Listening to God



For our call to worship we've been singing words the Paul wrote to the Christians in Philippi. "Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say rejoice!"

Can you be happy all the time? [no!]

So what is Paul saying?

It's important to remember the whole phrase. "Rejoice in the Lord always." Paul isn't telling them to pretend there aren't hard times, but to remember that Christ is with them always - and this is the ultimate source of joy.

★Intro to the text

The last couple of weeks we've been hearing from a letter written to some friends living in a big diverse city - and they are struggling. They feel the government and society clashes with them being Christian. They feel that 'coming out' will risk jobs and friends - or worse. They also feel like they aren't good enough. It's no wonder that Paul's letter to the Philippians resonates with us here in Montréal.

So far we heard Paul greet them "with the grace and peace from God and our master, Jesus Christ." He went on to share his joy, not at being locked up with a possibility of early execution - but that God is working through people to spread the gospel (the good news). This community work gave him courage.

Last week we heard Paul quote a very very early Christian hymn and creed. It reminded us that Jesus has been with God since the beginning; that Jesus became fully human and despite giving us the freedom and power to kill him he was lifted up from death to become The Lord of everyone. This is the story of God continually doing good work in the world - that will come to a wonderful end.

This week we'll hear a section between the readings from the last two weeks, then a bit from after the hymn, and then skip to near the end. The big chunk that we're skipping is when Paul gets to some specific examples: good and ...not those guite there yet. This is good. It helps make what he's talking about more real. Perhaps you'll be able to think of your own examples? But first, what's the point he's trying to make?



Sermon: Community of Blessings

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Today's section of the letter starts with the word "Meanwhile". In some translations it is "Only", "Now" or "Just one thing". This is more than just a linking word. "Just one thing, live in such a way that you are worthy of the gospel of Christ." For these Christians who have heard the good news and are struggling with the surrounding culture (like us) and their own imperfections (also like us) Paul wants this to be the take home message. "Live in such a way that you are worthy of the gospel of Christ."

Since we have similar struggles, we should consider Paul's advice. But how do we live worthy of the gospel?

The first example to look to would be Jesus. Paul encourages them, and us, to "Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus." Last week we made a list; perhaps you followed up by making your own list with your discussion partner. 4 Paul has mentioned several qualities of Jesus in his letter so far.

As a part of his greeting he mentions "grace and peace." Grace is not graceful like a dancer... but perhaps like a group of dancers paying attention to what they all need - giving space, while interacting/engaging/becoming one while maintaining individuals. That can be an image of grace. More often we talk about it as freely offered forgiveness that allows life to flow on. Grace is patient - patiently teaching the dancers. I guess to boil it down, grace has forgiveness and lots of patience.

"Grace and peace"... this peace is more than not attacking others. It is like when a machine is running smoothly. Parts are

doing different things and moving in different directions, but it purrs. This peace is both in your soul and in the community around you.⁵

Paul talks of God's love. This is huge. God's love includes interacting with honourable people, those who are ignored and forgotten, and everyone in between. This love includes becoming humble to the point of letting us reject and kill God's son. It is self-sacrifice for the greater good. It's work, and also a feeling. Paul refers to God's affection for us. Jesus more than likes us, he loves us.

...and Paul lumps knowledge and wisdom in with love. This isn't innocent love or naive love. God knows us deeply, and loves us deeply.

Paul also talks about Jesus working, continuing to do good work. This isn't a God who has retired from creation, or sits back and watches the world turn. God is working "from the first day ...until the day of Jesus Christ." God is working to bring grace and peace and love to every aspect of creation - and is doing this in us.

Paul also gives pointed advice to those early Christians, and us. Paul suggests being gentle with each other - an aspect of offering grace to others.

We are encouraged to be courageous. I don't know if you use the 'c' word much - courageous. Personally I think more the other direction: intimidated. Do we feel intimidated to talk about having faith/trust in God? Is Jesus a friend with good news you will bring up in conversation with anybody, or do you avoid talking about religion?

Paul talks about being prepared to suffer... and is suffering as

he writes the letter. He also talks about it being okay. Can you imagine that? Think about somebody you have loved. Remember a time when you willingly suffered through something - a movie, or annoying quirk, or giving up time on a regular basis... but you loved them, so it was okay.

A cautionary note on suffering. It's not a gauge to how well you are following Christ. That when causing protests and getting locked up was a sign you were doing good. There's been periods of Christianity when martyrdom was a lofty goal. It was realized that this was a way of seeking glory for yourself and not focusing on sharing the gospel.

One of the big themes in Paul's letter, and throughout the Bible, is one we often miss because we do have some different cultural assumptions. The English translation doesn't help, but perhaps you noticed in the French translation? The 'you' is plural - 'vous' and not 'tu'. This is more than being polite, it reflects the orientation of society.⁷

This reminds me of a story about a Canadian teacher teaching in Mexico. She gave a test and was shocked when one of the brighter students not only talked during the test, but gave answers to his neighbour. The teacher had a meeting with the mother about this wildly inappropriate behaviour. The mother listened, and then responded indignantly that, "She didn't know how they raised children in Canada, but here they taught people to help each other." Problems were community problems. To borrow from Paul's image in another letter, the individuals were all different parts of one body. Each person is important to the smooth functioning of the community, but living "in such a way

that you are worthy of the gospel of Christ" is only possible as a community.

As I mentioned, we skipped parts of the letter that have examples of people that are good, or not so good, examples. Paul talks about their faith, and their willingness to serve others. Instead of telling you about them, let's think of our own examples.

This week I was honoured to lead Lillian's funeral, and to meet her family. She had shared her life with me, and I had a chance to hear more from her family. She showed grace in both setting boundaries, and making them lovingly generous. She was willing to suffer for her family - in many ways over the years. She showed affection and humour - living with joy even when struggling. She wasn't concerned with needing more and was generous with what she had. And she didn't want any recognition for any of this. She served the community of her family (7 kids & others she raised + the generations after that).

It's important to have group/community examples as well. Presbyterians Sharing and the Presbyterian World Service and Development (PWS&D) are two departments of our denomination that support partners in communities to share the love of Christ. This can be through education programs, supporting health care, listening and supporting indigenous voices, and sharing the good news of Christ.

The example from this week's prayer partner page (available in our worship PDF and the national website) tells of Tweedsmuir Memorial Presbyterian Church in Orangeville, Ontario. They participated in a Program that




helped them discern God calling them from being membership focused to serving the community outside their doors - with physical and spiritual needs. This includes providing supplies to local shelters and setting up a coffee bar outside the church that offers coffee and conversation to people passing by.

For both individuals and communities, this is work. But this is God's work. God working in you (individually and collectively). Now I'm not saying this is God forcing you to do something, but when you're in love with someone (even God) you are prepared to do work, and even suffer, out of the joy of that love. You are free not to, but how could you?

And this is the core of Paul's advice to the Christian community in Philippi... and us. Loving God leads to a way of life that may involve risk and sacrifice. It can be challenging, but the more your connection grows with God, and each other, the more the sacrifice fades. This "love will overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight 10 to help you to determine what really matters, so that in the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, 11 having produced a harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God."

To God be all the glory Amen.

After participating in the New Beginnings Program, which guides congregations through a renewal process to discern God's call for their future, Tweedsmuir Memorial Presbyterian Church in Orangeville, ON shifted from being a "membership-focused" congregation to a



"discipleship-focused" one, reigniting their sense of purpose. As a result, the church is putting its faith into action by exploring new and innovative ways to serve and engage with the community. In addition to organizing food drives, they have launched a laundry supply drive for local shelters. They are also experimenting with street and neighbourhood ministries, including a community meal program and a "Coffee on the Street" initiative, where volunteers set up a coffee bar outside the church and offer coffee and conversation to people passing by.




