we can last out or hide - and we do all this with you too.

Denying you in action ... and inaction.

Like those in these passages, we are also betraying you. Amen.

Going Along

Bible Reading: Luke 22: 66-71; 23:1, 14-25



Meditation

Jesus goes along with what people are saying. "You say that I am." It's like he knows that nothing he says will change their minds. We know people like that. We've probably been people like that. Fixed in our ways. Not listening to radical, impossible, or just challenging ideas that would upset our balanced life.

We also recognize we can be like Pilate. We know what is right, but go along with the crowds - letting society do things that are bad for the environment... for people... (especially identifiable minorities, refugees, low income, ...) ... instead of showing leadership for what is right.


Bible reading: Luke 23: 26-38

If you've put down your stone, please take it up again.

. . .

Stones are what some people wanted to throw at Jesus during his life.

Stones are what would have cried out when Jesus came to Jerusalem - if the disciples had not raised their voices.

Stones are also what surrounded him in the tomb and through them he pushed his way back into life on the third day.

As we remember our Lord's death and see how he was crucified by the action or the apathy of people like ourselves.

Let us remember that it was for our sins that he died.

Let us remember the things in our life which are wrong; those which burden us,

threaten each other and offend God.

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


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My Song Is Love Unknown

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
