Listening to God

Children's Time

In today's Bible story we're going to hear about people celebrating Jesus - what he does and teaches. Let's brainstorm things about Jesus. . .

For example:

- stories of his birth that included the poor and angels
- that when Jesus taught he had more confidence and authority than anyone else. You knew they were true.
 - and the parables that kept teaching the more you thought about them
- that he included people nobody would have expected, like people without important jobs (fishermen), people others hated (tax collectors), enemies (Romans), and those considered less important (women & children).

- Jesus showed that God thought healthy bodies and relationships were more important than rules
- he did amazing things
 - o feeding thousand of people with a lunch and a prayer
 - helping people who couldn't walk to dance again
 - giving sight to the blind
 - even raising people from the dead

Before Mike reads the first part of today's reading, let's just remember that in Luke Jesus has been working his way up to Jerusalem for a while, and he's not been welcomed by everyone. Today he arrives.

Before the reading, let's say a prayer.

The passage talks about people celebrating what Jesus had done - and that hasn't stopped. People still talk about how God brings healing into their lives - sometimes physically, or mentally, or with other people, or helping them to accept their limits and gifts. People still talk about what Jesus taught and how these lessons help us live better lives now.

So we're also going to have a little parade and sing praise to God. We're not going to have enough palms for everyone, but could you help me pass them out.

Good. Now we're going to sing and parade along the window side, then down the middle, then up the other side, and back to the front where we'll have a little prayer. I'd like to invite everyone who would be comfortable walking to join us.


☀ Intro to the readings

🌞 Sermon: Ways of Peace

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Last week we heard about Jesus approaching Jericho and a Blind man calling out "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" This was a political statement that could lead to Roman soldiers stomping in to extinguish a potential rebellion. The disciples told him to be quiet. Then Jesus granted his request - confirming the

title he was given. Now the disciples are calling out for the world to hear "To God be the glory, great things he has done!" Things are changing, though the danger is still there.

Some Pharisees who are concerned about what's being shouted. It could be they objected to what the disciples were saying, or that they were concerned for Jesus' safety. This gospel has been careful to mention both those who support and oppose Jesus.

In one of the chapters we skipped after Jesus met with Elijah, Moses & God, some Pharisees warn Jesus about going to Jerusalem. Jesus says that he must go, and then laments, "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing!" He loves them; cares for them; wants the best for them... but they are not willing.

As Jerusalem finally comes into view, Jesus weeps. He sees the proud walls with the Temple rising behind them. He sees all the people going through the gates. He sees the history of this city-the city David made his capital when he brought peace to the 12 tribes. He sees and remembers its people becoming self-centred and killing the messengers from God.

Today he laments, "If you, even you, had only recognized on this day the things that make for peace!" He then goes on to say that "they are hidden from your eyes" and describes the destruction of Jerusalem - "all because you did not recognize the time of your visitation from God."

There's a lot here.

One is to beware of saying the destruction and wars are because God does it or wants it. That is not what's happening.

This is more like a doctor telling you that you are allergic to chocolate, but you eat it anyway. It's not the doctor's fault that you feel terrible afterwards - you just didn't pay attention to the healthy ways to live.

But what about the line that it was hidden from their eyes? How can they know better? It's open to interpretation who is doing the hiding. It could have been God ...but that doesn't feel like how a loving and merciful God works. It could also be that it was hidden by the priorities they had built up in their lives - both individually and as a society. I can easily imagine this.

Can you imagine a society that prioritizes convenience at the expense of the environment? I've heard very little talk about the environment. There's been important talk about inflation and the cost of housing and food. With the trade war there's been talk of jobs. These are all important, but can we afford to let work towards the environment slide? This week mayors from across the country wrote a letter to the federal candidates trying to turn our eyes to this issue - to stop it from being hidden by other issues. In Jesus day there were lots of concerns about poverty and the related issues. Then the issues about how to balance their culture with the Roman one. It's not easy. Could these issues have buried the way for peace that Jesus showed?

The line about peace is what stood out for me. Jesus weeping because they did not recognize "the things that made for peace." As we look around it's easy to see that we still don't see how to live in peace.

If they don't know peace because they don't recognize the ways of peace? How can we know them?

If Jesus came to bring peace, what did he do and teach? What were priorities for Jesus? Healing was one - physically, mentally, spiritually, and with the community (socially). He fed people with food and teachings. Once he started towards Jerusalem he encouraged the disciples to share what they had experienced - not as an elite, but by humbly joining the community. He modelled being with the people, not sitting on his high horse. Both of the rich



people who asked about inheriting eternal life answer well. One referred to the Ten Commandments, the other saying, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbour as yourself." And there are several times when Jesus pushes this love beyond your family and neighbour to include those who don't like - or even hate.

What can we do? What can you do?

We practice living out the issues that Jesus focused on: healthy bodies, minds, souls and communities that support everyone. Despite the temptations, eat healthy. Exercise. Stretch your minds - perhaps with podcasts or documentaries. Nourish your soul with prayer, or the arts, or a nice walk. Connect with your family, friends and neighbours in ways that lead to meaningful conversations. Stretch your community by looking for those in

the margins - in the Bible they are not only valued, but have keen insight.

We can also advocate for these issues - helping our society to love as God does. Ask questions about the health care system, or housing, or food poverty, or refugees, or racial profiling, or freedom of religion. Listen to the answers. Write letters.

At the Bible study another part of the story was bought out. That one person doing one small thing can be important for moving God's plan forward. The owner of the colt let them borrow it. We don't know why. We have no reason to think this person played any other role in the story. They did one thing, that allowed Jesus to ride and make a statement against common ideas of power and authority. You may not be able to do much, but it can still have a big impact on somebody's life. If you're blessed, you'll see the fruit.

We can be like the disciples. They don't always get it right, but they try. Can we have the courage, or faith, to join them in praising God for the experiences we have seen? I won't suggest walking down Sherbrooke shouting it out, but perhaps we can share our joys with those outside the church - those God brings alongside our journey.

Wonder: Thinking of Jesus as he accepts the cross, what would the world be like if we didn't respond to pain by inflicting pain? How could we encourage this pattern to change? (governments? industry? media? personally?)

Actions: If we think of loving God and neighbour as the ways of peace, and that love includes physical, mental, spiritual & community... and you.

What can you do this week that will improve your way of living?

What can you do this week to start something for somebody else?

Prayer: ...that the world will see and accept your ways for peace.

If we think that God's way for peace in the world includes physical and mental health, then people who are trying to bring that to others are signs of God's Spirit at work. I heard two examples this week that combine tragedy and signs of the Spirit. It might make us uncomfortable, but we know that God will not turn away from tragedy.

One is local. Two years ago a man experiencing a psychosis drove a bus into a daycare, tragically killing and injuring several children. This week it was in the news that some parents who witnessed the event received lifetime psychiatric support, but that their children who witnessed from inside the care didn't receive any support. They were advocating that all those suffering from

the events receive the support they need to heal from this trauma.

The second is the killing of 15 emergency workers in Gaza on March 23rd. Yesterday I heard an interview with an Australian doctor who had worked with several of them. She talked about how selfless they were. That they knew they might get killed, but they would go out anyway because people were hurt and needed help.⁹

I don't know that any of these people are Christian, but they are trying to bring the ways of peace into their situations. This is God at work.



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

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An Inspiration for Change

In the quiet village of Chigwere in northern Malawi, 18-year-old Agnes Bambi found a sense of belonging and purpose as a member of the in-school youth club.



Supervised by two knowledgeable volunteer leaders trained by the project of the Livingstonia Synod AIDS Project, the youth club became a platform for empowerment and education. Working with both boys and girls, the club challenges social norms that favour men and boys and addresses the systemic marginalization of women and girls, which are especially challenging around issues of sexual and reproductive health.

Through the youth club, Agnes discovered the importance of staying in school and actively engaged in discussions about sexual reproductive health.

Equipped with knowledge, she took it upon herself to become an agent of change in her community, teaching her friends about the critical aspects of staying in school and making informed decisions for their futures.

This Lenten season, faithfully respond to Christ's call to ensure youth are empowered with the knowledge they need to make informed choices.

Dhane BK, now in his senior years, lives with his close-knit family in Nepal. Seven years ago, Dhane completed treatment for leprosy, marking a significant milestone in his journey to overcome the disease. However, his struggle did not end there. Recently, he faced a new challenge when he developed a skin ulcer. Recognizing the severity of the situation, he was admitted for specialized care to the Shining Hospital, supported by PWS&D. His treatment regimen included daily ulcer dressings



and comprehensive education on self-care practices. He learned the importance of inspecting, cleansing, protecting and caring for the ulcer—practices that promote healing and empower him to take an active role in his recovery. Today, Dhane continues to improve, with the ulcer showing significant signs of healing.
