Listening to God

Children's Time

God is pretty hard to imagine, but people are always trying. It's part of getting to know God - imagining ways to describe God.

God is strong... like a lion

& solid/dependable... like a rock

& invisible... like wind

& gentle (& life)... like breath

& helpful... like a servant

but also has authority... like a king

& loves us... like a mother and father

And the Bible has many more images/words to describe God:

ex. eagle, lamb, dove, fortress, Alpha & Omega, Word (verb), bread, water, Shepherd, light,

There may be some you like more than others, that's okay. It's also good to remember the others - because they also help us recognize God.



Prayer:

Dear Jesus, help us to remember what you're like, and keep learning about you.

Amen.

Prayer for Illumination

Lord, open our hearts and minds

through the power of your Holy Spirit,

that we may know you more and more.

Sermon: Our Father/Mother/Rock/Breath
Today's readings will come throughout the sermon.

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Trying to define the divine is a good thing. It's impossible, but coming up with ways to relate to God helps us to know God - and this is good. Having all these images listed, and more, helps us to both see aspects of God and to feel a connection. We'll spend more time with that in a bit.

First I want to touch on some of the negative aspects of using images to try and describe God.

A basic one we've already covered: that of not considering what the image represents, such as saying Jesus is the Good Shepherd and leaving it at that. I suspect that many of us find the shepherd image of Jesus comforting because it brings back warm feelings from Sunday School, calm/reassuring art, and Psalm 23. This is good and shows the power of images, but we should also think about what the image means (like we did with the children). Let's finish of the list by matching characteristics with the images:

ex. eagle: powerful,

lamb: will suffer for us (sacrificial lamb,

dove: free, pure

fortress: solid protection,

breath: gentle and life giving, Alpha & Omega: always there)

Word: active (verb more accurate),

bread: nourishment),

water: life giving, powerful, hard to hold,

shepherd: protection and care

light: revealing - a path for life, and for self improvement,

. . .

This is neither an exclusive list of images, nor of their meanings, but it's a good start.

So, one danger is not thinking through the metaphor. Another is getting the metaphor backwards. We can think of God as like a shepherd rather than a shepherd as being like God. This is seen

more often when talking about God as 'Our Father'. It is easy to think of God as being like our father. For some of us that is a blessing, but for others their father was the source of hurt. Speaking as a father, none are perfect. It is important to remember that God isn't like our fathers, but that our fathers, at their best, are like God. At their best, our fathers help us see what God is like.

The father image is one that resonated with people through the centuries, reinforced by the Lord's Prayer starting with "Our Father." This is good, but has been limiting. When any metaphor or title for God becomes an unthinking norm then it both loses its power and denies us insight from the other images - such as female images of God. This fixation on one image for God is the last danger I want to highlight.

Thankfully God doesn't like to be put in a box. Sometimes a comment from a friend helps you connect with another image. Sometimes there are larger movements. Feminism has helped the male dominated world recognize that there are wonderful female role models in the Bible beyond Mary - and helped us notice the female images of God in the Bible.⁴


Laura is going to share some of them with us one at a time, giving us space to reflect on the image.

Reading: Please look up the passages in your own Bible,⁵ or click on the name to be taken to an online version. Genesis 1: 26-27

This isn't the Adam & Eve story of creation - though even that isn't as male dominated as it has been used. In this creation story, placed first, God creates humans in the divine image, "male and female he created them."

Two important parts of this is for you to know that you are part of the image of God. You are important, and not alone. It takes everyone to make the image of God.

Sadly, throughout history, and still today, some people consider themselves more important and others less so. Gender has often been a dividing line. Thankfully this has improved here, though still needs work.



Our next reading is from Psalm 22. This is the psalm that starts, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" that Jesus quotes on the cross (in Mark & Matthew). Over 31 verses it moves through various feelings, and includes an image of God that is typically female.

Reading: <u>Psalm 22</u>: 9-11

Life has ups and downs, and that is in Psalm 22 - as is a celebration of good news to be passed down to the generations.

⁶ The word for 'rib' that is used to form Eve can also be translated as 'side', suggesting that Adam was divided in half. While both halves are not the same, together they make the whole. Neither need be dominant; both are important/necessary.

What about the part we started with?

God being there at your birth.

Cradling you when you left the womb.

Settling you at your mother's breasts.

God as the midwife who delivered you.

What does this present to us about God?

One that can be tender, but also capable of dealing with unexpected and dangerous situations.

One that was with you in the beginning when it was dark, and helped you into the light.

One that doesn't need to be the star of the show, but serves to enable others.

Our next reading comes through the prophet Isaiah.

Reading: <u>Isaiah 49</u>: 15-18a




Mary Nursing - Barbara Februar

I've never nursed a child with my body, but I remember holding my newborns. There is much from those years that is

fogged by sleep deprivation, but the feel of cradling them in my arms is still with me. I imagine this is more so for those who give birth and can nurture their children.

This image compares God not to a father, but to the mother. And God's attachment to us is even stronger. As unlikely as a mother can forget their child whom they nurtured, God will not forget us. You are not forgotten.

Our second last reading comes through the prophet Hosea. It refers to Ephraim. Rather than meaning a specific person or tribe, in this case Ephraim means all of Israel.



God as the one who lifts them affectionately his cheek. Who bends down to feed them (yes, that is a reference to breastfeeding⁷). One who helps them take their first steps; encouraging, and picking them up when they fall. Nowadays this is done by either, or both, parents. In biblical



times it was most likely to have been done by the mother.8

This reminds us that God is with us, teaching us the basics of how to move on our journey. But it is more than teaching us to walk though. Have you ever been a part teaching somebody to walk? picking them up when they fall? lifting them to your cheek? These aren't just facts. There are strong emotional connections born in these times. Have you imagined God with those feelings about us? about you? . . .

as an aside, the term 'El Shaddai' (ex. Genesis 35:11) is often translated as 'God Almighty', but Shaddai can mean 'breasts' - so El Shaddai can mean God with breasts.

Without a time machine we can't check, but this would be consistent with what we do know and similar cultures.

Our last reading is a metaphor that shows up repeatedly throughout the Bible, but I've chosen one from Luke. It's from a chapter we missed in our recent Luke series, but the context is that Jesus has just been warned by some Pharisees that it's not safe for him to continue to Jerusalem. He explains that he knows, but must continue to reveal God.

Reading: Luke 13: 34

The image of the hen gathering the chicks under her wings. The Lord shelters us, but this isn't the image of a fortress. This is a mother and her children. Think of those chicks. Imagine what it would feel like to be one of them. . . because you are.

There are many images to help us understand God. None of them are complete, but they can offer glimpses for the mind and connections for our emotions. So please reflect on them, taste them, imagine with them. And today, Mother's Day, I encourage you to feel those aspects of our Lord God, creator of the universe, and mother to each of us.

FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies.

Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).

Values: What is your favourite image/description of God? Can you describe why?

Memories: What is a way(s) that your mother revealed some God-like characteristics?

Visions: Brainstorm a list of words that describe God and new metaphors. For example: strong like a truck (alternate for lion), or invisible & powerful like gravity (alternate for wind).

Prayer: ...that we can make time to actively have Sabbath rest.



One of the ways that the Spirit is working is through opening doors. 
As sons and daughters of our mothers, we pray for them.

MISSION MOMENT

Sunday, May 11

"I could not get medical help in time because we did not have enough money," says 65-year-old Ruqaiya, who lives in Afghanistan. Ruqaiya's life took a challenging turn ten years ago when she fell on ice, resulting in partial paralysis. Despite



her impairment, she helps care for her youngest son, who has a hand impairment, two daughters-in-law, and two young grandchildren while her two oldest sons work as porters in Kabul, struggling to earn enough. Before her injury, Ruqaiya was known for her skill in weaving and was able to earn a decent income. Now unable to weave, she faces significant financial hardship, made worse by the political and economic situation in the country. Relief came when Ruqaiya received cash assistance through a PWS&D-supported project. She purchased essentials like oil, pulses, flour, rice and salt, meeting her family's food needs during the harsh winter.


Wednesday, May 14 We pray for the Board of Governors who willingly volunteer their time to give leadership and support in the successful administration of The Presbyterian College, Montreal.


Thursday, May 15 We pray for congregations in discernment about their future, and for ministers who are leading and guiding them in the discernment process.




